

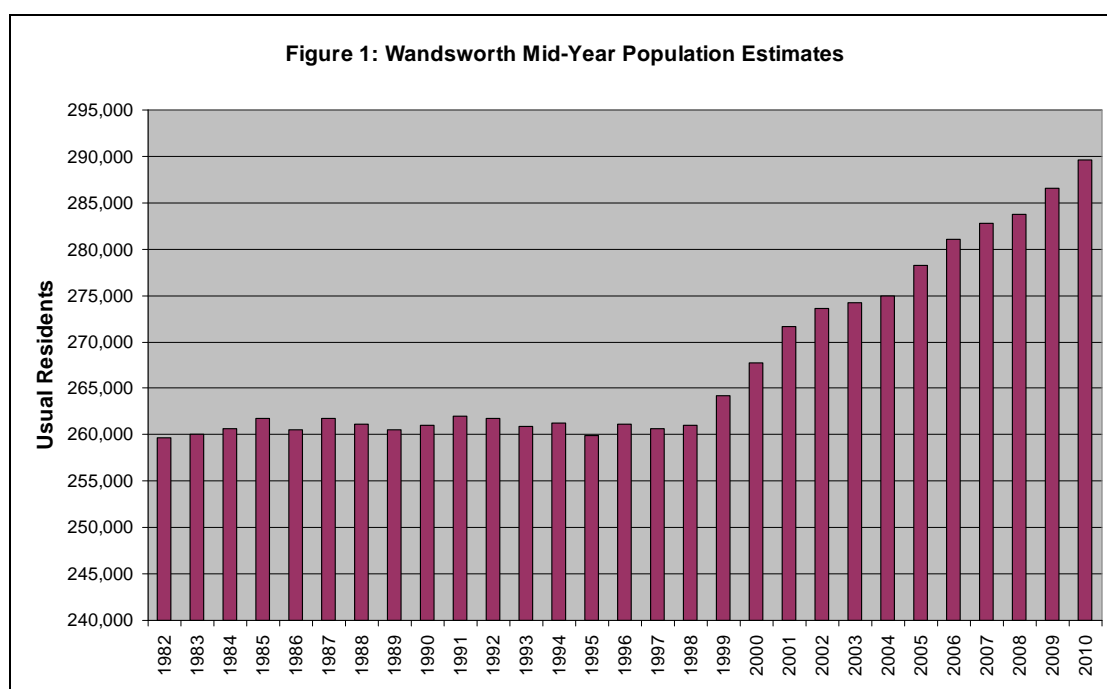
Wandsworth Mid-Year Population Estimates 2010



The Office for National Statistics (ONS) publish mid-year estimates of the resident population of the borough. This report summarises the main trends for Wandsworth. Further information and data for download is available from the [ONS website](#) and via the [London Datastore](#).

1. Population Change

Wandsworth is the most populous Inner London borough with an estimated resident population of 289,600 in 2010. The population of Wandsworth has steadily increased over the last decade from around 260,000 in the 1980's and 1990's (Figure 1).

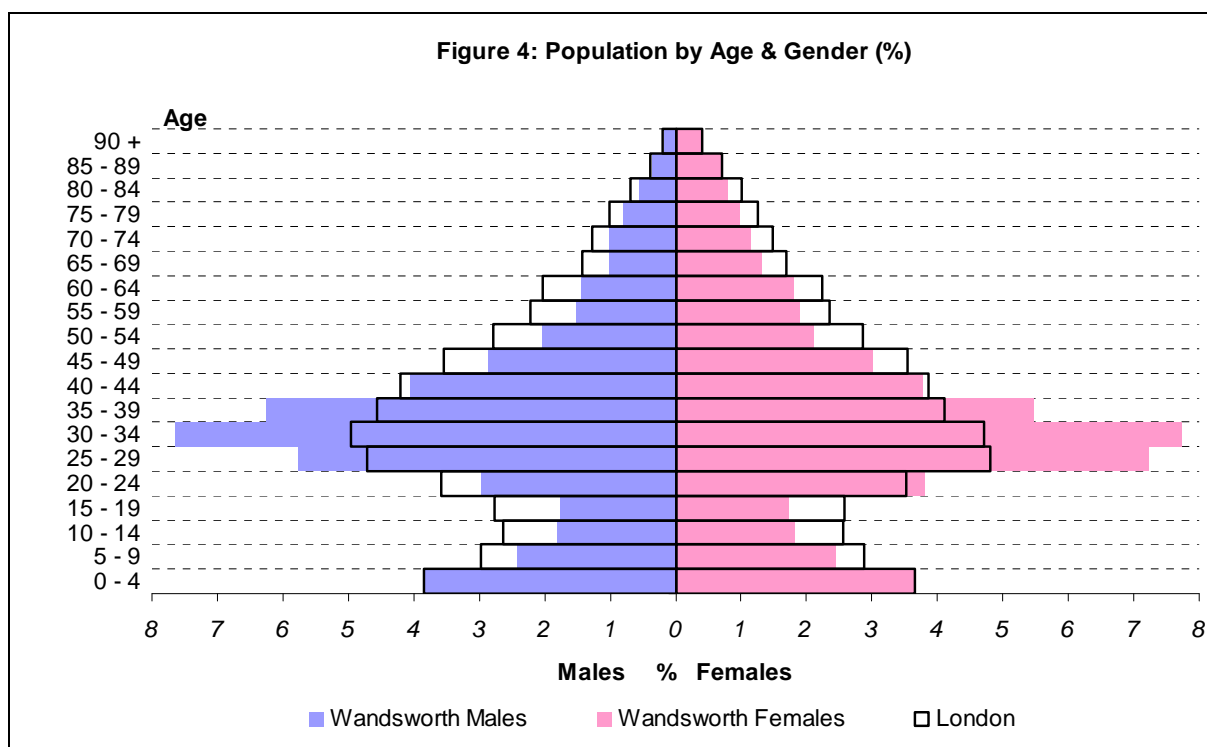
Figure 2: Mid-Year Population Estimate Components of Change 2001 - 2010

This population growth has been largely driven by natural change (excess of births over deaths). The borough's population is very mobile, with significant levels of annual turnover but overall population change through migration represents a comparatively small component of change (Figure 2). Wandsworth's birth rate has increased by 29% over the last ten years.

2. Population Structure

Wandsworth is estimated to have a higher proportion of females (52%) than males amongst its resident population (Figure 3). The borough also has a markedly skewed age distribution, with 40% of residents aged 25 to 39 (Figure 4). This compares with 28% for Greater London and 20% in England and Wales.

All figures presented are rounded to nearest 100. Source: Office for National Statistics © Crown Copyright 2011. Mid-year estimates are produced at local authority level using a nationally consistent methodology which facilitates comparison between areas. Methodology is regularly reviewed and improved, resulting in revisions to back-series estimates over time by the ONS. Migration data limitations (GP register moves for internal and International Passenger Survey for international) affect the accuracy of population estimates in areas like Wandsworth with a unique age structure and high population turnover.
