More affordable homes The council has unveiled plans to build 57 new affordable homes on the Savona and Patmore estates. These low cost rent council built properties will be prioritised for local people. In this corner of the borough more than 1,800 new affordable homes are in the pipeline and the Council is committed to increasing the number further (through its and private developer efforts).

Cycle friendly circus Work is now underway on providing a revamped and remodelled cyclefriendly roundabout at Queen's Circus, next to Battersea Park. Wider cycle lanes and new traffic signals that give cyclists priority will make it safer for them to use this busy roundabout, while other improvements will also make it much more pedestrian friendly.

Play area refurbished Local councillors have campaigned for the refurbishment of the Doddington's activity play area and this has led to a new basketball court being provided.

Crime levels down again Queenstown ward councillors and the local police SNT have worked together with residents to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour on the Doddington, Savona, Carey Gardens and Patmore estates. Street crime has fallen significantly through the use of CCTV and targeted local intelligence.

Cash for worthy causes Your Queenstown councillors continue to support grants to local community groups that have a positive impact on our neighbourhoods. Grants approved recently are supporting older people's lunch clubs and training courses. Councillors will continue to work with the many local groups that make a real difference to our community.

Jobs for young people QEST (Queenstown Employment Support Team) is a new initiative from Wandsworth Council and supported by your ward councillors that aims to secure employment and training opportunities for 130 young Queenstown residents.

New dawn for Nine Elms With work underway at the power station, people moving into new homes at Riverlight and construction activity reaching fever pitch across Nine Elms, the future looks bright. In total around 16,000 new homes and 25,000 permanent jobs will be created in this part of Battersea in the coming months and years.

New look adventure playground More than £200,000 worth of new play equipment has been installed in Battersea Park. Queenstown councillors worked hard to get local children the exciting equipment they wanted.
