Equipment helps children walk

Greenmead Primary School is the first school in the UK to have an innovative piece of equipment after a fundraising drive raised £31,000.

An Innowalk is a specialist piece of mobility equipment that allows children who have complex physical disabilities the opportunity to move and exercise. The school has bought one thanks to help from friends and families of the school, plus a donation from the Victoria Foundation.

Children who are often very stiff from sitting in their wheelchairs and who often struggle with their breathing and chest infections have benefitted enormously from having time on the Innowalk built into their physiotherapy programmes. One pupil said he "feels like Usain Bolt..... I can do 800 meters."

High View gets even better

Pupils at High View Primary School are enjoying a

brand-new library and an upgraded playground.

The school received £4,500 from the Foyle Foundation to buy books for the colourful new library and learning space, dubbed 'Battersea Beach' because of its bright yellow floor. High View has a strong focus on reading for pleasure and the library has proved a real inspiration, with children excited to choose their own books to take home.

Another grant of £8,000 from Tesco's Bags of Help scheme has helped transform the reception playground with a new artificial grassy area, climbing frames and new outdoor learning equipment. Pupils will be able to involved with gardening activities using specially-designed childfriendly planters.



Georgina Roberts Headteacher said:

Visitors to High View are often surprised at how light, bright and colourful our school is and these newly developed spaces are making use of every bit of space to help our children love to learn.



How to apply to a Wandsworth school

Need to choose a primary or secondary school for your child? We answer your questions.

Which is the best school for my child?

- Pick some schools that look interesting and do your research. Look at their website and read their entry in the council's Choose a Wandsworth School brochure (available online at wandsworth.gov.uk/admissions).
- Go on the Ofsted website find it on gov.uk and see if the school has had a recent inspection. This will tell you about results, the culture of the school, the effectiveness of its leadership and teaching and what parents and pupils think of it.
- Look at the chatter on sites such as mumsnet and nappyvalley.
- See if there's any open days coming up where you can visit the school and see if for yourself.
- As well as results, think about things like pastoral care and extra-curricular activities and practical matters such as the distance from your home if it's too far away it might be difficult for children to go to after-school clubs if they face a long journey late at night.

How do I know if my child is eligible for the school I chose?

Go on the school's website and look at its admission policy. Admission policies are also available at wandsworth.gov.uk/admissions. See if it requires an entrance exam or proof of religious affiliations. People living nearer get priority. Be realistic about your chances of getting your child in.

Being in the nursery class does not mean your child will automatically get a place in that school's reception. To qualify for a sibling place, the older child must still be at the school at the start of the academic year in which the younger child will start.

How do I apply?

Apply online at wandsworth.gov.uk/admissions. Wandsworth Council coordinates admissions for Wandsworth residents – including applications for schools in other boroughs and free schools.

You can choose six. Put them in order of priority. Be careful - putting fewer schools down will not increase your chances of getting your first choice, but it will make it more likely to get none of your choices.

Some schools require a supplementary application form - the online application system will tell you if any of your choices do.

Primary School admissions deadline 15 January 2018

Secondary School admissions deadline 31 October 2017



What happens next?

After your application is received, the council will allocate your child a place based on published admission criteria. If more than one school can offer a place, you will be offered whichever one of those schools was listed highest on your form.

You will need to accept or reject the offer. Don't reject the offer unless you've got a place lined up elsewhere. The school will contact you to make any further arrangements prior to the start of the autumn term.

What if I don't get the school I want?

You can appeal. Details on how to do this are at wandsworth.gov.uk/admissions. You can also be put on a waiting list for any school you choose and check your position on the list on the admissions page.

Hubbab Nasir, 16, is the 2017 Wandsworth Young Person of the Year.

Hubbab, who attends Graveney School, picked up a trophy, certificate and cheque for £500. She received the award for her achievements, leadership and drive, and her commitment to helping others. While working for her A-Levels she is part of the two-year Kings College Law Mentoring Programme. She has also led teams to success in national and international business and innovation competitions, and volunteers in her local community, including for the British Heart Foundation.

She works with the police to engage with young people and has developed out-of-school sports activities to keep young people out of trouble. On top of all that she is a published poet through the 2016 First Story Programme.

Hubbab said: "I did not expect to win at all but I have to say that I am proud of myself. I never expected to be rewarded for what I have done but to receive the award fills me with pride and I am more than grateful."

Wiki gives young people a voice

The new 'Wandsworth Wiki' for children and young people with SEND was launched at a major town hall conference.

The conference was jointly funded and organised by Positive Parent Action (PPA) and Wandsworth Council and discussed changes in the law which mean organisations like the council have to work in much closer partnership with the children and their parents, and give them more say in their care.

As part of the day, the new 'Wandsworth Wiki' was demonstrated by Wandsworth's Young Wiki Champions. Aimee Goodwin, Lucy Caroline Munday and Conor Schofield showed the conference how the combination of pictures, videos, sound and text makes it possible for a wiki to capture a bit about their personalities, abilities and needs. This simple web-based tool helps young people with SEND communicate and prepare for independent living. They can create their own individually tailored Wiki's and share their interests, likes and dislikes with selected friends and the professionals who work with them.





Conor has information on his wiki about his dream of playing table tennis in a future Paralympics and also has a short video of his 'triggers' that annov or upset him.

Aimee uses hers to capture how close she is to her family and her fiancé. It also explains why she has a little bag with her at all times, and what to do if she needs it.

Lucy Caroline's wiki is about her, where she lives in supported housing, the people helping her and what she likes to do.

Helping to clean up the air

To mark Clean Air Day on June 15, **High View Primary School** in Battersea held a special assembly to teach students about air pollution.The council's environment spokesman Cllr Jonathan Cook went along to hear the assembly and chat to students.

Afterwards at pick-up time the council's environmental health officers were outside the school urging parents not to leave their car engines idling while they wait for their children, because this contributes to air pollution.

Throughout the year the council supports schools to teach children how to avoid their exposure to air pollution, and what they can do to help prevent it.



As well as anti-idling signs outside many schools, there are free bike safety lessons for children, support to draw up school travel plans to reduce the amount of children arriving at school by car, and a programme of environmental theatre productions to teach children how their travel choices affect air quality - like this production called The Pollution Solution which toured St Boniface, Gatton, Smallwood, Allfarthing, Swaffield, Albemarle, Sheringdale, St. Anselms and Holy Ghost.

Green-fingered Granard

Granard Primary School in Putney has been gardening.

Students, with help from staff, governors and members of the local branch of Good Gym, planted a new 50-meter hedge along the Westleigh Avenue side of the school in order to increase biodiversity. They used free and purchased hedging from the Woodland Trust, with funding from Tesco Bags of Help.

Around 20 GoodGym members ran to the school and spent 45 minutes digging a trench along Westleigh Avenue on Easter Monday. Their work enabled the students to come back after the holidays and plant immediately. It took nearly a week to plant over 300 new hedging saplings.

Headteacher Cheryl Grigg said: "The children are hugely excited to watch and observe their hard work over the next few years as the hedge grows. It is a green legacy of which they can be exceptionally proud. Granard is hugely appreciative of all the support from the local community in making this happen, and is looking forward to creating more opportunities for community participation and engagement."





Up and Under!

Ronald Lyon, Gabriel Idusohan and Marco-Antonio Cardenas have beaten off stiff competition to be selected for the Harlequins Development Programme. The three Year 7 pupils from **Saint Cecilia's Church of England School** are now following in the footsteps of four other pupils from the same school, who are already in the prestigious programme.

The DPP at Harlequins is the first stage of the national academy and provides an entry into a long-term player development programme which in some cases will lead towards the highest level of rugby.

The creation of the new unit makes Ernest Bevin's cadets only the second CCF Royal Marines Detachment in the whole of London. CCF units aim to promote military values and ethos into schools to help young people get their most out of their lives and contribute to their communities.

The Royal Marines CCF Contingent Commander is Captain Nick Mason, who also doubles as one of the geography teachers. He has taught at Ernest Bevin since 2008 and served in the British Army as a platoon commander with the Mercian Regiment.

"It's been a fantastic day for the College and I'm really proud of our cadets," said Nick.



EB students studying harder than ever

Ernest Bevin is expecting good GCSE results this year after discovering students have been making record use of an online revision aid.

Students at the Tooting school are among the heaviest users of GCSEPod - a series of learning and revision videos, called 'Pods', which students can access on their phones, tablets and PCs. This term, students have watched 4,456 more pods during the exam revision period than they did during the same period last year.





SEN Talk supporting parents

Looking after a child on the autistic spectrum, or who has ADHD, can be a struggle.

SEN Talk is a new organisation set up by parents to help support Wandsworth families. It brings families together through regular get-togethers and after school activities. Parents can share their experiences and find out about the support available. It also runs coffee mornings, community events and trips, respite, sport and therapeutic programmes and advocacy support. At open play sessions families can get speech and language therapy support, occupational therapy support and dietary and nutrition advice.

Its Volunteers Project gives trainee teachers or people studying on education courses experience working with children with SEND. The trainees support SEN Talk's Lego social skills project, funded by the council's Wandsworth Grant Fund. This helps children with social and emotional difficulties build skills and confidence through Lego.

Founder Annalise Boucher told Headstart she set up the charity after her son was diagnosed: "You shouldn't feel alone, you shouldn't be confused, the support should be genuine. We need to share our journeys to make the next part of the road clearer for our little individuals."

Mosaic governor Naomi Reiniger said "We are thrilled that our wonderful school buildings are being put to such excellent use in our local community. The work of WJR is an inspiration to us all and reminds us all not only of our responsibilities to each other in times of crisis, but of how reflecting on the past serves to build a better future."

Richard Verber from World Jewish Relief said: "If you or your family came to the UK in the 1930s and 40s there is a high chance they were helped by World Jewish Relief and we may have your family papers. There is no charge for this service."

Be a Young Inspector

The Wandsworth Youth Council needs inspectors to help it see if career support services are up to scratch.

It is responding to comments from young people who said that there is not enough suitable career support available and that young people do not always know what support there is.

Young people will be trained up to be Young Inspectors and will learn how to run and deliver an inspection, looking at how accessible and suitable career support services are for young people. They will speak to several services and create recommendations for each. They will then present these recommendations back to decision makers, to advise them on how we can best support young people into employment.

Young Inspectors will receive an accreditation, reference for their CV and learn key skills in this role.
