## 1. What are the aims of the service and what changes are being proposed?

The Shared Lives service provides placements for people with learning disabilities in the family homes of paid carers. It supports the carers to provide high quality, round the clock care to service users. All carers have to attend equality and diversity training.

Currently there are 44 placements (29 permanent and 15 respite) and referrals to the service are made by Social Workers in DESS, following assessment of service users.

The permanent placements provide a person centred and less expensive alternative to residential care.

The service is provided by Southside Partnership under a contract with the Council which expires on 30<sup>th</sup> September 2016. The proposal is to jointly commission a Shared Lives service with Richmond Council with a similar specification to the one in place at present. There will continue to be scope for new referrals to be made to the service.

The service specifications will be available to members as an appendix to this report.

### 2. What is the rationale behind these changes?

The joint commissioning arrangement with Richmond Council is intended to produce efficiency savings. The Service is provided as a personalised alternative to residential care and is CQC registered.
