### 1. What are the aims of the service and what changes are being proposed?

The Play and Extended Services Section provides a range of services that aim to support or secure better outcomes for children and young people as set out in the Children and Young People's Plan (CYPP). The Section provides a number of directly delivered services including Battersea Park Adventure Playground. This site currently offers children and young people (5-16yrs old) fun, adventurous, indoor and outdoor play opportunities after school, at weekends and during school holidays taking account the priorities within the CYPP. The service is currently offered free of charge and is fully staffed.

The proposed change relates to the decommissioning of the current adventure play structures and their replacement with commercially manufactured equipment. This will mean that the playground does not need to be staffed. The playground will continue to be free to access and the opening hours would be extended in line with those of the park itself.

#### 2. What is the rationale behind these changes?

The Council faces a reduction in budget of £70 million by 2014. Each Department has scrutinised its services to ascertain if they can be delivered in different more cost effective ways and to see if they are still required.
