Faith fact finding

More than 70 pupils from seven Wandsworth secondary schools attended this year's Faith Direct event at the town hall, where they were able to fire a series of quick-fire questions at representatives from the borough's different faith groups.

The Faith Direct initiative, organised by the council and the Wandsworth Multi-Faith Group, brought together speakers from local Muslim, Christian, Hindu, Jewish, Baha'i, Humanist and Buddhist communities.


Students were given a fact pack in advance summarising each belief, and then conducted a whistle-stop tour round the room interviewing each representative in turn. The questioning lasted 15 minutes before a

bell was rung and the students moved on to the next table.

After the event, speakers said they enjoyed having the opportunity to challenge stereotypes about their beliefs, and students said the event had added to their knowledge.

Artist Emma wins green makeover

Nine year-old Emma Peon has won a £25k energy makeover for her school – **Hotham Primary** in Putney.

Emma took second place in the British Gas Generation Green Smarter Power competition, beating 4,000 other young artists. Her winning comic strip was chosen by judges including Beano artist Nigel Parkinson, and illustrated the importance of putting a full load in the washing machine, the right amount of water in the kettle, and using a smart meter to monitor energy use.

Now Hotham will get £25,000 of energy saving devices, including solar panels, LED lighting and a new energy efficient boiler, which together could save the school up to £7,000 a year on their fuel bills.

Sarah Martin, Headteacher at Hotham, said: "Emma's comic strip was outstanding and we're proud that she's won an energy makeover for our school. The makeover will help us to save energy every day and will inspire our pupils now and in the future to be more energy efficient."





Game, set and match for Granard

Granard Primary in Putney has won £5,000 to buy two outdoor table tennis tables.

The school was awarded the funding by financial mutual, OneFamily, through its Foundation Community Awards.

Teachers and governors wanted to install the new table tennis tables to encourage pupils to get active at break time. The concrete tables will be fitted in the playground used by children in years three to six. The school also hopes to launch a new table tennis club, to encourage more children to take up the sport.



Author Alex turns the page

Award winning author Alex Wheatle paid a visit to **Saint John Bosco College** on World Book Day.

He talked about his early life in a children's home and a spell in prison following the Brixton riots in the 1980s, and about how he turned his life around through literature and reading. He also read from two of his books, 'Liccle Bit' and the Guardian Children's Fiction Prize winning 'Crongton Knights'.

Students could then ask questions, which included Alex's favourite writers, his own inspiration for writing, what he is currently reading and how long it takes to write a book. Students were also keen to know when his next book, 'Straight Outta Crongton' is released and if he had plans for further stories in the 'Crongton' series.

Alton dress to impress

For their World Book Day celebrations staff and pupils at **Alton Primary School** in Roehampton dressed up as their favourite book characters.

All members of staff throughout the school had a chance to read their favourite children's book to a group of children of all ages from nursery through to year 6.





Shanice is top Young Chef


Shanice Gayle from **Harris Academy** has won the fourth annual Wandsworth Young Chef of the Year competition.

Judges were wowed by her dish of garlic butter prawns and chorizo skewers followed by lemon chicken piccata and homemade tagliatelle, with a pudding of tres leches (a sponge cake soaked in milk and cream) and pomegranate.

Each of the eight finalists won a Jamie Oliver cookbook, personally signed and dedicated to them by Jamie himself, plus £75. Shanice won £150 and a crystal trophy.

The Young Chef competition is run by the Mayor of Wandsworth and the council's lifelong learning team with support from catering company Compass. It nurtures young talent, teaches young people how to cook good healthy food to a budget, provides a chance to learn from the experts and helps young people get a foothold in the catering industry.





Monsters on Parade

The Kids Create Club at the ROSF Centre in Battersea has been exploring microscopic monsters from the Thames through weekly workshops run by Puppets with Guts.

The 'Monster Soup' project was funded by Wandsworth Council and the Battersea Power Station foundation to get young people involved in the arts and culture going on in the their fast changing area


Their investigations ended with a lantern parade through Battersea featuring giant illuminated puppets that they made.

Harris Academy in Battersea has won the Academic Excellence Award in the Evening Standard School Awards, sponsored by the Jack Petchey Foundation.

Harris's Progress 8 measure is the highest in London and is one of the top three in England. Since becoming an academy its A* to C pass rate in English and maths has almost doubled — from 44 per cent to 80 per cent.

More than a thousand young singers and musicians from schools all over the borough took part on the concert, organised by the council's Wandsworth Schools' Music Service. The children, accompanied by their parents, sang songs and waved palm leaves. They then listened to the Easter story in the St Cecilia chapel.





Coding showcase

Members of coding clubs held in ten borough schools have been showing off their skills.

The clubs offered around a hundred students the opportunity to work collaboratively while creating their own coding projects that they could develop and keep in a portfolio.

Schools that took part were Burntwood Academy, Southfields Academy, Bolingbroke Academy, Chestnut Grove Academy, St John Bosco, St Cecilia's, Ark Academy Putney, Harris Academy, Ernest Bevin College and Graveney Academy.

They also had the opportunity to listen to advice from coding professionals, including 12-year-old Tanmay Bakshim, the youngest person to ever work on IBM's Watson artificial intelligence project, former Graveney pupil Durrell Bishop who became a lecturer in Design Interactions at the Royal College of Art, and Euan Millar who works for a company improving tech infrastructure in the Eastern Congo who talked about how computing and technology can make the world a better place.





The council commissioned Blueshift to run the clubs to encourage young people to develop vital skills and skill up the next generation of workers in the borough's burgeoning tech sector.




Pupils at Sacred Heart RC Primary

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Schools anti-slavery project makes the headlines

A project in six borough primary schools to teach children about modern-day slavery has appeared on the international news channel CNN as part of its Freedom Week programming.

Students are shown that slavery is not just something from history, but is happening now, and learn through comedy, drama, games, role-play and storytelling. The workshops also teach children about how to recognise risky situations and unhealthy relationships and to recognise that they have the ability to bring about change.

CNN filmed the final workshop in the programme at **Swaffield School.** One of the students said: "I learnt that if we don't stand up to slavery now, then people will still get abused"

Two schools were highly commended: **St Boniface School** for their work researching the history of Mr Drouet's Establishment for Pauper Children and **All Saints Putney** for researching the Putney Velodrome and Raneleigh House. They both won £600.

Two schools were commended: **St Mary's RC Battersea** which looked into the historyof Queentown Road-based Victorian beverage company Pure Water and **Putney High School** for research into the school during war time. They both won £400.

The competition was the brainchild of current Mayor of Wandsworth Cllr Field. He said: "An understanding of local history is vital if we are to give our young people a sense of place and belonging in our diverse society, and who made Wandsworth what it is today."

Pay rise for foster carers

Foster carers working for Wandsworth Council are getting a pay rise.

The council's in-house foster carers get allowances to cover their costs, and fees as payment for their hard work.

Weekly allowances will be £196 a week for looking after a 0-10 year old and £255 a week for 11-17 year olds

Weekly fees will go up to £170 for looking after 0-10 year olds and £200 for 11-18 year olds. These rates will also be paid for each additional child looked after. For example, this means a carer looking after a 12-year-old and a 14-year-old would get £910 a week.

Youth council raises questions about mental health

The Wandsworth Youth Council held a Mental Health Question Time event, as part of its ongoing mental health campaign.



They ran the town hall event in collaboration with the young people's NHS mental health service CAMHS, and invited 49 young people along to quiz a panel of senior mental health practitioners in the style of the BBC Question Time show. The discussion was chaired by Jasmin Hughes, the Mental Health Campaign Lead for the Youth Council.

Key areas the young people asked about included funding and waiting times for mental health services, access to support in schools, what advice to give young people who are struggling with mental ill health, what support is available and how to access it, and support for transitioning from young people to adult services.


