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
Smartening up streets and parks


The council has unveiled a £5m public realm renewal project that will see a series of refurbishments and improvements to Wandsworth's streets, green spaces and infrastructure.

By the end of March additional money over and above existing budgets will be invested in renewing pavements and road surfaces, upgrading footpaths in parks and commons, improving street lighting, cleaning up bridges, investing in high streets and shopping parades, planting more street trees, and removing unnecessary street clutter.

The work is in addition to the ongoing improvements to Putney High Street. That project will continue, with the next phase of work to include better connectivity between the High Street and the river. The council will also lobby TfL to simplify the busy junction of Putney High Street and the Upper Richmond Road to make it safer.

The improvement project in Southfields will also continue, including new pavements, safety measures for pedestrians and cyclists, benches and extra street trees.





# The Tube comes to Battersea

The first major Tube extension to open this century is on track to carry more than 5m people a year.

The Northern Line Extension to Nine Elms and Battersea Power Station is supporting around 25,000 new jobs and 20,000 new homes.


The Leader of Wandsworth Council, Cllr Ravi Govindia, was one of the first to travel on the new line and says it was a once-in-a-lifetime moment he will never forget. It will also provide better transport links for existing residents, including some 1400 people living on the area's council estates.

Cllr Govindia said: "Wandsworth Council has always had huge ambitions for this area and we are delighted that our vision and planning to improve the connectivity of Battersea and Nine Elms has come to fruition. We worked closely in partnership with Battersea Power Station, the GLA, Transport for London, Lambeth Council and all the developers in the area to get this crucial transport link planned, funded and delivered.



# Line of Light shines across Battersea and Nine Elms

Dozens of light beams and dazzling projections shone out from locations across Battersea and Nine Elms to celebrate the communities connected by the new Tube line.

Thousands of residents and visitors watched colourful designs projected onto buildings along the 3km route marked out in the sky with beams of light.

The Line of Light put Battersea and Nine Elms on the culture map of London and connected south London neighbourhoods along the route of the new Northern line extension.

The new Battersea Power Station and Nine Elms Tube stations were marked with a sky beam while the river-facing facade of the Power Station building was decorated with changing projections. Eight projections, all designed by Projection Teknik, included illuminations on the end of a building overlooking Nine Elms Park, two apartment buildings on Ponton Road near the US Embassy and the MyLo building near the newly opened up Arch 42 pedestrian route.

People gathered at two festival hubs, one at New Union Square SW11, to enjoy refreshments and see dance performances, live music and the Battersea Power Station Community Choir.

Line of Light was presented by Wandsworth Council and Lambeth Council and took place on October 29 and 30. Principal partners were Battersea Power Station, Embassy Gardens, R&F Properties, Urbanest and New Covent Garden Market development partners VINCI St. Modwen. Supporting partners were Bloom Nine Elms, TfL and Vauxhall One, and the event was delivered with supporting partners PANI Projection and Lighting.

Boost your immunity this winter

With two viruses in circulation this winter, it is more important than ever for those who are eligible to have the COVID-19 booster and the flu vaccines.

Research shows that if you get flu and COVID-19 at the same time you are more likely to get seriously ill. Both vaccines help to protect people from the worst outcomes, whilst reducing the spread of the viruses and helping to protect your family, friends and the wider community.

The COVID-19 booster is an additional vaccine dose for those who have previously received two doses of a COVID-19 vaccine. Those over 40 are now entitled to have the booster jab six months after their second dose. Those aged 16 or 17 can now have a second dose of the vaccine, 12 weeks after the first.

If you haven't had the COVID-19 vaccine, anyone aged 12 and over can get the jab. Book an appointment or find out about walk-in sites at wandsworth.gov.uk/coronavirus.

The Winter flu vaccine offers protection against the effects of flu to as many eligible people as possible, particularly those most at risk. Patients who are in an at-risk group are being offered the flu vaccine for FREE and are encouraged to get protected as soon as possible.



#### EU citizen? You can still get support to settle

If you are a Wandsworth resident who is an EU citizen, it's not too late to apply for settled status. The council commissions CAB Wandsworth's EU Advice Service to help people apply and so far it has supported more than 4,000 people. The Government has announced new funding to enable it to continue running the service until next July.

All EU/EAA, Swiss nationals and non-European family members, including children, must apply – even though the deadline has passed. The Home Office has confirmed that each case will be assessed individually on its own merits.

New guidelines have been brought in to help create a dedicated 'riverside quarter' around the Wandle Delta area with better links to the rest of Wandsworth Town.

The guidance was recently published following extensive consultation and covers the area between Armoury Way, Putney Bridge Road, Old York Road and the river.

It sets out how redevelopment will be managed so that new homes and jobs are created for local people as well as revitalising the area to make it more attractive for residents and visitors.

It also looks at better connecting the riverside area with the rest of the town centre, including the station, the town hall, Southside and the Ram Brewery

quarter. And in line with the council's Environment and Sustainability Strategy it stresses the importance of ecology, especially around the river.

Other changes in Wandsworth Town include new shops, 200 homes and a new library and public space in Garratt Lane, the redevelopment of the historic Spread Eagle pub into a hotel and new entertainment megahub Gravity.

A brewery heritage centre recently opened at the Ram Quarter to reflect the site's brewing history.

## Three years of Digipals

Digipals is a free service which offers friendly and patient support to older people to get them online.

It's run by Age UK Wandsworth, with funding from the Wandsworth Council Grant Fund.

Emma Chisholm, Community and Wellbeing Lead at Age UK Wandsworth, said: "Whilst there were computer courses available locally, many of our clients were anxious about keeping up, so either dropped out or never got started. From the

pilot, word quickly spread, and we started offering sessions in sheltered accommodation and at our office in addition to the libraries.

"Digipals is now three years old, and we are delighted with what we have been able to achieve. More than 290 older Wandsworth residents have received more than 1000 support sessions in eight locations around the borough."

#### **More SEND school places**

More school places are to be provided for children with special education needs and/or with disabilities (SEND).

Proposed schemes costing just under £5m will pay for 119 additional places at local schools for children with a range of needs, including new resource bases at Swaffield and Granard primary schools and increased capacity at existing bases at St John Bosco. There will also be increased capacity at Garratt Park and Paddock special schools.

Last year there were more than 530 pupils attending Wandsworth's network of special schools and 246 SEND pupils at mainstream schools

## Report fly-tip offenders

Remember you don't need to see the videos to report fly-tip offenders. You can also report an incident by telling us what you saw or sending a picture in.

#### Tell us:

- The circumstances, e.g. if you saw the fly-tipping, the date and time it took place and a description of any vehicles involved, plus registration number.
- Take a picture of the incident, making sure you don't put yourself or others at risk to do this.
- Location: side of the road, back alleyway, railway embankment, in a river, and whether it was on private or council land.
- The amount and type of waste, eg a few bags of rubbish, a fridge, a sofa.

Wandsworth is home to some historic and magnificent old trees – as well as lots of other muchloved trees in parks and on streets.

A new policy sets out how Wandsworth Council will plant between 700 and a thousand trees each winter, as well as caring for the 62,000 existing trees in the borough for which it is responsible. Some of the most famous include two that were nominated by Londoners as 'landmark trees' when a list was drawn up after the great storm of 1987.

One, the Battersea Park Strawberry tree, is the largest hybrid strawberry tree in Britain. Another, the Roehampton Lucombe Oak is about 250 years old, 105ft tall and was probably planted by Capability Brown. It stood in the gardens of Grove House and is now part of the Alton Estate in Danebury Avenue. The hybrid Lucombe Oaks were named after horticulturalist William Lucombe who discovered and grew them.

Wandsworth Park in Putney has two impressive lines of trees running in parallel – the Lime Avenue and the Riverside Walk. The area between the paths was originally intended to be a line of tennis courts, but they were never built.

Some of the finest trees can be found in Wandsworth and Tooting Commons, including a number of very old oaks – you can see some of them on Tooting Common in the woods behind the café off Bedford Hill.

The Friends of Wandsworth Common are marking their 150th anniversary this year with a tree planting drive, including saplings all over the commons and a 100sq metre mini forest of trees, shrubs and plants.

One part of the borough – Nine Elms – gets its name from the nine elm trees that were known to be standing on Nine Elms Lane in the 1840s. The row of elms is thought to have been replanted several times since then. In January 2019, the Nine Elms community re-planted the last two elm trees which had been missing since one tree was blown down in a storm and one was felled due to disease. In December of that year a spectacular winter lights installation celebrated them. In 1997 the council embarked on a public consultation called Who Needs Trees?, with the input helping to shape the first Borough Tree Strategy. The new tree policy will build on this, and will include input from professionals, community groups, parks friends' groups and especially the Wandsworth Tree Wardens.



The aim is to create a framework for how the borough's tree experts will plant the correct trees for their environment and keep existing trees healthy. It will also look at how trees can be used to mitigate climate change.

And it will look closely at preventing as many trees as possible from being felled. Sometimes this cannot be avoided, such as when a tree is diseased, but Wandsworth has made hundreds of tree preservation orders and the new policy proposes making more. It also says developers must discuss the impact of their application on trees with the council before plans will be considered.



# Beautiful parks and blooming green spaces





WANDSWORTH PARKS HAVE PICKED UP TWO OF THE HIGHEST ACCOLADES FOR THE WAY THEY ARE PROTECTED AND MANAGED – GREEN FLAGS AND LONDON IN BLOOM AWARDS.

Battersea Park, King George's Park, Tooting Common, Wandsworth Common and Wandsworth Park have received Green Flags – an international mark of quality for well-managed parks and green spaces.

And Tooting and Wandsworth Commons have both won Gold Medals in the London in Bloom Awards for their beauty, biodiversity, wildlife protection, accessibility and community involvement.

Other good news for parks includes:

- An announcement from the council that it is to spend half a million pounds on refurbishing cast iron railings and repairing pathways in parks and open spaces across the borough.
- The installation of 20 new drinking fountains in various parks in a bid to reduce the waste created by empty single-use plastic water bottles. People will be encouraged to refill bottles at the fountains.
- The planting of ten thousand flower bulbs in parks, commons and roadside grass verges. This includes areas that have not been planted before including parts of West Hill Road, Merton Road, Skeena Hill and Stag Lane.



## Power Station heritage saved

The Leader of Wandsworth Council, Cllr Ravi Govindia has welcomed the news that the borough's much-loved Grade II\* listed landmark is finally coming off the Heritage at Risk Register after 30 years.

Battersea Power Station was added to the Register in 1991 when it was in danger of being lost forever as a result of neglect and decay.

Historic England has now announced that the building is being removed from the register thanks to an extraordinary effort by Wandsworth Council and partners working with Battersea Power Station.

Cllr Govindia said: "The council is proud to have enabled the preservation of this key building. We worked with Battersea Power Station to ensure that surrounding development, which provides the funding contribution for restoration, respects the listed building as a centrepiece.

"A huge amount of care has gone into making sure that this striking piece of London's industrial past has been restored both inside and out for many generations to come, and is fit for the future whilst recognising its importance as a significant heritage asset."

Extensive and highly skilled conservation work has preserved historic features, including the rebuilding of the famous chimneys using the original method and sourcing handmade bricks from the two British firms who supplied the original bricks. The building will open next year with shops, offices and a food hall as well as a new riverfront park open to the public.

## Help decide school appeals

Volunteers are needed to help decide on appeals by parents or carers whose child has missed out on a place at their preferred school.

People from all different backgrounds and experience are needed to sit on appeals panels. Each has three members, including one with no paid experience of education who is independent of the council, school and family involved.

Volunteer Cynthia Nartey said: "Parents are usually at ease knowing that panel members are volunteers and not just officials doing their job. Every time I sit on a panel to hear an appeal, I feel like I am giving a child a fair chance."

No formal qualifications are required but you must be 18 or over and available during weekdays. Full training and support is given. Call the Wandsworth Appeals Service on (020) 8871 7554 or email educationappeals@wandsworth.gov.uk

#### **Domestic Abuse Support**

The council has commissioned the charity Hestia to provide emergency accommodation to women and children fleeing domestic abuse, as well as support to the wider community. It will ensure all survivors have an up-to-date risk assessment and individual support plan. Services for domestic abuse survivors with complex needs will continue to be provided by Refuge.

The new service is the latest in a string of initiatives in Wandsworth to support those experiencing domestic abuse, including a new Violence Against Women and Girls Strategy due to be launched soon.

# Together on Climate Change

Timed to coincide with COP26, the ambitious week-long festival was organised by Wandsworth Council as part of its pledge to tackle climate change. A wide range of individuals and local organisations came together to raise awareness of climate change issues and to discuss what everyone can do to reduce emissions.

Sessions included information on energy efficiency, cycling, plogging, home composting, cutting back on single-use plastics, biodiversity, active travel, upcycling, air pollution, electric vehicles and the circular economy. There were also dedicated events for young people and businesses.

The final flagship event was held in Battersea Arts Centre's Grand Hall and included talks, discussions, family fun and stalls from local environmental groups.

### Comment now on air quality plan

A new draft Air Quality Action Plan sets out how the council will continue its work to further reduce air pollution in the borough. Local people have until January 4 to take part in a consultation so their views can feed into the final plan.

The council has pledged to reduce pollution and its impact as part of its actions to tackle climate change under the Wandsworth Environment and Sustainability Strategy.

Actions in the draft plan include prioritising areas including schools, hospitals and care homes as well as town centres, protecting green spaces, planting trees and enhancing biodiversity, putting air quality issues at the heart of the council's planning, transport planning and procurement processes, developing a new Walking and Cycling Strategy,



making the council's fleet of vehicles less polluting and creating zero emissions zones for council buildings

# Boosting greener travel

The borough is getting more cycle parking. A further 111 new bike hangars are being installed in locations around the borough and an additional 93 bike racks are being put in parks.

There are now almost 170 publicly available bike hangar locations. As well as those on residential streets, there are three dozen on the borough's housing estates and most new private housing developments are required to provide residents with secure bike storage as a key condition of their planning consent. Many of the bike racks are in Battersea Park, with others in 13 parks and open spaces.

#### Waste less food

Wandsworth is trialling a food waste collection scheme and a home compost scheme, but even better is to avoid wasting food in the first place. Avoiding a kilo of wasted turkey would save nearly 11 kilos of carbon emissions.

## Building homes for local people

The council is continuing to exceed its own targets to build genuinely affordable homes in the borough prioritising them for local people and workers.

Over the last five years, 1,832 affordable homes were built in the borough with forecasts showing a further 1,650 affordable homes will be built over the next three years.

Despite some of the highest land and property prices in the UK, the council is consistently in the top five affordable housing deliverers in London. the council focuses on delivering low-cost housing options including shared ownership for first time buyers, rent options for lower income households to specialist supported housing for vulnerable residents.

Exceeding our housing targets is also helping to solve London's housing crisis. Several new housing developments have been completed recently including McKinney House in Roehampton and Arnal Crescent in Putney Heath providing four low-cost homes for rent.

Cllr Jonathan Cook, Cabinet Member for Housing, said: "We are stepping up to the challenge of increasing the housing options for residents and workers by building more housing of all types so that residents can meet their housing aspirations. I am particularly proud that we have more than doubled in

the last 10 years the number of shared ownership homes available in the borough as well as exceeding our low cost rent housing targets.

"Despite the many financial challenges we face, building more homes remains a priority for us including through the council's 1,000 home development programme 'Housing for All'."



'Delight at the quality of social housing'

When Emma Williams and her family first saw their new council-built three-bedroom home in McKinney House, they couldn't believe how nice it was. Emma said: "I was really pleased. It is so lovely with big windows bringing a lot of light into the property. We are very excited to be moving in."

The site delivers 10 new council homes including five three-bed maisonettes, two three-bed flats and three two-bed flats and is the first stage of the regeneration of the Alton Estate by the council.

Cllr Jonathan Cook said: "We are committed to building to the highest possible space, quality and sustainability standards. Mckinney House is another example of us delivering."

Features of the development include a secure communal garden with play equipment for children under five, secure communal bike and bin storage areas, five parking spaces and new homes for birds and bats.



A new social housing development has been named after a prominent community figure who dedicated his life to bringing communities together.

McKinney House in Bessborough Road, Roehampton, celebrates the life of the former vicar of Holy Trinity Church the late Rev. Jim McKinney who died almost three years ago.

He was one of the founding members of the Roehampton Forum and Partnership, created to bring local communities together as well as being a school governor at Roehampton Church School.

Jim's wife Sue and two children Ruth and Alex attended an event along with council leader Cllr Ravi Govindia and the Bishop of Southwark.

Cllr Govindia said: "I am delighted we have been able to honour the life of the Rev Jim McKinney who did so much for the local community. Rev. McKinney was steadfast in his support for more and better housing for the Alton Estate."





Eight awards and a special citation were given to people and teams from across Wandsworth at a special ceremony in the Civic Suite earlier this month.

Wandsworth Mayor, Cllr Richard Field, said: "The Wandsworth Council Civic Awards is our chance to say thank you to our wonderful community champions that work so tirelessly across the borough but whose efforts often go unsung. All of us in Wandsworth are deeply grateful to each and every one of our winners and the contribution they make to community life in the borough."

#### The winners were:

- Richard Fox and Julia Bott who won an Environmental Civic Award for their work running the Friends of Wandsworth Common.
- Maxine Lincoln for her work as a volunteer with the Wandsworth Sea Cadets.
- **Jennifer Beckford** for her work helping young people stay safe through the Nicholas Stewart Project.
- **Jonathan Dyson** for his role with the Northcote Road Business Network and supporting local businesses.

- Rosemary Taylor-Davies for her role during the pandemic in setting up The Scrubbery providing more than 28,000 items of protective scrubs.
- Jonathan Palma for setting up the Roehampton Response Network and bringing together groups and individuals from the community to help those most in need.
- Wandsworth Foodbank Volunteer Team won a group award for delivering more than 16,000 emergency food supplies during the pandemic.
- Power2Connect won a group award for distributing laptops to Wandsworth families who weren't otherwise able to get online during lockdown.
- Jake Djalo received a special Mayor's citation for a lifesaving act of heroism, when, as working as a lifeguard at Putney Leisure Centre he saved a boy from drowning.

Entertainment on the night was provided by the Wandsworth Music Service and Wandsworth Young Musicians of the Year pianist Evie Malin and vocalist Jasmine Djazel.


## Discover the best food and drink in Wandsworth


Find out about some of Wandsworth's best restaurants, cafes, pubs, bars and speciality food establishments with a series of smartphonefriendly 'food and drink trails'

Helping hundreds into work

The council's Work Match jobs service has helped 1800 local people find employment.

In September it reached the milestone of placing its 1000th person within the construction industry. This is on top of 800 people who found work in other industries including hospitality and retail.

Mark Ireland secured a job as a logistics manager working at Battersea Power Station with the help of Work Match.

Many women going through the perimenopause and menopause report feeling alone and isolated, but it happens to all women and support is available.

In Wandsworth, around 29,00 women are aged between 45 and 60, that's almost 9 per cent of the population or one in ten residents.

Often women are told that they just need to get on with it, but many are juggling career, family, and caring responsibilities.

Menopause is a bit like reverse puberty as reproductive hormones in the body start to drop. As with puberty every individual's experience is different and symptoms vary from person to person but can include weight gain, mood swings, hot flushes, anxiety and sleeplessness.

Some women may not be aware of what is happening to them, and the mental, physical, and hormonal changes associated with menopause can be unexpected and frightening. Partners and children may not understand or know how to help.

If you are struggling with menopausal symptoms, talk to your GP and ask for support.

#### Sonia's story...

"Menopause was like an unwelcome visitor that I didn't have any choice other than to allow entrance into my life. People greeted me with, 'OMG you have put on weight', like I don't have a mirror in my house. Or you go to a doctor looking for answers and all they tell you is, 'you are too fat, you should eat less,' – genius!

It is like I have become a reverse teen. Everything aches, mood swings, body changes. But when I was a teen I had my mum, aunties, friends to support me. It was a cheerful time, becoming a woman. If I knew what waited for me on this side...

We need a more compassionate way so we at least could feel supported and understood. This phase is no walk in the park, it affects not only me but also those around me, family, friends, and colleagues. I am not the same person I used to be sometimes. The happy go lucky girl is lost in a body that is no longer listening.

Newsflash, this will happen to all women, maybe having different struggles or symptoms but the changes will still be there. Why is it so difficult for people to understand that I want answers to my questions and support when I feel like screaming from my window so everyone can hear?"


