As the new Cabinet Member for Housing in a new administration, I recognise the serious responsibility to the residents of the Alton Estate that we have to improve the housing and facilities for this neighbourhood.

It is no secret that as an administration we want to try and deliver more affordable housing. But we have also made clear that it's crucial that any regeneration tackles the lack of community facilities, services and transport links to the area.

Over the summer we have paused the procurement process while we decide on any changes we might make to the scheme that fit our policy priorities. In the autumn we will outline our vision for what this looks like.

POP-UP VACCINATION HUB ON THE ALTON ESTATE

Working in partnership with South West London Clinical Commissioning Group, the Alton Regeneration Team arranged for 6 Portswood Place (also known as the Alton Arts Hub) to become a COVID-19 vaccination walk-in clinic for two days in February and March, for local residents to get their first, second or booster jabs.

NHS staff were also on hand to answer questions about the COVID-19 vaccine, with no pressure to get the vaccine.

At opening time on the initial day, the first two customers attended to receive boosters to enable them to travel to countries in Europe. Martha, a resident who had partly inspired the team to suggest the pop-up, told us how much more convenient it was to get her booster whilst she popped out to the shops!

Over the two days, 14 residents dropped in to receive their jabs, which the staff said was a successful turnout in comparison to other pop-ups they had attended, particularly for the first two doses.







FONTLEY WAY DEVELOPMENT UPDATE


Did you know the scheme will deliver a new residential development on Fontley Way?

We have recently completed the statutory tender process to decide upon a construction management company to lead the build of our new homes on Fontley Way. We are delighted to announce that Stack London has been awarded the contract.

Kevin Otchere, from the Alton Regeneration Team, is the lead Project Officer for this venture. He explained that Stack London were selected as they have ample experience, working alongside Councils and Housing Associations, within London and the Home Counties, as well as for private clients. Stack London presented an impressive tender submission, highlighting open and honest communication as a key factor for successful delivery of a project like Fontley Way.

Michael McCammond, Director at Stack London, told us "We are delighted to be working with Wandsworth to deliver much needed new affordable homes at Fontley Way. We pride ourselves on our ability to continuously exceed the expectations of our customers and we will be working closely with the Wandsworth team to satisfy the requirements of the project."

Talking about his team's thoughts and aspirations for the venture, Michael explained "Fontley Way is a cleverly designed block of maisonettes that utilises efficient floor layouts within a simple reinforced concrete block. The project has both private and shared communal spaces which will be well used by the tenants."



Stack London are no strangers to regeneration schemes, having led the conversion of 42 garage spaces into 12 new apartments for social housing at Surrey Street in Islington for The Hyde Group, and the redevelopment of Portland Drive in Merstham, Surrey, for Raven Housing Trust which involved the demolition of an existing block of apartments over ground floor commercial units as part of a major regeneration programme for the area.

The site of the former One O'Clock Club on Fontley Way will transform into a 14-unit development of council homes, with a mix of 3- and 4-bedroom homes. Two of these properties will be fully adapted for wheelchair users. The new homes will be allocated to secure tenants and resident leaseholders in the regeneration area.

Preliminary work has recently started on site, marking the beginning of the second residential block in the Alton regeneration scheme.



THOUGHTS FROM REVEREND REY



During the Wandsworth Arts Fringe 2022, Holy Trinity Church, Roehampton, hosted a very special musical evening for the community. We asked the Vicar, The Reverend Joshua Rey, for his thoughts on the role of the Church in the community.

"2020, with the pandemic swirling, was just the right moment to be inducted as the eleventh Vicar of Roehampton. What better time to be commissioned to proclaim a message of hope? For that is what the Church is for: to open the doors, turn on the lights, and speak of indestructible hope.

Of course, the Church of England is rooted in the soil, so this has a practical reality. Holy Trinity Church has been a community asset for Roehampton since it was built in 1898 and this year we host, inter alia, pop-up vaccination clinics, a husting, public meetings, a polling station, and tap dance lessons.

On Ponsonby Road, the largest and most beautiful indoor space in the parish - the spire - now lit at night, can be seen miles away. Come on in. As well as the main weekly service on Sundays at 10am, there's Morning and Evening Prayer Monday to Friday at 7.30am and 5.30pm. I live in the Vicarage just over the road.

And if you have a vision for a good community use of the building, please share it. I am particularly interested in projects that bring together different segments of our sometimes-fragmented community.

Of course, though, when you come in and look toward the East you see a reminder that the building is not the Church. It is simply the place where the Church meets: all of us, living and gone to glory,



who for two thousand years have gathered round the table to which Jesus Christ welcomes us.

That is why we seek to serve and unite the community in which we are set. And that is the foundation of the hope we speak of. God came into the world to bring us back to himself; the light that is brighter than the darkness is dark. All are welcome!"



QUEEN OF THE NIGHT! ROEHAMPTON AT THE OPERA

ROEHAMPTON'S MOBILE HUB

Roehampton University, the Alton Regeneration Team and Citizens Advice Wandsworth recently collaborated on a pitch, loosely termed 'communiversity', to bid for money from a Greater London Authority grant to help local communities recover from the COVID-19 pandemic.

The group is working with Fabric-Space, an architectural practice with extensive experience in community-building work, on the project now referred to as 'The Mobile Hub'.

The communiversity team will, in the first instance, consult with residents to find out what initiatives they would like to see and then create mobile community hubs dependant on the results. These







mobile hubs will be known as 'Strange Attractors' because they won't be what people are expecting! An example of a Strange Attractor could be a mobile cinema attached to a bike that could pop up anywhere projecting films onto walls, or it could be a story walk that weaves itself through the estate, inviting people to join. Each 'attractor' will harness the skills and strengths of the community.

The communiversity team were on hand to chat to residents at the library during the Easter Egg-tastic event. Residents were asked to design models or draw what they imagined a Strange Attractor to be.



The Alton Regeneration Team hosted many events in 2021 and we are keen to hear what you enjoyed and what you'd like to see more of.

Since January, we've been gauging opinions by handing of respondents wanting more arts and crafts. 49% out surveys for folk to complete. These have been distributed at The Base Youth Club, Over 60's Café, the weekly information stall and during the various events we've put on. To date we have received over 120 completed surveys and have been very encouraged by the results, which confirm that you already really like what we are doing!

Gardening and Nature activities, such as planting and seed bomb making, have proved popular with 57% of respondents selecting these as their favourite events.

46% of people want to see more environmental and recycling themed pursuits. Overall, events within the Art and Culture section scored the highest, with 71%

of people asked for live theatre and 46% said they'd enjoyed and wanted to see more art installations. Within the Sports and Leisure category, 55% wanted to see the team run another Run, Walk, Scoot mini marathon.

MEET OUR LOCAL EARLY YEARS PARENT CHAMPION!

Wandsworth Early Years Parent Champions work across the borough to spread information about services available to local families.

These parent volunteers give some of their time to chat to other parents and share their experiences in an informal way. They go out to community venues, playgroups and events to talk about local early years services, including information on their eligibility to funded Early Education and the wide range of support available at the borough's children's centres, such as targeted play sessions, health visitors, speech and language therapies and mental health support.

We spoke to **Hayley-Marie Bond**, our local Parent Champion in Roehampton, who was one of the original group of six Parent Champions across the borough to be trained and receive certificates at the start of this year.

HAYLEY, TELL US ABOUT YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY!

I am Hayley; mother of three children aged ten, four, and one. We have lived in Roehampton for 11 years. As a family we really enjoy the beauty of the area's green spaces and proximity to Richmond Park. Additionally, the area works for us because we have access to the local children's centres and youth centres.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A PARENT CHAMPION?

A Parent Champion is just a fancy title to encompass the everyday interactions that most of us parents have with each other! The little chats of advice, the boost in confidence, sharing play ideas, talking about new playgroups we have found, discussing work and childcare, etc.

We are volunteers for Wandsworth Council who just want to encourage and help other parents connect with their council and local early years services. We especially want to encourage parents to look into their entitlement to childcare funding if they have children aged two, three and four, and the Healthy Start Scheme.

My role is to just spread 'the word'. This can be done in a way that is manageable around my personal commitments. We also have our 'work' phone numbers, so we are contactable to parents at suitable times. As parent champions we are not professionals, we are just parents wanting to ensure that other parents are making connections and accessing all that they can when it comes to the play, learning and development services available to them from the council and local community.

The Parent Champion scheme also provides us with relevant and ongoing training, including safeguarding and first aid. Plus, I have regular check-ins with my manager where we share relevant information through a really flexible and laid-back interaction.

WHY DID YOU VOLUNTEER FOR THE ROLE?

I signed up to this role because of passion - I really enjoy speaking to other parents and their children and just helping. Every child and family matters, and I felt this role, along with the council's aim, really does encompass that.

Also, as a full-time parent it was a way to feel connected to a work environment without having the pressure of work commitments, whilst raising my family. The scheme just works really well around my family life and offers the benefit of access to training that may help me with other areas in the future.

The team that we currently have is so amazing. We all support each other, we meet for catchups to discuss anything that we feel needs attention, and in general it's just a great opportunity to work with likeminded people in a community that I love.

WHY ARE LOCAL PARENT CHAMPIONS NEEDED?

I feel like the Parent Champion role really is needed.

Sometimes it's daunting to ask for help or it can be overwhelming to get information from professional services.

A Parent Champion is there purely as a fellow parent. We act as a 'middleperson' and this can be really beneficial to some families that need help making initial engagements with relevant services.

WOULD YOU ENCOURAGE OTHERS TO APPLY TO BE A PARENT CHAMPION?

If you feel like you can help other parents, you love to support your community, or you just feel like you can bring some charisma to the service, then signing up is something you should do! The role really does work around you and your family life. Plus, it's a great team to be a part of!

NIGHT-TIME STRATEGY FOR WANDSWORTH BOROUGH

Wandsworth Council is developing a new Night Time Strategy to help understand how we can make the night time a better experience for everyone living, working, and visiting the borough.

And this includes Roehampton!

From celebration and entertainment, work and rest, safety, and enjoyment of public spaces, the strategy will look at a wide range of issues and solutions. This includes ways we can improve our places through better design, lighting and transport at night. The findings will be used to support our town and local centres, as well as businesses, to make sure they are vibrant, resilient and safe.

Nightlife is an important part of London as a city, but our purpose for this strategy is much wider. We want to understand how things change after dark and identify services that could be provided or improved, like later opening shops, restaurants and laundrettes.

We know everyone spends their time in different ways, so we will be looking at the evening (from 6pm until midnight) and late night (from midnight until 6am).

The strategy will focus on supporting all users of public space at night, including women, non-binary people and night-time workers.
