The community response has been immense with to date sending 1,326 tonnes of humanitarian aid to Poland via 55 trucks and 76 vans, containing 1,932 pallets. To administer the various elements of the humanitarian aid, the club is employing three administrators. The work includes organising volunteers, completing the export transportation documents, transport coordination and replying to the 2004 daily requests for help and advice they are receiving from across the country. In support of this, they are seeking funds to purchase and install new camping storage equipment. Having continued access to camping and outdoor activity equipment will enable the Guides to participate in camping trips and outdoor skills activities such as fire-lighting and outdoor cooking. Also this will allow approximately 12 Guides to attend camping trips twice a year, further 24 Guides, 32 Brownies and 6 Rangers to participate in tent pitching, shelter building, outdoor cooking and fire-lighting activities; and for 30 Guides to participate in an Annual Outdoor District Cooking Competition. Key outcomes for the young people include: gaining team-building/team-working skills; developing self-reliance and self-confidence; having increased confidence; developing skills around building appropriate relationships - enhancing social skills, leadership skills and life skills. The programme would involve trained autistic facilitators and specialists delivering sensory therapeutic and physical activities e.g. sensory arts and crafts, pan-disability sports, sensory water obstacle courses and swimming. Alongside the children and young people weekend sessions, 6 Family discussion groups would be delivered for family members, covering healthy relationships; personal hygiene (sexual health), dental health and mental health; transitioning into adulthood; money management; health and wellbeing and life-skills. Benefits for families would include: connecting and socialising with others and having access to 1:1 advice to empower them; enable families to cope and/by reintroducing routine back into their lives; help families lead a normal life and re-engage with everyday activities. Children and young people would benefit having: a safe sensory space to learn to play, helping them integrate into wider society to be confident accessing/using mainstream spaces and so having a positive effect upon their mental wellbeing overall. Having completed the workshops KIT Theatre will invite all pupils to participate in a climate action performance/event at BAC with KIT theatre running sessions onsite at BAC to prepare the young people for the BAC performance event. KIT Theatre states it is seeking to engage young people from less affluent wards and says it has worked closely with Council staff to identify schools that have a high proportion of its pupils accessing free meals. Broadly, the outcomes of the project will be to: (i) close the knowledge gap about climate change/climate action between affluent and less affluent pupils - currently, purportedly, pupils from higher income families have a much higher level of knowledge about climate change/climate action; (ii) increase pupil engagement and raise pupil confidence amongst pupils from less affluent background to hopefully improve school grades/academic outcomes; (iii) KIT theatre are seeking to connect pupils and families from less affluent areas and/via school teachers with the Arts and BAC - in this way reconnecting communities with Arts post pandemic, and widening asceses to the arts overall. CREW Zero Carbon Workshops	Crew Energy would like to help equip residents and business with the know-how and confidence to develop their own green projects. They would do this by running weekly energy efficiency and renewable workshop, within Southside shopping centre, for six months. The 'open drop-in workshops or sessions' would enable residents and businesses to ask CREW questions about technologies like solar PV, heat pumps, smart heating controls, insulation, LED lighting, green walls or heat transfer solutions. Sessions will be 4 hours (12-4 pm and 2 –6pm) alternating, with two staff leading each session. CREW staff (largely volunteers) would provide impartial advice to help people and business' model their own green projects - providing advice about possible named suppliers and installers. Staff would also offer (book-in) free home surveys for people to receive bespoke, personal, green solutions at no cost. In addition: CREW will host evening webinars or seminars on subjects like greening your business, heat pumps in Victorian homes and the economics of solar PV. CREW anticipate that 125 local residents and 25 local businesses would benefit over the six months. Setting themselves the following targets - Domestics: 62 do nothing; 10 adopt solar PV (2.5KWp at 900 hours): 5 adopt a heat pump (15,000 km of heat); 40 adopt smart heating controls (3,000 kWh saved each); 8 adopt loft insulation (2,500 kWh saved each). Commercial: 15 do nothing; 3 adopt Solar PV (30 kWp each); 7 adopt smart heating controls (10,000 kWh saved each). This will result in 83 tonnes of CO2 saved annually or 622 tones by 2030, with cost per tonne of the project to 2030 = £15 per tonne. They are seeking to deliver a multi-art form project that involves commissioning (project managing) artists to deliver workshops** for 200+ residents within Tooting, Balham and Furzedown -** workshop topics: visual art, storytelling, music and craft making. In addition, an associated aim is to make use of items made in the workshops for a parade and exhibition in October, within Tooting Common as part of Streatham Arts Festival e.g. utilising artefacts, banners, flags and choreographed performances from the workshops. At its heart, two-stories would shape the content of this multi-art project – namely, 'Grandpa's Flute' and 'Ogaloussa'. Broadly, the two stories are about cherishing the memory of departed loved ones, and about cooperation, family and community. Overall, they hope that telling these stories will help communities reconnect and come together post-Covid-19, benefitting the 200+ residents during the workshop activity, as well as a further 200-300 people who see the exhibition and parade during Streatham Arts Festival. In principle, the 12 young people would mostly be unaccompanied asylum-seeking children (UASC aged 11-18) so, young refugees living in London without family, largely in foster care or living in supported housing. KLS explain: this group of young people are dealing with the trauma of war and long, arduous journeys to the UK and being separated from family and friends in a foreign country. Covid-19 exacerbated problems faced by this group of young people who largely had no digital access to outside world and/so to their family and friends, being isolated in crowed living conditions. KLS staff, in liaison with Schools attended by the young refugee children have identified 12 young people possibly manifesting severe mental health and communication needs. 						The applicant is seeking to expand its elder outreach offer in two ways and (i) Grow its 'Open House' weekly social group on the Ackroydon Estate by offering new activities, namely 'gardening and planting ' for older people; (ii) Pilot "Sparkle" a one-year intergenerational project to take place in St Stephen's Church that would create an opportunity for local older people to interact with nursery/primary age children and take part in joint activities such as singing, reading, musical movement, gardening, digital exploration or craft, upcycling sessions.

As a yoga practitioner and voice coach, VN drew upon her own experiences of domestic abuse and healing to devise and piolt self-care' workshops over 8 weeks; and states feedback from women attending the workshops was overwhelmingly positive. The project will deliver weekly self-care workshops at Alton Activity Centre, spanning 38 weeks to 15 women living in/arround the Roehampton area. The weekly, 90 minute sessions will provide - yoga, breath work, vocal work, meditation and journaling to music. The female participants will also be given 2 vocal recordings of, Guided Heart Based Meditation (11 minutes and 22 minutes in length) - produced by VN, for women to use at home to support their ongoing healing and recovery. The workshops will be open to women of all ages and from all walks of life, to provide the women a safe place to practise self-care tools, alongside other women facing similar challenges. 2 years of lockdown has negatively impacted women with rates of domestic voice rising substantially during this period. The benefits of yoga, meditation, singing as a group and journaling are well researched and documented. The workshops will both heal and empower the 15 women: improving their mental, emotional and physical, health and wellbeing, helping them to also emerge out of covid-19. The footbridge forms part of a walk around the Common and provides a footpath that leads onto the Thames Towpath, connecting the community from the River Thames and into the heart of the Putney community. Alongside the restoration of the bridge, they would also install new benches to provide a resting place for those who are less able to walk. They are seeking to restore the bridge by October 2022. WPCC would deliver an 'opening event' for the local community, supporters, and Borough Councillors and deliver a 'Health Walk' which they aim would be attended by 40 participants. The Health Walk would celebrate the reintroduction of a circular walk, for those who enjoy walking around the Common and over the Beverley Brook with a map made available to download - map-use would be monitored by the number of downloads. They hope the launch and map would encourage Wandsworth residents take up walking more, depending on demand, the Commons team may continue providing these walks: further restoring access and encouraging use of Wandsworth Green space's which is essential to the community's overall health and wellbeing. MCWO anticipate 55 Somali women and 25 men with high levels of need - specifically, people who have little to no contact with mainstream services will benefit - helping to reduce health inequalities for Somali Wandsworth Residents living in Roehampton and on the Alton Estate.
