New Shared Ownership homes coming to Battersea

50 new affordable homes are being built alongside the River Thames in the popular Battersea Reach development.

Wandsworth residents and workers will be given priority for the homes which will be available to purchase on a partbuy, part-rent basis next year. The properties are a mix of one-bed and two-bed flats.

Cllr Paul Ellis, Cabinet Member for Housing, said: "This area down the road from Wandsworth Bridge has been transformed in recent years into an exciting new part of the riverside. By enabling the development of this site and others like it across the borough, the council is helping to ensure the delivery of hundreds of new homes for low cost home ownership, prioritised for Wandsworth households."

Juber Ahmad, Sales and Marketing

Manager for Wandle Housing Association, said: "We look forward to working with Wandsworth's home ownership team to deliver these much needed affordable homes for first time buyers."

During 2015/16, 501 homes for shared ownership and low cost rent were built in Wandsworth, more than in the last five years. The construction of 1,740 more is expected within the next three to five years.

Home Ownership Team Improving purchase options for council tenants

Home Ownership Special Wandsworth's Affordable Housing Open Day was a great success!

Hundreds of visitors came to our open day at the Civic Suite in October to find out how they can get on the property ladder.

The council's Home Ownership Team spoke to residents about schemes which can help them buy a home. Financial advisors and legal experts were also on hand to give expert advice and housing associations showcased brand new shared ownership developments.







We can help you get on the property ladder

The Home Ownership Team has a range of sales schemes which can help you buy a home.

What is the best option for you?

House Purchase Grant

A House Purchase Grant of up to £80,000 is available to help eligible Wandsworth council tenants buy in the private sector. This can be a significant deposit towards a new home.

Tenants will need to have a minimum of two years tenancy, a clear rent account and be willing to vacate their council property.

The grant can be used in several ways:

- Towards buying a home anywhere in the UK or abroad
- Towards buying a shared ownership home in the UK
- Towards extending a family member's home in the UK (for example, an extension, annex or loft conversion.)

The amount of grant you could receive depends on the number of bedrooms in your council property and the length of your tenancy. Three years tenancy could qualify you for the full grant, but tenants with only two years tenancy will receive a reduced grant amount. We will carry out a financial assessment to work out the

exact amount of grant you could receive. For example, those living in a two bedroom property with over three years tenancy could receive the maximum grant of £80,000.

£3 million was budgeted to council tenants through the House Purchase Grant in 2016/2017. Funding will begin again in April 2017.

James, who has lived in his council house for 10 years, came to the affordable housing open day to find out about his options. He said:

I want to buy a home, but I don't want to buy my current council property. Having looked at property prices I thought I would never be able to afford the deposit on a home of my own. I spoke to the Home Ownership Team today who told me about the House Purchase Grant which I can use as a deposit for a property on the open market. I can't wait to start looking for properties.

Home Ownership Team Improving purchase options for council tenants

Right to Buy

Right to Buy allows Wandsworth council tenants to buy their council property at a discount to the market price.

Complete our Right to Buy application form. We will then arrange for a property valuation and let you know how much you can buy your home for. The discount can count as a deposit when seeking a mortgage.



Shared Ownership

Shared Ownership helps those living or working in Wandsworth to buy an affordable percentage of a property.

Shared Ownership allows you to buy a percentage of a property and pay rent to top up the rest. This is an affordable way to get on the property ladder. Instead of needing a mortgage to buy all of a property, you only need a deposit and mortgage for an affordable amount (for example, you could buy 25% of a property worth £600,000 for £150,000.) You then pay an affordable rent amount to the Housing Association.

Anyone living or working in Wandsworth with a household income of up to £90,000 could be eligible.

Eligible council tenants can use the House Purchase Grant towards buying a Shared Ownership Property and will get priority on Shared Ownership developments in the borough.

Right to Part Buy – January Launch!

Right to Part Buy is an innovative new scheme to help Wandsworth council tenants buy their property.

From next year, eligible tenants who can't afford the full price of their council home will instead be able to purchase a share of it at a discounted price and pay a low rent on the rest.

There will be the chance to purchase additional shares when you can afford them, up to 100% of the property over time. This unique offer for council tenants is an affordable option for those looking to buy.

I've been considering buying my council property for a while now. My sister lives with me, so we wanted to know if we could buy the property together. The Home Ownership officers were extremely helpful. They told me that as she has lived with me for over twelve months we could apply to buy together. I am going to go home now and complete the forms! I can't wait till we can call our home our own.

Sam and Cat are privately renting in Balham but would like to own their own home. They came to learn about Shared Ownership. Sam said:

> We'd heard about Shared Ownership, but didn't know much about it. After

speaking with the Home Ownership Team today we are clued up. It sounds like the perfect solution for us as we can't afford to buy outright, but don't want to move out of the London.

Cat said: We also spoke to several housing associations who have given us information about upcoming developments. We're going to put our names on the council's home ownership register straight away so we can then begin to contact housing associations about viewing properties.

Money advice on your doorstep

The council's financial inclusion team visited the local housing office in Roehampton earlier this year to give expert advice to residents.

Mr Cook, a local pensioner, saw an article in the last issue of Homelife and came to see if the team could help him.

"Even though I am careful with my money, I was struggling to keep on top of my bills.

"The team told me that I'm eligible for Housing Benefit and Council Tax Reduction, neither of which I was receiving. They also told me that I may qualify for Attendance Allowance as I am over-65 and have mobility issues.

"The officer made phone calls on my behalf and helped me apply for these benefits. I'm hard of hearing which makes it difficult for me to speak to people on the phone. I can't thank the team enough for the time and care they took to help me.

My council tax account is now over ± 1000 in credit and my rent account is ± 700 in credit. I no longer worry about how I am going to pay the next bill."

Helen Meehan, Financial Inclusion Team Manager said: "It is vital that we reach people like Mr Cook. He was extremely worried about his finances, but now he is receiving all the benefits he is eligible for he can manage his monthly outgoings and is even managing to save a little.

£4000 fine for noisy parties

A Roehampton woman who disturbed her neighbours with a weekend of late night noise has been taken to court and fined more than £4,000.

The woman from Frensham Drive threw a weekend-long party in March. Council noise patrollers were contacted about the disturbance at 2.40am on the Saturday morning. Despite an officer visiting and asking for the noise to be kept down, continued shouting, screaming and loud music were heard throughout the night.

The next day at 3.55am, the early hours of Sunday morning, fresh complaints were received about a second night of disturbance.

The 25-year-old was prosecuted for causing unreasonable noise nuisance to her neighbours. The Magistrates Court ordered her to pay a total of £4,176 in fines and legal costs for the offences.

Housing spokesman Cllr Paul Ellis said: "This is a hefty fine imposed by the court which obviously felt that the woman's complete and utter disregard for her neighbours warranted such a heavy penalty. "This case should act as a warning to anyone who thinks they can cause such problems. If you choose to behave in a wholly selfish and unreasonable manner and inflict this kind of late night disturbance on those living around you then the courts have signalled that this kind of tough sentence may await you."

How to report noise nuisance from a council property: We can deal with persistent and unreasonable noise such as barking dogs, DIY, loud music and TVs. To report noise that is happening now – contact the council's 24 hour emergency response team on 020 8871 7490 (OUT OF HOURS) or contact your area team (weekdays, 9am-5pm).

Get Christmas wrapped up!

Are you ready for Christmas? From presents to food, the costs can add up quickly. Read our top tips to manage your money and have a stress-free Christmas.

- Budget Work out what you can afford to spend and manage your family's expectations. Use a budget planner online at www.moneyadviceservice.org. uk/en/tools/budget-planner
- ★ Remember regular payments it's easy to forget about everyday bills over the festive period. Pay your rent, council tax, gas and electric bills before spending on Christmas. There may be serious consequences of nonpayment for the upcoming year. Keep an essential bills diary and stick to it.
- Write a list (and check it twice) work out who you need to buy for and how much you will spend on each person. Avoid last minute purchases.

Do you need to get presents for everyone? Speak to family or friends about buying presents for children only or agree a spending limit of £5-10. Others may also be grateful of this plan.

- ★ Don't buy too much food write a list of what you need and for how many people. Wasting food is a waste of money.
- ★ Bargain hunt keep an eye out for discounts and sales, but do not buy things just because they are '50% off'. Shop around and visit cheaper supermarkets for bargains.

- * Send emails instead of posting greetings cards (you'll help the environment too!)
- ★ Reduce your non-essential spending during the lead up to Christmas, for example eating out and going to the cinema – there's always plenty of films on TV over the Christmas holidays so have a film night at home instead.
- ★ Check you receive all the benefits you're entitled to. Every year families are going without money that they are entitled to and struggling needlessly. Visit www.entitledto.co.uk
- Don't panic do not take out credit or loans. Short of cash? Sell what you no longer need on marketplace websites.

Tenancy Support could help you

In October, the Tenancy Support Team held drop-in sessions for vulnerable council tenants.

Tenancy Support can help vulnerable Wandsworth Council tenants or those having difficulties managing their tenancy. For example, tenants with a disability or ongoing medical condition, older tenants and those younger than 20 years old.

The team work with clients to help them regain independence and fully manage their home.

Dave, Tenancy Support Officer said: "By providing drop-in sessions we can make our services accessible to more. Whether it is assistance completing a form or more complex benefit assistance, there are a range of ways Tenancy Support can help. For example, Michael came to see us as he risked eviction due to increasing rent arrears. He has struggled with mental health issues since experiencing a traumatic accident and finds it difficult to cope with everyday matters.

"Michael was not receiving the correct benefits. His daughter had recently moved back in with him and he needed to have his benefits reassessed.

"I liaised with Housing Benefit Team and ensured that Michael would receive the correct payments. I also helped him to apply for a payment of £200 from a charity to purchase furniture, and helped him claim the child tax credit he was entitled to. Michael has since been able to reduce his rent



arrears and lives independently with his daughter."

Michael said: "This service has been life changing. With help from the Tenancy Support Service and my Estate Manager my home has been transformed. I am now aware of what benefits I am entitled to and receiving them. I have paid off my rent arrears and have bought new furniture for my daughter's bedroom. I can't thank the team enough."

Swap and Move

Wandsworth council tenants can get FREE membership with popular mutual exchange site.

We are working in partnership with Swap and Move, a mutual exchange website for council and housing association tenants looking to move home.

Do you want to downsize, find a larger home, move closer to family or move for a new job? A mutual exchange could be a quick and simple way of getting the home you need.

Mutual exchanges are when existing tenants living anywhere in the UK swap properties with each other. Perhaps you'd like a smaller home to save costs, while a larger family may be looking for more space. One simple move can give both families their ideal home.

Once you've found a suitable exchange, it's easy to swap – both households just need written consent from their landlord (your council or housing association).

Swap and Move helps council and housing association tenants to exchange their homes. The service matches you with other home



swappers locally or nationally depending on your needs.

From March 2017, if you are signed up to our old service provider, Homeswapper, you will need to pay a subscription fee of £12 for 3 months, £16 for 6 months and £24 for 12 months. Alternatively, we recommend you register for Swap and Move as soon as possible as it is free for all Wandsworth Council tenants.

Amanda, is a council tenant who recently signed up to Swap and Move. She said: "The website is great. It's really easy to sign up and matches you with homes which meet your needs. There's an app too, which makes it easy to browse on my phone."

To find someone to swap homes with, you can register for free with Swap and Move (www.swapandmove.co.uk) or house exchange (www.houseexchange.org.uk).

If you are worried about keeping warm this winter contact WRAP for advice and support.

WRAP can help to put you in touch with a wide range of services which provide advice and support on benefits, heating costs, energy efficiency, falls prevention, befriending services and much more.

- Book a WRAP Winter Warmth assessment including FREE energy saving measures such as electricity monitors and radiator reflector panels (those who are on a low income, have a long term condition or disability, or are aged 65+ are eligible)
- Get your flu vaccine available from your GP and some pharmacies www.nhs.uk/flu
- Plan ahead make sure you have a supply of your prescription medication in case of bad weather
- Always complete your whole course of prescription medicines

- If you feel unwell, get immediate advice and help from a pharmacist, before it gets too serious. Visit www.nhs.uk/staywell for more information
- Have hot meals and drinks stock up on tinned, dried and frozen foods so you can make a hot healthy meal even if you can't get out of the house in bad weather
- Wear layers a few thin layers of clothing will keep you warmer than one thick layer and tuck curtains behind the radiators to keep heat in the room
- Keep moving if you can as this will help you keep warm. If walking is a problem try moving your arms or legs whilst sitting or wiggling your toes and fingers.

Garages make way for new family council homes

New council homes are being built in West Hill as part of a long-running programme to make the best use of council land

We are building two semi-detached council houses on the site of six garages and nine storage sheds on Limpsfield Avenue.

The affordable two-storey family homes which each have three bedrooms will be for low cost rent. They will also have energy efficient boilers and solar panels to reduce the cost of energy bills.

Demolition work is under way and the new homes are expected to be completed by the middle of next year.

Across the borough, the council have built more than 250 homes on unused council land. At the end of the year, we will start building another 57 homes in Battersea as part of plans to build at least 300 within the next three to five years.

Cllr Paul Ellis, Cabinet Member for Housing, said: "For more than a decade now whilst others have been talking about the



need for new affordable homes, we in Wandsworth have been getting on with building them, whether for home ownership or, as in this particular case, for rent.

"This development is another example of our long-standing commitment to building new homes through making more efficient use of land on the borough's housing estates."

There was a total of 501 affordable homes built in Wandsworth in last year. We forecast that 1,740 affordable homes will be completed over the next three to five years.



Savona estate gets brand new playground

The new and improved playground at Seldon House is officially open.

The playground, which was in desperate need of refurbishment, has been given a complete make over. The old equipment has been replaced with brand new facilities, including a new roundabout, swings and scramble net.

Faulty appliances: warning from Fire Brigade

The London Fire Brigade has issued a warning to anyone with a Whirlpool tumble dryer.

Whirlpool has recalled faulty machines across the UK after identifying a safety defect. The machines affected come under the brand names Indesit, Hotpoint, Creda and Proline.

The London Fire Brigade is telling people to stop using any appliance that is subject to product recall or safety notice until it has been checked and repaired or replaced.

London Fire Commissioner Ron Dobson said: "If my kitchen had one of the recalled goods in it, I would unplug it straight away until it has been checked and repaired. We attend nearly one fire a day involving white goods. While there is a fire risk people should not use their appliance until it has been checked and repaired. If your appliance is subject to a safety or recall notice or you think there is something wrong with it our advice is simple. Unplug it immediately and contact the manufacturer or a qualified repair technician."

Online services make it easier to report problems

Residents found it easy to report and track a repair online!

Earlier this year we asked residents about their experience reporting repairs and anti-social behaviour to the council.

We conducted two satisfaction surveys – one with tenants who had recently raised a repair and the other with residents who had recently reported an incident of anti-social behaviour.

When asked as part of the repairs survey, overall satisfaction with the council was high. With **73%** of respondents happy with the services provided by the council as a landlord and **72%** satisfied with the way the local area is run. Some more of the key findings from the two surveys were:

Repairs

- 72% of those surveyed are satisfied with the repairs service overall.
- The highest levels of satisfaction are with the attitude of workers (89%), keeping dirt and mess to a minimum (85%), the ease of reporting a repair (84%) and helpfulness of staff (83%).
- Satisfaction with the overall condition of the block has risen from 65% to **70%** in just two years.

• **86%** of those who had used the online services for reporting and tracking repairs said it was easy to use.

Anti-Social Behaviour

- **69%** of those who reported anti-social behaviour say they were told what course of action would be taken in response to their complaint during their initial contact with the council.
- Litter and noise nuisance remain the most commonly cited problems.
- Three quarters of respondents would report anti-social behaviour to the council in the future if necessary.
- The main areas which you said we could focus on to improve our work to tackle anti-social behaviour are speed of resolving complaints and outcomes of the action taken.

Millions of people eligible for free help during a power cut

As the dark nights draw in, it is important to know that help is available during a power cut.

UK Power Networks, who deliver electricity to your home, run a Priority Services Register for those who may need extra assistance during a power cut.

The register is designed for those who are elderly, rely on power for medical needs, have a disability or carer, have young children or live with an elderly relative.

Director of Customer Services Matt Rudling said: "I'm sure every one of us knows somebody who could benefit from being on the register, whether it be a friend, relative or neighbour. While power cuts are rare these days – the networks are 99.99% reliable - there's no harm in being prepared.

"Most people know to keep a torch handy, to keep an old-fashioned corded phone which will still work without power, and that most modern fridges and freezers can stay cold for up to eight hours. But for those who need extra help or have concerns, being on the register is another way you can get prepared and save any unnecessary worry.

"Our team is geared up to help as many people as possible. Being on the register doesn't mean we can get your power back on quicker, but it does mean we know about your situation and will be able to get you additional help and support including updates about how we're getting on with fixing the problem."

If you're on the register you can access extra help services including:

- A 24 hour priority phone number
- A dedicated team who will contact you to keep you updated during a power cut
- Tailored support such as home visits and hot meals
- Letting your friends or family know there's been a power cut at your home
- In certain scenarios we may also offer a free hotel overnight and transport to the hotel

New telephone number launched to report power cuts

You can now dial 105 to report a problem

When the power goes out, it can leave people feeling unsure about what to do. So a new phone number has been launched. Dialling 105 will now connect you to your local electricity network operator.

The electricity in your area is covered by UK Power Networks who own and maintain electricity cables and lines across London, the South East and East of England to make sure your lights stay on. Dialling 105 will get you straight through to UK Power Networks.

105 is available to all electricity customers in England, Scotland and Wales. It doesn't matter who you choose to buy electricity from anyone can call 105.

You can also call 105 if you spot damage to electricity power lines and substations that could put them, or someone else, in danger. If there's a serious immediate risk, the emergency services should be called too.

Yvette, chair of the new RA said: "The idea for the association came about when I saw some of our residents planting flowers and herbs. The appreciation and pride they have in our estate was a joy to see. Voluntary work around the estate has made us more social and created a greater sense of community spirit. Along with the other committee members, I am excited to bring together more residents and come up with ideas to improve our estate."

Katie, chair of the new RA said: "There were several reasons for setting up the RA. I felt this would help us get to know our neighbours and bring a community feel to our block, whilst at the same time allowing us to work more effectively with the council to bring about positive changes to our block.

Do you live in a block with orange lidded recycling bins? If so, we need you!

Recycling isn't just good for the environment; it also saves money which could be better spent on council services. Every tonne recycled saves the council £120. Many households who use communal orange lidded recycling bins are not recycling as much as they could!

The average household who uses this type of bin produced 660kg of waste last year, but only 12% of this was recycled!

Recyle correctly

of **recycling in orange lidded bins last year** was **ontaminated** and therefore **could not** be recycled



DO make sure you know what can and can't be put in these bins. **DO** rinse food containers and cans before recycling. Otherwise they cannot be recycled.



DON'T include plastic film or carrier bags (these can both be recycled at large supermarkets)

DON'T include old clothes (these can be recycled and donated at clothes banks)

What can we recycle more of?

The graph below shows how Wandsworth residents are recycling at the moment and how much more we can improve on this.





Putting the wrong things in your orange-lidded recycling bin can prevent the whole bin from being recycled.
