

Apple takes a bite

The world's most valuable company is coming to the Brighter Borough.

Tech giant Apple, currently based in Regent Street, will open a new state of the art 'campus' at Battersea Power Station, Nine Elms, in 2021.

The company has snapped up half a million square feet of new office space within the riverside development site, which will make it one of Wandsworth's single biggest employers.

The move will shift a key part of London's fast growing tech industry to the South Bank and sets a trend other businesses are expected to follow. Wandsworth Council leader Ravi

Govindia said: "This is great news for Wandsworth. The arrival of such a globally important company shows that Nine Elms is on course to be a highprofile new business district and a new engine room for London's economy.

"When the US Embassy announced it was moving to Nine Elms it became a magnet for new investment. Apple's arrival will do the same and has shifted people's perceptions about this area's exciting future as a commercial hub. Local residents are ideally placed to benefit from the revival of Nine Elms and we will continue to help our existing communities take full advantage of this exciting regeneration."

Battersea Power Station is one of the biggest development projects in Nine Elms and in London. The 42 acre site will deliver around 3,500 new homes including 581 affordable properties that will be offered to Wandsworth residents at well below market rates. The privately funded scheme is also contributing £211m towards the cost of the Northern Line extension, which will provide Battersea's first two Tube stations in 2020.

Legal challenge looms as Government backs Heathrow expansion

The Government's recent decision to support Heathrow expansion is "wrong on every level, legally undeliverable and will end in failure after years of wasted effort", according to the leader of Wandsworth Council Ravi Govindia.

Transport Secretary Chris Grayling backed a third runway last October despite the west London airport already being by far the worst noise polluter in Europe and responsible for illegal pollution levels. Expansion is expected to create new flight paths across parts of the borough which have never experienced aircraft noise before.

Wandsworth is now working with Hillingdon, Richmond, Windsor and Maidenhead councils and Greenpeace UK to develop a legal strategy and has jointly appointed a specialist legal practice to challenge the scheme in the courts.

Cllr Govindia said: "This is deeply distressing news for the communities around this airport but this fight is far from over. Ultimately it will be for the courts to decide if this project goes ahead and the law is on our side.


"The airport boasts illegal levels of air pollution, woefully



inadequate transport capacity and has Europe's worst noise footprint, and that's with just two runways. Expansion will make all of these severely damaging issues worse. It's wrong on every level, legally undeliverable and will end in failure after years of wasted effort.

"It looks like we're heading back to the courts just as we did in 2010 after the Brown Government backed Heathrow's third runway. We overturned that decision in the High Court and nothing has changed to make expanding this airport any less damaging."

Glass raised protection

Earlier this year Wandsworth made national headlines through announcing plans to protect 120 local pubs from redevelopment.

The council published an Article 4 Direction which aims to stop pub owners from knocking them down or changing them into another use without planning permission. Wandsworth is the first council to remove permitted development rights on such a wide scale and many other planning authorities have now been in touch to see how the process works.

Organisations like the Campaign for Real Ale (CAMRA) and the Music Venues Trust have also backed the council's move.

Wandsworth developed its pub protection policy after several highly valued and thriving local pubs were either lost or came under threat of closure. In most cases they were perfectly healthy businesses but came under pressure from major supermarket chains looking to convert them into shops.

The Article 4 Direction is set to come into force in August next year. For more information visit

Stiffer fines for flytippers

The council is about to strike litter louts and flytippers with a double whammy - a beefed up enforcement team and much heavier on-thespot-fines.


A new squad of litter inspectors will be joining the borough's existing team which has been hitting flytippers hard this year. Since January more than 1,100 individuals and businesses have been fined for dumping waste on Wandsworth's

These extra personnel will wear uniforms and body cameras and target hotspots across the borough seven days a week. They will not be required to hand out a pre-determined number of fines nor will they be operating under any kind of bonus system.

They will however be dishing out much stiffer financial penalties with fines increasing from £80 to £400 to reflect the council's zero-tolerance approach to flytipping and to also help recover some of the clear-up costs borne by the public purse.

Tennis plan serves an ace

Some of the borough's tennis courts are being upgraded and refurbished.

Town centre business BID

Local businesses in Putney and Wandsworth Town centres are currently voting on whether to form new Business Improvement Districts (BIDs) which would raise money to enhance the local business environment and boost trade.

If voted through, each BID would be funded and led by the businesses within each defined area.

Priorities would include making the town centres more attractive to shoppers, raising awareness of what they have to offer, making them safer and cleaner and giving small businesses a stronger voice locally.

Businesses have worked together to develop detailed business plans for the BID areas and firms with a 2010 rateable value of at least £10,000 have been asked to vote on whether or not to put them into action. The legally-binding postal ballot closes on December 1 and the result will be announced the following day.

The size of each contribution is determined by the property's rateable value, so small businesses pay less and some are exempt.

Battersea goes Gigafast

People living on several Battersea council estates can sign up for a 'Gigafast' broadband service, thought to offer the fastest connection speeds found anywhere in London.

Community Fibre Ltd has been working with Wandsworth Council to install the network across the Savona, Patmore, Carey Gardens, Doddington, Rollo and Surrey Lane estates.

The service has clocked download speeds of over 1,000 megabits per second (Mbit/s) – around 47 times faster than the UK average.

North Battersea, recently chosen by Apple as the home of its new London headquarters, is the first part of Wandsworth to benefit from the ultra-fast broadband connection. Longer term the council's partnership with Community Fibre Ltd aims to offer over 20,000 homes access to the Gigafast network over the next few years.

The next estates to benefit from the service are set to be Battersea Fields and Ethelburga where cabling work has already started.

New Wandle wildlife haven

of March.

Work is well underway on a new haven for aquatic life at the mouth of the River Wandle.

The council is removing layers of contaminated sediment and removing a tidal weir to improve water flows in this stretch of the Wandle close to where it joins the Thames. This will help restore a wildlife habitat measuring roughly a hectare in size that has the potential to become a spawning area and nursery for young fish. The Thames Water-funded project is scheduled to be completed by the end

Finding homes for refugees

The council wants to hear from residents, businesses or other organisations who could rent one or more self-contained properties to Syrian refugees at an affordable rate.

The town hall will provide a range of help and support to refugee families, including a dedicated case worker to help them settle into the local community, access benefits, employment and local services like schools and doctors.

To qualify for the scheme homes need to have at least two bedrooms and be available on an assured shorthold tenancy for a minimum of 24 months. This is to ensure families have the stability and space they need.

Individuals or organisations providing refugee housing on this basis would benefit from long term, secure and well supported tenants.

Galleries, performance venues, festivals, sculptures and a riverside park... welcome to the new Nine Elms

Regular Brightside readers will know about the thousands of new affordable homes and jobs coming to Nine Elms. What is less well known about is the exciting network of cultural attractions this stretch of the South Bank will soon have to offer.

The plans for this rapidly changing district include new art galleries and studios, a network of sculptures and outdoor artworks, a 2,000 seat performance venue and new community spaces which will be focal points for creative events.

There are also proposals for a new cinema, a 'Village Hall' community venue, a film production studio, a fashion hub, a bandstand and unique children's play areas designed by world leading architects.

The redevelopment of New Covent Garden Market will create a new hub for London's food industry, called the 'Food Exchange', and the revived Battersea Power Station will be open to the public for the first time in its history.

The area's cultural revival has been carefully planned, with each development required to prepare a cultural strategy as part of its planning application. This means the council can coordinate an ambitious mix of cultural, arts and community uses right across the area.

The first new pub, arts studio, supermarkets, restaurant, bar and shops have already opened in Nine Elms and hundreds of people have now moved

into the first wave of new homes.

Making home ownership affordable

Around 800 new shared ownership homes will be built across Wandsworth over the next three years and the council is making sure local residents and workers get priority for every one.

A dedicated town hall team ensures new shared ownership homes are offered to people with a genuine local connection before anyone else can apply. Last year this meant that 96 per cent were snapped up by buyers from the Brighter Borough or those who already worked here.

The council also ensures that shared ownership homes are offered to households on incomes below the Mayor of London's £90,000 cap. Unlike some authorities, Wandsworth sets a range of maximum household income levels, between £46,000 and £90,000, to ensure lower earners can also get on the property ladder.

Buying on a shared ownership basis is much more affordable than the open market and there are hundreds more of these lower cost homes now being planned and built across Wandsworth.

How does shared ownership work?

- if a home costs £400,000, you could buy a 25 per cent share for £100,000, you could use a 10 per cent deposit (£10,000) and a 90 per cent mortgage (£90,000)
- you would also need to pay the legal fees and moving costs (around £8,000).
- you then pay a monthly rent and service charge to a housing association, and a monthly mortgage repayments (around £1,200 in total for this example).
- Over time you could pay off your mortgage, increasing the share you own.

Wandsworth and Richmond Councils have now launched a unique staff sharing arrangement which is on course to deliver savings of around £10m for each authority every year.

Both councils have retained their unique identities and values, while eliminating duplication in how many services are managed and run across the two boroughs. The councils' combined buying power could also lead to better deals from suppliers.

The move has been supported by the Government and by saving money on this scale local councillors are able to protect the frontline services residents rely on and can keep council tax low.

The transformation of Earlsfield's Tara Theatre is now complete, offering Wandsworth's culture lovers a new state-of-the-art performance venue.



Over 100 new charging points to boost electric motoring

The council has approved plans to install up to 125 new electric vehicle charging points across Wandsworth to help fuel the growth in clean and green motoring.

Currently there are only a handful of public charging points in the borough, which is limiting the number of people switching over to zero emission electric cars or hybrid models.

The new charging points would be spread right across Wandsworth and would be part of the Source London network, operated by BluePoint, so residents who sign up can also refuel their vehicles at hundreds more locations around the city.

The expansion plan comes amid increasing demand from residents to embrace electric vehicles. Currently there are 414 registered electric vehicle users within the borough, up from 97 registered in 2013. Source London has also recorded a major increase in membership requests in 2016 as demand continues to rise.

The initial roll out would see 20 to 25 'charging stations' created across the borough, each of which would include two to five charging points. Highly visible locations have been proposed to help raise awareness and encourage a higher take up. Many would be in areas with no parking restrictions or in place of single yellow lines to minimise the parking impacts.

The initial installation programme is expected to take around six months and would be funded by Source London's parent company Blue Point, with zero cost to the taxpayer.

As well as supporting growth in the fledgling electric car market the council is also encouraging cycling, walking and the use of car clubs, all of which help to reduce driving rates and improve air quality.

Wandsworth now has the fastest growing cycling rate in the entire country and the biggest car club membership in London. The charging point expansion plan aims to put the borough at the top of the charts for electric motoring as well.

Quietways are being developed across the capital by Transport for London to encourage inexperienced and less confident riders to make more journeys by bike by utilising quieter and less congested back streets and parks.

In Wandsworth two routes are proposed – running from Clapham Common to Wimbledon (Quietway 4) and Waterloo to Norbury (Quietway 5). These latest proposals have been drawn up following earlier rounds of public consultation and have been designed to reflect the views of

local people.

Wandsworth's transport spokesman Jonathan Cook said: "We support the concept of Quietways and want to play our part in encouraging more people to take up sustainable modes of transport. However it's vitally important to ensure these routes are as well designed as possible and do not have an adverse impact on other road users, pedestrians and visitors to our commons and open spaces."

Conservative party candidate Rhodri Morgan came second with 987 votes. The turnout was 23.75 per cent.




