SUMMARY

This Equality Impact and needs analysis document provides an assessment of the impact of the recommendations in paper 21-351. The key element of this which is the adoption of the final version of the Wandsworth Arts and Culture Strategy and the approval of the phase 1 action plan .

The Arts Council England Joint Cultural Needs Assessment (JCNA) model was used to develop and inform the strategy and associated action plan. The JCNA process is designed to give local communities the opportunity to give voice to their own cultural aspirations and needs in dialogue with cultural organisations and providers. This puts equalities considerations at the heart of the approach ensuring that the voice of all sections of the Wandsworth communities are heard.

The format and approach taken in developing the strategy has also ensured that impact on people with protected characteristics has been assessed and considered in both the key thematic aspects(Place Shaping ,Economic Growth ,Communities and partnerships, Learning and Education, Health and Well Being) but also in the cross cutting access to all elements .

The Access for All element of the strategy ensures that three is a focus throughout the work on access to culture is available to all parts of the community, actively addressing identified needs to improve access, and that extra support is given to the work of improving inclusion and diversity.

During the spring and summer of 2021, the service carried out an extensive consultation exercise focused on cultural organisations, community groups, key stakeholders, and Wandsworth citizens. The consultation responses were in the main very positive with no specific changes results in respect of the protected characteristic groups.

1. Background

The Wandsworth's Arts and Culture Strategy 2021-2031 sets a framework for arts and culture to play a vital role in making Wandsworth a prosperous, healthy, and attractive place to live. It articulates the role that arts and culture has in Wandsworth in bringing people together, reflecting the rich tapestry of communities that have settled in Wandsworth and providing a sense of vitality and belonging,.

The strategy has been developed in partnership with key stakeholders and Wandsworth citizens. The Council was chosen to pilot a new Arts Council England Joint Cultural Needs assessment model, this framework was used to develop the new strategy

The framework uses a place based approach which focuses on developing a strategic response to the cultural and non-cultural needs of the local communities, based on a joint assessment of the actions needed to improve the cultural lives of **all and to reduce inequalities and obstacles to participation** in arts and culture.

The strategy and associated action plan set out the services and initiatives delivered directly by the council, those delivered in partnership with key stakeholders, and those that key partners are planning to deliver to contribute to the achievement of our collective vision.

The Wandsworth's Arts and Culture Strategy 2021-2031 identifies seven strategic goals(five thematic and two cross cutting).

Thematic

- Place Shaping
- Economic Growth
- Communities and partnerships
- Learning and Education
- Health and Well Being

Cross cutting

- Access to all
- Climate Emergency and sustainability

The report also includes the following additional and supplementary proposals :

- 1. To raise the maximum award level for the Arts Theme of the Wandsworth Grant Fund to £10,000 so that it is aligned with the other WGF themes. If approved, this would commence from 1st April 2022.
- Approve the development of three outcomes-based tenders of the value of £20,000 pa for 5 years (with the option to extend for another 3 years) to fill the main gap identified which is to develop the cultural offers available to residents (the three tenders focusing on different ages) that support health and wellbeing.
