#### What should I do?

Children aged two and three years old are offered this vaccination in general practice. Your child's GP surgery should contact you. If you haven't heard from their GP by early November, contact them directly to make an appointment.

Children in reception class and school years 1, 2, 3 & 4 will be offered the vaccine at school. Your child's school will provide details from the local healthcare team.

# **Ortis rewards STEM success**

Former **Ernest Bevin College** pupil and Gadget Show presenter Ortis Deley returned to his old school to present the STEM Awards at the annual prize giving event.

Ortis studied pharmacy at university after leaving the college in the 1990s before becoming a TV and radio presenter. At his recent visit he viewed coursework and said he was pleased that the teaching of science and technology subjects continued to inspire the next generation of scientists and engineers at his old school.

Last year the college became one of only a handful of schools across the country to be awarded STEM Assured status in recognition of the success achieved by students in the Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths subjects. The college plans to open a STEM Hub which will be open to young people in the local area by the end of 2017.

Two Saint Cecilia's pupils reached the shortlist for a national competition to create a picture book. Organisers said Billy McDilly by Zoe Spargo and Identical by Rebecca Broyd impressed with their wide range of styles and challenging themes.





## Borough students aced their exams again this year, with excellent results at both A-Level and GCSE.

Provisional A-level figures show that more than 26 per cent of grades were  $A^*$  or A – up by 4.4 percentage points on last year. The highest increases were seen at Saint John Bosco, which was up by 20 percentage points, and Ark Putney which achieved the best results in its history and reports that as a result more of its students than ever will be the first in their family to attend university.

Across all schools 78.2 per cent of grades were between A\* and C, up by 4.2 percentage points from last year and ahead of the national average. At BTEC, at least half of students received a Distinction or Distinction\*.

At GCSE 71 per cent received a grade 9-4 in English and Maths, with strong improvements at Southfields (up ten percent in English) and Ark Putney (up seven per cent in maths). Of those students taking the English Baccalaureate (EBacc) , 37 per cent achieved a 9-4 GCSEs in English & maths, and  $A^*\text{-Cs}$  in two sciences, history or geography, and a language. This is up by four percentage points from last year. Ark Putney, Burntwood, Harris Battersea, Saint Cecilia's and St John Bosco all improved well on the EBacc 9-4 measure.

Maia Drummond who attends Ark Putney Academy received three A\*s and will study English Literature at Kings University. Here Maria and her brother Aaron are giving the good news to their mother.



Two other schools were Commended: **St Mary's RC**, Battersea which explored the history of the Queenstown Road based Victorian beverage company Pure Water, and **Putney High School** for research into the school during war time. They both won £400 for their school.

# Connecting Classrooms



## Students at **St Joseph's School** have been learning in a new way thanks to the Connecting Classrooms project.

Connecting Classrooms is a global education programme from the British Council in partnership with the Department for International Development. Teachers learn how to improve the way they work with young people and develop their ideas with like-minded teachers internationally.

Students are taught how to think critically and develop problem solving skills. Rather than rushing to put their hand up as quickly as possible to answer teachers' questions, they are encouraged to ask their teachers probing questions and think about problems carefully. One method is a 'silent debate' where students pose their arguments to one another on paper rather than out loud, prompting them to spend time reflecting and responding to a range of opinions.

Working together in this way will build a secure, safe learning environment in which all students can experience the joy of learning and in which all can experience success."

The changes are part of a plan to increase the number of school places for children with severe and complex SEN. The plan will also see Paddock Special expanded at the former Greenmead site following completion of building adaptations next spring.

# **Sporting ambition**

Seventeen young Wandsworth women have graduated from a programme which uses the power of sport to build aspiration and self belief.

The graduates, all aged between 14 and 17, had taken part in a 3 month Street Elite training scheme run by qualified sports coaches and mentors. Activities were based around sports coaching, helping to build confidence and teach valuable leadership and team working skills.

Those taking part also learnt about coaching, first aid skills and how to handle conflict, with all graduates given access to employment support and work placement opportunities.

The young women involved were identified by the council's youth service, schools or parents as being at risk of falling out of education and in need of fresh inspiration and support to get back on track.

The youth training programme has been operating in the borough since 2013 and is a partnership effort between Change Foundation, Berkeley Foundation and Wandsworth Council.

# How to look after your teeth Wandsworth children are being urged to take better care of their teeth.

Figures show that in England a quarter of five year olds have had tooth decay, with two or three teeth affected on average. Most of this decay was untreated because children are not visiting the dentist.

The council works with experts from Kings College Hospital NHS Foundation trust to help families and visit borough schools to spread the message about taking good care of your teeth.

- Cut out sugary drinks. One can of cola contains nine sugar cubes which is more than anyone should consume in one day. Always read the label
- Milk and water are the best things to drink to protect your teeth
- Watch out for fruit juices and smoothies, they all contain sugars.
   Keep them to once a day and have with a meal
- Toothpaste containing fluoride helps protect teeth. Don't rinse after cleaning your teeth, it washes away the toothpaste
- If you haven't been to the dentist for two years, book an appointment now, it is important to visit the dentist regularly
- Do your gums bleed when you brush? Keep brushing.
   This could be a sign of gum disease. See your dentist
- Toothache is a warning that something could be wrong- don't ignore it. See your dentist.



# Stay safe this bonfire night

The safest way to enjoy Bonfire Night is to attend an organised display — like the one in Battersea Park (see page 23).

But if you do want to celebrate at home, here's some advice from our friends at the London Fire Brigade on how to do it safely.

- Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114.
- Don't drink alcohol if you're setting off fireworks.
- Keep fireworks in a closed box and use them one at a time.
- Read and follow the instructions on each firework, using a torch if necessary (not a naked flame).
- Light the firework at arm's length with a taper and stand well back. Once it's been lit, don't return to it. Don't throw spent ones into the fire.
- Wear gloves and keep a bucket of water or soil nearby.
- Always supervise children and never give sparklers to a child under five – they are not old enough to understand why they might be dangerous. Sparklers can reach 2000 degrees centigrade.
- Always keep pets indoors.
- Build the bonfire away from sheds, fences and trees.
- Cool any burns immediately with cold water. Keep the burn under the running water for at least 10 minutes. Get medical advice for any burn on your child larger than a postage stamp or in a delicate area such as their face or hands.



Wandsworth Youth Council has been working on a project to help young people educate each other about mental health.

Reducing the stigma of mental health has been one of the Wandsworth Youth Council's key campaign priorities for the past year. The resulting three-year Mental Health Peer Education programme for Wandsworth young people is the first of its kind and trains up Year 9 students to be Mental Health Champions at Harris Academy Battersea and Ernest Bevin College.

Mental Health Champions learn what mental health is, types of mental ill health, warning signs, support services for young people and how to keep yourself mentally well. Champions are also given key skills to help them in their role of passing on their knowledge to their peers.

The project is co-delivered with The Participation People, who run Youth Participation for Wandsworth Council, and CAMHS Participation and is funded by Wandsworth CCG.


