Regeneration Procurement Launch

The council has begun its search for a joint venture (JV) partner to help deliver the regeneration of the Winstanley and York Road estates.

The preferred JV partner will be selected through a competitive selection process according to European Union (EU) procurement law and will enter into a 50/50 JV with the council. The notice - signifying the start of the development partner procurement process and inviting bids - was issued on 11 January 2016. The process is being managed by Bilfinger GVA, who has been working closely with the council on the Winstanley and York Road masterplan for the past three years to achieve the council's and residents' objectives for the area.

The intention is for the winning partner to be selected by December 2016.

Launches Regeneration Publication

York Road resident, Christian Gordon, has published a book investigating the SW11 community and the impact that regeneration will have on local life today and in future.



The project, entitled TS II, was launched at Providence House Youth Club on 19 February. In attendance were Christian's mentor, artist Faisal Abdu'Allah; representatives from the Regeneration Team, the Pump House Gallery and Providence House, all of whom have supported the project; David Jubb, Artistic Director at Battersea Arts Centre; as well as Christian's family and friends from the local area.

The portraits feature stakeholders from the local community holding handwritten messages of their hopes, aspirations and reflections of the regeneration.



Is my home being replaced?

There are thirteen residential buildings on the Winstanley and York Road Estates which are being considered for replacement

The regeneration scheme will be completed in phases so some blocks will be rebuilt before others. One of the first tasks for the council and its selected delivery partner will be to produce a development phasing plan. This plan will be available in early 2017 and will detail the order in which each part of the estate will be rebuilt.

New homes will be built before the outdated blocks are demolished, so households will only need to move once, straight into their new permanent home. It is estimated that the first new homes will be ready on the estates by the end of 2018.



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
