

Improving homes for thirty years

The council's home improvement agency celebrates three decades of adapting and improving residents' homes.

The agency marked the milestone at its annual training day. Cllr Paul Ellis, who hosted the event explained the many benefits that the scheme brings to older and disabled residents in the borough, "The Home Improvement Agency has given vital support to around 3,000 residents in its 30 years of service by keeping homes accessible, warm and safe.

"The service was created to ensure that our more vulnerable residents could continue to live in their own homes. By offering advice to residents about adapting, maintaining and repairing their homes over the last three decades, we have helped them make choices about where they live and more importantly remain safe and retain their independence."

The home improvement agency offers assistance with improvements and adaptations. This might include offering advice on building works such as installing a ramp, so residents have easy access to their front doors or hand rails and shower rooms to make everyday living more convenient and safer at home.

Free dog micro chipping

The new law means that by April 2016 all dogs aged six weeks or over must be micro chipped.

Those who fail to have their dog micro chipped can be prosecuted with a maximum fine of £500.


Repairs online form launched


A new online form has been launched so you can report repairs easily.

It means you can report a non-urgent repair to your property from your home using a laptop or while you're on the go using a tablet or mobile at any time of the day or night.


There's no need to register or login. Just fill in a quick form, you'll receive an email confirmation* and your request will be dealt with.

Leaseholders can only report communal repairs (not repairs to your own home).

Housing advice at your fingertips

You can now get housing advice online with our new web service.

You have the chance to get housing advice from the comfort of your own home thanks to the council's new housing options online form. This new service gives you information about the housing choices open to you based on your personal circumstances.

Simply fill in the online form and it instantly provides a range of housing options based on your own current circumstances. For example, this might range from advising you to consider applying for a transfer, private renting, applying for social housing or buying a home to contacting us for more detailed information and assistance.

No need to phone the council or wait for an appointment. Whatever your circumstances the housing options form will make it easier for you to know your next step.

The form is not intended for people:

- who are without housing now or will lose their home in the next two days
- at immediate risk of harm (including domestic violence or abuse) or



• aged under 18 without children (contact children's services for further advice).


Sign up for new online service portal

Money advice service





The regeneration of the Alton area has moved another step after planning guidance was accepted.

The Roehampton Supplementary Planning Document (SPD) was voted through unanimously by all political parties of the council. The document provides strong guidance for residents, stakeholders and developers on the level and type of development the council wants to see in that part of Roehampton.

The SPD, based on the Alton area masterplan, sets out eight core principles to guide regeneration, including building highquality housing, improving infrastructure, delivering a highquality landscape and improving access and connections. It also includes planning guidance for four sub-areas to help shape the development of the these spaces in more detail.

Additionally, central government ministers have confirmed that Allbrook House and the library will not become listed buildings. This site has been earmarked for new homes, a community facility, village green and library. So, the decision to reject the listing application means regeneration plans to revive the area can now proceed unaffected.

Cllr Ravi Govindia, leader of the council said, "These are important decisions for Roehampton, we are pleased that the listing application has been rejected by government and Historic England and the planning document was voted through by the council. It means our ambitions to improve this housing estate can move ahead with selecting a development partner to help us carry out these vital improvements."

Help paying your major works charges

Major works are normally larger project designed to prolong the life of our housing stock and keep it in a good state of repair.

Council loans

The council has a deferred repayment scheme to help owner occupiers pay for works. You must live in the property to be eligible for this scheme. The term of the loan varies from 2 to 25 years, depending on the nature of the work. Department for Work and Pensions (DWP)

If you are a pensioner on a low income you may be entitled to pension credit or if you are in receipt of income support or job seekers allowance, you may be entitled to assistance from the DWP to pay towards your service charges and any major works bills.

To make a claim, you will need to send the DWP copies of your bills, the summary of costs and any Major Works Section 20 Notice. The DWP will confirm if you are eligible under their guidelines. It is best to make any application as soon as possible otherwise your claim may be delayed or refused. However, you should not withhold payment while your claim is being assessed.

Want to vote for Mayor of London?

Make sure you are registered!

Mayoral and London Assembly elections are taking place on 5 May 2016. If you want to vote in these elections you must be registered.

Those who have recently moved, anyone renting their property and young people are the least likely to be registered. If you are not on the electoral register, you need to visit

www.gov.uk/register-to-vote straightaway to make sure you can vote next year.

British, Irish, Commonwealth and European Union citizens are all eligible to vote. Registering can also be beneficial to your credit rating.

Find out about major works online

You can now find out what major works are planned in your community through the council's new online service.

The future major works service is easy to use. Simply insert your postcode or estate name to find out if there are any major works, such as window or roof

renewals, replacement of heating and hot water systems or communal decorations planned on your block or estate.

You can also find out when the works are likely to begin (subject to resident consultation) and also which blocks or properties are affected on the estates.

More homes and businesses set for Wandsworth

A new-look Wandsworth town centre is starting to take shape including hundreds of new homes, new public squares, a better library and improved one-way system.

Highlights from the area's fast-moving regeneration programme include transforming the long-derelict Ram Brewery site into a new pedestrian quarter complete with a micro-brewery, shops, restaurants and hundreds more homes.

Work is also set to start on three sites next to the old burial ground on Garratt Lane. This will see several 1960s office blocks replaced with 200 homes, a new state-ofthe-art library, public square and a play area for under-fives. A quarter of the new homes will be offered to eligible local residents to rent or buy at a discounted rate.

Finally, the transformation of Wandsworth town centre also includes a complete redesign of Wandsworth oneway system to reduce traffic on the high street and make the town centre more pedestrian-friendly. Rogue landlord brought to book

A landlord and property agent have been fined almost £10k for breaching bedsit regulations.

Mr Javaid Akhtar, the owner and his managing agent, Mr Zahoor Mansoor, who failed to declare they were letting a series of bedsits at an address in Tooting, have been prosecuted and fined after the council took legal action.

The owner and agent failed to apply for a HMO licence and disclose that they were renting out eight bedsits in a three storey end-of-terrace house in Rectory Lane, Tooting. Houses in multiple occupation, such as this one, must have a licence to ensure legal safety regulations are met.

The HMO licence makes sure that where large numbers of non-related people live under the same roof, the building can be inspected to make sure it is safe, not overcrowded and complies with fire safety regulations.

Both men pleaded guilty to breaching the Housing Act 2004 when they appeared before magistrates. Mr Akhtar was ordered to pay £7,120 in fines and court costs and Mr Mansoor £2,550.

Cllr Paul Ellis, the cabinet member for housing said: "This legislation was introduced to make sure that tenants are fully protected from landlords who might want to cram in too many tenants or cut corners on safety. Residents considering renting this type of accommodation should always ask to see the owner's HMO license."



Get ready for winter

Ten tips for keeping warm, healthy and safe

- Have a flu vaccine. They are available from your GP or some pharmacies. www.nhs.uk/flu
- Plan ahead check your electric blanket is safe, make sure you have enough of your prescription medicine and stock up on tinned, dried and frozen food in case you can't get out in bad weather.
- Wear layers several layers of thin clothing will keep you warmer than one layer of thick clothing and tuck curtains behind radiators – it helps keeps the heat in.
- Have hot meals and drinks they will help keep you warm and keep moving as much as possible.
- Try to keep your home to a minimum of 18C (64F) which is the safe level for your health.
- Vulnerable people can sign up for the UK Power Networks free priority register. This will mean you get help guickly during a power cut. www.ukpowernetworks.co.uk
- Download the Keep Warm Keep Well leaflet for more tips. www.wandsworth.gov.uk/keepwarm
- If it is snowy or icy the council will grit roads and pavements, but you can also do it yourself. Find out how, and see the locations of your neighbourhood grit bins. www.wandsworth.gov.uk/snow
- Cold weather increases the risk of heart attacks, strokes, breathing infections and falls. If the weather turns cold, keep an eye on elderly neighbours or family members.
- Find out how to avoid damp and mould and get tips on heating and insulation at www.wandsworth.gov.uk/damp

More than a thousand people flocked to Wandsworth's Affordable Housing Open Day in October.

Buying in London's fast-paced housing market can be daunting and seem impossible to first-time buyers who are perhaps renting and trying to save for a hefty deposit too. But, the council's commitment to the affordable housing programme and our expert team make sure that both lower cost homes are developed and priority is given to residents living and working locally.



The open day was a huge success with well over a thousand visitors.



Meet the team

The home ownership team were extremely busy throughout the day, offering advice about the council's schemes to help residents realise their dream of buying a home in our vibrant, exciting and popular borough.

Who can we help?

Whether you're a council, housing association or private renting tenant we can help you – as long as you live or work in the borough, are a first time buyer and your maximum household income is £71,000 (for a one or two bedroom) or £85,000 (for a three bedroom or more).

Paulina Purska came along with her baby Viktor (9mths), she had a chance to speak to the cabinet member for housing, Cllr Ellis, about her future housing aspirations.

"Me and my partner have been renting privately for eight years. Now we've had a baby we'd like to buy a home but it's so expensive in London. I went along to find out what help is available for couples with a young family.

"The team have been really helpful. It sounds like shared ownership is a real possibility. I've got the forms and once I've discussed it with my partner, we'll probably register so we can take our first steps into home owning."





Alex and his partner Debbie are expecting their first child and were hoping to buy a new home but were undecided whether to buy their council flat or buy on the open market.

Alex explained, "I rent a one-bedroom council flat, which I could buy through right to buy – but we're expecting our first child so we're interested in buying a bigger family home anywhere in Wandsworth or London. We wanted to see what other options are available for us. The presentation and

question and answer sessions were really useful and put the different council schemes into context and explain in more detail about the range of help available.

"But, the best part was that everything was under one roof. It's a useful combination to have financial, legal and housing advisers all together."

Steven King, a young professional, who lives in a privately rented house-share in Balham.

"I've been renting a house with four people in Balham for several years and I'm ready to move onto the next stage and buy my own place.

"The event has been really useful and I'm hoping it'll be my way of getting on to the property ladder. I've had a chat with the mortgage advisers and



have a home ownership pack so I can register for a shared ownership scheme, so let's see what happens."



Big discounts with right to buy

Right to Buy gives you the chance to buy your council home with a huge discount.

You can get up to £103,900 discount through the council's Right to Buy scheme. If you've lived in your council home for three years or more why not contact us to find out about buying your home.

The Right to Buy scheme helps council tenants purchase their council property.

Right to buy mobility grant

Right to Buy Mobility is similar to both our right to buy and house purchase grant schemes.

It's where you qualify for right to buy but decide to buy on the open market. You may be eligible for a grant that you can use towards buying a property on the open market.

This scheme gives the added benefit and flexibility of moving elsewhere.

House purchase grants

This scheme offers a grant of up to £80,000 to qualifying council tenants who want to:

- buy a house on the open market or
- extend a family property that they will move into or
- use the discount towards a deposit for a shared ownership property.

The amount of grant awarded depends on the size and how long you've lived in your council property.

Shared ownership

This is one of the most popular ways to buy a home for those hoping to own their own place. It's a financially easier option where you can buy and rent at the same time. It gives you a chance to buy at a rate you can afford. You buy shares in your new home and can buy more as your income increases.



A council grant has been put to good use by green fingered community gardeners.

Wendelsworth RA was awarded a council grant of £14,000 earlier this year to improve their community garden. The newly designed garden means residents can grow fruit and vegetables organically and it has increased environmental stability in the area.

Their garden also has the added benefit of providing a lovely

Stephanie, co-chair of Wendelsworth RA said: "The garden is a talking point for people on the estate. Regeneration office opens it doors

Residents living in the Winstanley and York Road regeneration area will now find it easier to keep in touch with what is happening as the council has opened a local office at Pennethorne Square, Battersea.

The Winstanley and York Road estates' regeneration team will be available at the new office and residents will benefit from having council officers available on their doorstep.

Philip Morris, regeneration project manager, said "Opening a local office is the next step in ensuring that residents of Winstanley and York Road estates are kept as fully informed as possible about the regeneration proposals that affect their community.

"The office, being in the heart of their community, offers a convenient way for residents to give feedback and contact us. Having a local team on hand means they will be available to answer questions and deal with queries, whilst also ensuring that residents remain well informed about the ongoing redevelopment process.

"It is open for drop-in sessions, appointments and we hope it will become a local hub for residents affected by the regeneration programme."

The council's ambitious regeneration programme, which was supported by 70 per cent of residents who responded to the consultation, will see millions of pounds invested into the area. The redevelopment includes replacement of all social rent homes affected, around a hundred and fifty

new social rent homes in the area, new homes for resident leaseholders, around 1.400 new homes for a mix of affordable rent and buy, private rent and private for sale homes and the refurbishment of two existing tower

These new homes will be provided in a design based on streets, courtyards and squares with a new leisure centre. library and community centre, new shops, businesses and play areas and a remodelled, improved York Gardens. The changes will transform the existing estates into a new vibrant residential neighbourhood.

As well as extensive and far reaching physical regeneration the plans also aim to create employment, training and mentoring opportunities to help local people reach their full potential and improve the health of the community.

Currently, the council is working alongside residents and agencies to secure a procurement partner to implement the regeneration works, further information will be available online, by e-newsletter or from the

Paris Penman-Davies, a 26 year old in sports marketing, bought his one-bedroom apartment at Embassy Gardens earlier this year. He previously lived in Battersea with his family, "I registered with Wandsworth Council in February and I moved in mid-September, so it really was an incredibly quick and easy process."

Paris continues, "I bought the apartment through shared ownership because I don't think I could have purchased on the open market as London is a challenging place for a young person. If it wasn't for a scheme like this, I would never have had the chance to get onto the ladder.

"My apartment at Chancery Building is a new build; it's modern and built to a high specification. The price I'm paying here would get me a small studio in Balham with no hot water – whereas here, I'm on the fifth floor of a beautifully designed apartment with a gorgeous view overlooking south London."

Chancery Building at Embassy Gardens is just one of dozens of exciting developments in the Nine Elms area, which is set to create 25,000 jobs, new business, housing and more travel choices through the Northern Line extension.
