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
New children's library in Wandsworth

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Glowing success

The Glow awards celebrate the achievements of care-experienced young people.

The recent 2023 awards saw young people taking home trophies for achievements including academic success, great work ethic and progress in learning. Each winner received a trophy, a certificate and a gift voucher.

Afterwards they enjoyed a DJ, a 3D LED dancefloor, a 360° photobooth and a buffet.

New guidelines mean young people leaving council care in Wandsworth now get extra financial support plus other help such as regular health assessments and mental health support.

Breakfast scheme extended

A pilot scheme to give as many children as possible a healthy hot breakfast is to be extended until the end of this academic year.

Last March Wandsworth launched the scheme in twenty schools in partnership with the charity Magic Breakfast.

Now more than half of the children in the schools taking part in the pilot are enjoying breakfast – including traditional breakfast clubs, breakfast within classrooms before the start of lessons, and ‘grab and go’ breakfast on the way into school.


More than 90 per cent of schools taking part in the pilot said that breakfast helped children’s readiness to learn, and 82 per cent said it helped attendance and punctuality. All the schools agreed the scheme eased pressures on family finances.



The scheme will run until the end of July, and then a decision will be made on how it could continue in the future, including increasing the number of schools taking part.

Cabinet Member for Children Kate Stock went along to West Hill Primary School to see how the scheme is running.

Headteacher Richard Milsom, said: “The difference that it makes to the community is visible. People are going through hard times, and referrals to food banks are increasing. The breakfast club in partnership with Magic Breakfast, which runs daily, is providing the parents with some relief on what they have to fund themselves.”



Children on free school meals can swim for free

More people can swim for free

More people are now eligible for free swimming and junior gym sessions at local leisure and sports centres.

Previously people aged 16 and under on free school meals were eligible, but the scheme has been extended to young people aged 17-18 on free school meals.

If you are eligible, you can enjoy free off-peak adult gym and swim sessions (off-peak is before 5.30pm on weekdays and all day at weekends.)

You can also use the free junior gym, which is open to young people aged 11-15, and can make a free sports booking, such as squash courts, during off peak hours.

In addition, as well as leisure centres run by Places Leisure, the scheme has been extended to sports centres run by Enable.

Adults on Universal Credit and a range of other benefits, as well as asylum seekers, are also eligible for free gym and swim.

Kate Stock, Cabinet Member for Children, said: "We want to make sure the expense of joining a gym or enjoying a swim is not a barrier to keeping fit and active so if you're eligible then sign up for this offer.

"We also want to encourage families to see if they are eligible for free school meals. That will unlock this and other benefits and will help us make sure all children in Wandsworth get access to healthy food."

Meeting the School Food Standards

Ernest Bevin Academy has revolutionised the meals it serves to pupils.

Along with 44 other schools, Ernest Bevin is on the council's contract with new provider Harrison Catering Services. We went along to see what has changed.

Schools must make sure they meet standards set by the government, but some schools find it hard to remove or limit items that are popular and generate good revenue such as pastries, waffles, sausage or bacon baps and rolls.

But Ernest Bevin Academy proves compliance with the standards is possible and pupils and staff enjoy freshly made, tasty, seasonal and affordable food.

The council's new Wandsworth School Food Strategy says schools should provide high quality, fresh, healthy, sustainable and culturally inclusive foods.

Harrison cooks more than 95 per cent of its school food with fresh ingredients, and using sustainably sourced ingredients.

At Ernest Bevin favourite foods include Bombay chickpea & potato chapati roll, Dynamite chicken Po'Boy, chicken tikka chapati and freshly made soups

Jacqueline Mayhew, Ernest Bevin's Business Manager who oversees the food provision, said: "The boys and staff absolutely love the food! Since Harrison became our new catering provider in September 2023, the uptake of the meals amongst the staff has nearly doubled and we have seen an increase in food uptake from students as well. Harrison's ordering process means there is also less packaging waste which we are pleased about.

"At the beginning, we were worried that the boys would miss the pastries but we were delighted with how popular the freshly made mid-morning snacks became. The items just seem to fly off the shelf."

The school is now considering applying for the bronze Healthy Schools award and is already thinking about composting fruit and vegetable peels from the kitchen and using their outdoor space to grow food.





ON YOUR BIKE!

Want to ride your bike to school but don't feel confident?

Learn to Ride is for complete beginners and Bikeability levels 1-3 teach skills for more experienced riders. Level 1 is for Year 5 pupils to develop bike control skills in a traffic-free environment and Level 2 gives lessons to primary school on local roads and can be arranged during the school day. The council also runs Level 2 Bikeability courses during the Easter and Summer holidays at Kimber Skate Park and Tooting Triangle.

More school streets in the pipeline

More schools are to get a School Street as early results show they successfully reduce traffic by school gates and encourage families to try active travel for their school run.

School Streets close the roads outside schools to traffic during pick-up and drop-off time. The aim is to encourage safer and healthier travel to and from schools and help improve air quality.

The council is working with nine schools on potential schemes:

(Meteor site),
Belleville Primary (Northcote site),
Brandlehow Primary,
Oasis Academy,
Heathmere Primary,
Hornsby House School,
St Joseph's Primary
and Swaffield Primary.

Consultations are due to start shortly and, if supported, there could be possible trials in April.

Weaving Out Waste

Schools are teaming up with the council and the Royal College of Art for a new art project and exhibition.

Weaving Out Waste will see Year 4 and 5 pupils from up to 40 primary schools working with artist Caroline Lauvetz.

They'll create an art exhibition exploring the impact of textile waste on the planet, displayed in a public venue in Wandsworth. Each class will create a piece to hang in the exhibition.

It follows a similar project last year, Single Use Planet, which saw a spectacular piece of collaborative art put up in Southside Shopping Centre.

The inspiration for Weaving Out Waste is drawn from Wandsworth's rich history of textile manufacturing along the Wandle River. Each pupil will practice weaving techniques on Wandsworth-sourced reclaimed fabrics to create their individual and unique piece of cloth. They will then be joined together to create a 'river'.

The exhibition will open in the Spring. Keep an eye on the council website for details.

Going green



Schools are being upgraded to make them greener.

The first thing being done is the installation of LED lights at all council-run schools because this will have a quick impact. The aim is to eventually help schools save up to 50 per cent on their energy bills and reduce their carbon footprint by as much as 70 per cent.

Later phases are likely to include better insulation, heat pumps and solar panels. As well as council-funded projects, schools are carrying out their own projects, like tree planting and rain collection.

Poet returns to his roots

Children from 29 Wandsworth schools enjoyed a taste of poetry with Joseph Coelho, the national Waterstones Children's Laureate who grew up in Roehampton.

Joseph returned to his roots to share his tips on how to start writing poetry and being creative with words in a visit to his former primary schools and ARK Putney Academy.

More than 1,000 Year 4 pupils and teachers gathered at Wandsworth town hall's Civic Suite to take part in poetry performances and workshops with Joseph and took the opportunity to ask him questions about his favourite book, when he first became a poet and what inspires his writing.

The following day he gave a performance to Year 7 students before being joined by Year 4 students from 10 different primary schools for interactive poetry sessions.

He said: "It has been a privilege to return to Wandsworth this week and get the opportunity to connect hundreds of children to poetry and writing – inspiring them to express themselves in new creative ways."

National award for talented young pianist

13-year-old Chapman Shum from Wandsworth has been named the 2024 Sense Young Person of the Year.

The Sense Awards recognise the outstanding achievements of people with complex disabilities and the people who support them.

Born in Hong Kong, Chapman encountered unique challenges due to a rare, unidentified genetic condition that left him blind and with speech and learning difficulties, along with symptoms of autism.

Despite these formidable challenges, Chapman is an exceptionally talented pianist and has played at venues across the country, including two recitals at the Westminster Music Library and an appearance on BBC Breakfast.

Chapman said: "Because of a rare disease I was born blind and have a learning and speaking difficulties but I'm a good pianist."

Dad Chun said: "Despite the obstacles posed by his disability, Chapman refuses to let it define him or limit his potential."
