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Heathrow fight continues

The battle continues to stop the expansion of Heathrow and protect residents from the misery of aircraft noise.

Wandsworth Council will tell a new aviation commission that increasing capacity at the airport would have a devastating impact on quality of life for flightpath communities including Putney.

The council is preparing evidence for the aviation commission, headed by Sir Howard Davies, which was launched by the Government to examine the case for airport development across the UK.

The authority will unpick the case for a third and fourth runway and wants a guarantee that 'runway alternation' will be maintained to give residents some respite from overhead planes.

Wandsworth will tell Sir Howard that

allowing both runways to be used in tandem for arrivals and departures – a system called 'mixed mode'- would be just as damaging as creating new landing strips.

And the council will argue that extra capacity at Heathrow would not guarantee better connections between the UK and emerging trading partners. Airlines can choose where they fly and will naturally use extra runway slots to increase services to established, profitable destinations rather than risky new routes to places like China.

Wandsworth and its 2M campaign partners have successfully blocked previous attempts to introduce mixed mode and overturned the previous Government's plans for a third Heathrow runway in the High Court.

Tax break for less well-off

Pensioners and the borough's least well-off families could be given a £600,000 tax break.

Council proposals would cushion the impact on the borough's poorest households of the Government's reform of council tax benefits, in effect saving them from a tax increase.

The Government is cutting the funding it gives to town halls to pay for council tax benefit by ten per cent – meaning a total funding cut of $\pounds 600,000$. Ministers have told local authorities to come up with their own schemes from next April and said they will hand them the grant to administer it.

Wandsworth is now consulting the public on its preferred approach, which is to maintain the existing rules and protect benefit entitlement at current levels. Instead of forcing the poor to pay, the council would pick up the cost of the shortfall in grant.

Finance spokesman Cllr Guy Senior said: "In many other parts of the country, people on low incomes may soon find themselves having to pay council tax for the first time.

"Here in Wandsworth, with our long record as a low tax authority, we do not wish to start increasing the tax burden for those least able to afford it."

Council tax bills in Wandsworth are the lowest in the country. The borough's Band D bill this financial year is ± 682 , compared to a London average of more than $\pm 1,300$.

Detailed plans for the first phase of the Battersea Power Station development have been submitted to the council.

The enormous development project in Nine Elms was granted outline planning consent in 2011. The new application provides a detailed specification for the first stage of the development.

Phase 1 consists of two buildings of varying heights between eight and 18 storeys. These will be built to the west of the power station building on land which is currently vacant. They would provide 800 homes, a hotel and space for cafes, restaurants, bars, a gym, pool, spa, theatre and office studios. A new six-acre public park would form the setting for the new buildings.

A Malaysian consortium completed the purchase of the iconic site earlier this year. The new owners are implementing the approved masterplan for the 39-acre power station plot which includes the complete regeneration of the listed power station and a full mixed-use redevelopment including new homes, offices, shops, restaurants and hotels as well as community, cultural and leisure facilities.

Library contract awarded

An innovative plan has been agreed to enhance and safeguard the borough's library and heritage service.

A contract to manage the service has been awarded to charitable social enterprise Greenwich Leisure Ltd (GLL). The recommendation follows a competitive tender process involving three organisations from which GLL was deemed to offer the best value for money for local tax payers.

GLL will run the service from April next year for a period of eight years. The change will produce significant yearly savings and, crucially, strengthen the service at a time when many other councils are closing branches.

Under the contract, GLL would be expected to continue providing core library services free of charge to users, while library buildings will remain in the ownership of the local authority. All 146 staff will be managed by GLL.

GLL, the UK's first leisure trust, has been responsible for running a variety of community services and spaces across the country since 1996.

Drug dealers kicked out

A woman has been evicted from her council flat after her teenage son and her lodger used it to deal class A drugs.

A judge in the county court granted the council an eviction order after hearing that the woman's 17-year-old son and 23-year-old lodger had been convicted of selling cocaine and heroin from the property.

The court ruled that by permitting these illegal activities, the tenant, who cannot be identified for legal reasons, had breached the conditions of her tenancy.

The judge was told that a police raid on the flat in Ellisfield Drive, Roehampton, had resulted in the seizure of a quantity of drugs.

The council's tenancy agreement was drawn up in close consultation with residents who live on the borough's housing estates and is designed to tackle illegal activities, anti-social behaviour and nuisance behaviour, including harrassment, noise, graffiti and not properly controlling children and pets.

Over the past three years 22 tenants have been evicted from council-owned accommodation for breaching the tenancy conditions as a result of their criminal and/or anti-social behaviour.

Lollipop patrollers

Around half the borough's lollipop patrollers are expected to be retained, as the council continues discussions with a major national company about a sponsorship deal and 16 schools agree to directly fund the service.

The council has carried out an in-depth review of the service in light of the fact that very few, if any, young children are allowed to make the journey to school unescorted while older children that do walk to school on their own safely cross roads that do not have patrollers every day.

Only a small minority of schools in the borough actually have a patroller. Evidence suggests that school crossing patrollers do not have any effect on accident figures.

The town hall's transport spokesman Cllr Russell King said: "Virtually all young children are brought to school by their parents. Parents simply don't allow small children to make the journey to school on their own, especially if it involves crossing busy roads.


"However, we absolutely recognise that some parents do appreciate the value and reassurance that the patrollers offer and that is why we have been discussing sponsorship arrangements with this large national company."

Anti-fraud project launched

Dozens of older residents have been given the inside track on common cons as part of a groundbreaking project designed to protect potentially vulnerable people against fraudsters.

The joint initiative between Wandsworth Council and the Metropolitan Police aims to reduce the number of people aged 65 and over who fall victim to investment scams, fake lottery wins and cold callers. Last year twice as many people aged 65-plus were victims of fraud than those under 65 in the capital.



More homes unveiled

Another 38 affordable homes have been created on Battersea's Rollo Estate as part of the council's pioneering Hidden Homes initiative.

This follows a £7.5m housing investment programme jointly funded by the council and the Homes and Communities Agency.

They bring the total number of Hidden Homes built by the council over the past decade to 238. These have been allocated to local families in housing need for rent, and to first time buyers living in the borough on a shared ownership basis.

Since it was launched in November 2002, the Hidden Homes scheme has transformed vacant and disused spaces on housing estates like laundry rooms, storage areas and defunct boiler rooms. It has successfully brought back into use redundant spaces on housing estates that are either eyesores or could otherwise become havens for anti-social behaviour.

The cost of building these new homes has also represented a good value deal for taxpayers because the council already owns the land - so there is no expensive land purchase involved.





Open the door

More than a thousand people keen to get on the housing ladder turned up at the Affordable Housing Open Day. The town hall event was packed full of information and advice on buying your first home, including information about the different home ownership schemes, including shared ownership, right to buy and house purchase grants.

Discount for homebuyers

If you are a council tenant, did you know you could buy your home with a discount of up to $\pm 75,000$?

The maximum discount available under the Right to Buy scheme was increased in April from £16,000. The level of discount each tenant receives through Right to Buy will depend on the length of time they have been a council tenant and whether they live in a flat or a house.

As a rough guide, this means if your house is worth £200,000 and you have lived there five years, you could buy it for £130,000.

Super-speed fibre optic broadband could soon be installed in the borough's council estates. The council is looking at working with a private company and is currently gathering information on the market and gauging interest among residents before beginning the official tender process.

As part of its Wandsworth Connected campaign, the council wants to ensure estate residents can get online as easily as the rest of the borough. Currently 85 per cent of Wandsworth residents have some form of internet access – up from 74 per cent in 2007 – but the figure falls to around two thirds among council tenants.

FREE GRIT

keeps ice at bay



Tonnes of free grit has been handed out to residents to help keep pavements clear this winter.

The council has offered residents up to 50 kilos of grit to help them cope with frozen footpaths. The aim is to encourage people to help others in their neighbourhoods – especially the elderly and disabled, or those with young children – who might otherwise find it hazardous to venture outdoors in a cold snap.

Last year the council gave away more than 15 tonnes of grit to local residents, community groups and neighbourhood watch co-ordinators.

The council works flat out to clear snow and ice from the borough's 230 miles of roads and 450 miles of pavements. But this takes time and residents are offered grit so they can help speed the process up and, using their local knowledge, concentrate on paths used by elderly and vulnerable people.

The council has also expanded the number of salt bins across the borough so that members of the public have an immediate stock of grit close at hand.

Giving young people a voice

What do JLS, Alexandra Burke, Tinie Tempah and Leona Lewis have in common?

As well as being hugely popular UK artists, they all took part in courses or projects run by Battersea-based Urban Voice UK.

Based in Culvert Road, Urban Voice UK is a not for profit organisation that recognises that success is a skill that has to be learned. It works with young people in their teens and twenties who may have low aspirations and poor life skills, shows them what's possible, and teaches them how to make it happen.

Courses include the eight-week Reality Check, where young people are taught how to set goals and stay motivated, Gateway 2 Music, teaching the basics of the music industry, and The Business, a course for women from Black and Minority Ethnic backgrounds who want to get back into work and progress their careers. Past students have gone on to start their own businesses and study at top universities.

The council's chief executive, Paul Martin, and head of youth services, Virginia Wall, went along to the first session of another course, Youth Get Real, to chat with students. These discussion dinners encourage students to think about their core values and their place within the world.

To mark its 20th anniversary, Urban Voice UK will be staging a talent competition, Project Talent, at the BAC on Lavender Hill, on February 1st, 2013. The winner will get a cash prize and a recording and management contract and, together with other finalists, will be chosen for the Artist Development Programme. This provides training and real experience of life in the industry and after they complete the course artists will be put forward for TV Talent shows. JLS and Alexandra Burke successfully completed the course in previous years.

Urban Voice founder Tony Biola said he wanted young people to understand that the ability to succeed is something that can be learned.

"I want our youth to understand that you must train for success – just like our athletes trained before competing in the Olympics and Paralympics this summer. I want to demonstrate to our youth that you can achieve, whatever situation you find yourself in."

Safety for you and your household

People who are the victims of domestic violence or hate crime* may risk losing their home because they just don't feel safe there anymore.

The council's Stay Put Stay Safe scheme (SPSS) helps make victims' homes more secure. Since the scheme started, more than 170 homes have been made safer under the scheme. No forced entries have been made to any of the properties and nobody has been assaulted in their homes due to failure of security.

Wandsworth residents who are victims of hate crime, or domestic violence where the perpetrator does not live in the property will be considered for the scheme and assessed on a case by case basis.

Emma's story

Mum of two Emma (not her real name) separated from her partner after suffering domestic violence for several years. Her ex-partner persisted in coming to her home and when she did not allow him in he would smash the windows and kick the door. Eventually the family slept in shifts because he had threatened to burn the flat down.

Emma had lived in her home for more than 15 years and had family and good friends that lived nearby. After speaking to a friend who had had the SPSS scheme completed, Emma decided it would provide her with the safety and security she needed without having to leave her home.

After her individual assessment all accessible glass was protected with a security film which prevents a sustained attack or a brick. Her mailbox was sealed, and an external mailbox was fitted outside the flat to prevent the risk of an arson attack and her family were trained in fire safety by the fire brigade. All external door locks were reinforced, and in the event that her ex partner were to get in, a sanctuary room fitted with a secure door was created in a bedroom. Her home was also flagged for priority attendance by the police should she ever need to call them.

For a number of weeks her ex-partner made several attempts to get in but because he was unable to break through the security measures he soon gave up.

World AIDS day -December 1

More than 120,000 people in the UK are believed to be HIV positive, and about a quarter of those are unaware that they have the infection. Once someone has HIV, it can weaken the body's immune system and without treatment can develop into a collection of diseases known as AIDS. There is no vaccine currently available and once infected there is no cure.

World AIDS day is always held on December 1 to raise awareness, support those infected and remember those that have died. The wearing of a red ribbon is used to remind people and governments that HIV needs to stay high on the agenda. Every year the sexual health service at St George's Hospital and the Department of Public Health based at the council work together to raise awareness locally. This year activities include stands in St George's Hospital, Wimbledon station and Tooting Broadway.

Unlock your Family secrets

Discover a treasure trove of archives at the borough's Heritage Service that can help you travel back into the past.

TV star Alex Kingston made some amazing discoveries about her ancestors after studying a range of historical records held at Battersea Library.

Ms Kingston, well-known for her appearances in ER and Dr Who, took part in the BBC's 'Who Do You Think You Are' series and made some surprise discoveries - including the fact that one of her female ancestors had once run a brothel.

Her research took her to Wandsworth because her great grandfather, who was killed in the First World War, lived in the borough.

By checking the historical documents held by the service she was able to start tracing her family back hundreds of years - and in the process unearthed not only her Jewish roots but also that her great, great, great, great grandmother had once run "a house of ill-repute" in Westminster.

Staff at the heritage service can give advice on how to start your research and where to look for information, as well as being able to suggest other historical sources that could cast more light on the lives of your relatives.

The Heritage Service is open 9am to 5pm on Monday, Friday and Saturday, and between 9am and 8pm Tuesday and Wednesday. For more information call (020) 8871 7753 or email heritage@wandsworth.gov.uk.

Estates regeneration moves to next stage

All summer we've been asking local people what they think about our improvement projects in Battersea and Roehampton. You can get a flavour of the comments on these pages

Both schemes aim to create even better places to live for residents in and around the Winstanley and York Road estates in Battersea and the Alton Estate in Roehampton by improving the quality of the physical environment, housing and community facilities and services.

We'll start work on masterplans for each area by next summer, and these will set out a detailed, long-term vision and business case for future improvement work. These masterplans can only be developed with the help of local people.

The council's leader, Councillor Ravi Govindia, said: "Our goal is to give residents as many opportunities as possible to have their say on regenerating these parts of Roehampton and Battersea – and I would like to extend my thanks to those who have already engaged with us. But this is just the start and I look forward to continuing the conversation with members of the public in the months ahead."



The group provides a range of help and support, including a youth club, cultural activities, a job shop, literacy classes and an annual conference. Find out more at www.stormempowerment.org.uk.

- the quality of existing housing in the area.
- Improving facilities for young people on the estate and improving the general environment and shopping facilities were also popular changes.
- Support was shown for redevelopment, with many people prepared to see the demolition of some buildings to pave the way for more housing to be built.
- People think that ways of combating crime and antisocial behaviour, and generally improving safety, should be factored into improvement plans.

An art collective has teamed up with residents of Roehampton to create a map inspired by memories, aspirations and ideas for the future of their community.

It shows areas around Allbrook House and Danebury Avenue that both adults and children want to see changed by creating hings like garden/growing areas, introducing cycle paths or painting buildings.

The map was created after Wandsworth Council's arts team and the public health department at NHS Wandsworth commissioned artists Avant-Gardening to give people an additional, more creative, channel through which to express their views over desired improvement work.





The future's bright for Wandsworth Town



The ± 1 bn regeneration of Wandsworth town centre is gathering pace, with major new developments in the pipeline.

Debenhams has announced it is opening a new store in Southside Shopping Centre in 2015 on the site of the Arndale Walk. The £40m scheme is in addition to a further £50m investment in Southside, which will see new retail space along the Garratt Lane frontage, and an improved first floor.

Centre manager Neil Churchill said: "We are extremely pleased to welcome Debenhams to Southside. Their commitment to Wandsworth aligns with our long term vision for the centre as it develops a reputation as one of south west London's leading retail destinations. Our great range of retail names and the growing mix of restaurants and cafes are testament to the continued retailer confidence in the centre."

Elsewhere in the town centre, the demolition of the derelict Lyon House office block will make space for 41 flats – 37 per cent of which will be affordable – and offices.

The scheme also features space for new shops to move into the high street. The developer has agreed to contribute £125,000 towards town centre highway improvements, including helping fund a reconfiguration of the Wandsworth one-way system. The council believes that switching part of the gyratory back to two-way working would relieve pressure on the high street and help it flourish.

Work is also progressing on the transformation of the Business Village site behind the High Street. This will see 416 new homes, commercial office and retail space in a scheme that will open up new town centre public areas.

Residents can find out more about a new proposal to redevelop the Ram Brewery site in Wandsworth at two public exhibitions. They are being held at the Ram Brewery site on Thursday, November 29, from 4.30pm and 7.30pm and on Saturday, December 1, from 9.30am to 12.30pm. Visit www.therambrewery.com.

At the heart of the Clapham Junction community, St Mark's Church has shown that the Big Society isn't just a slogan – it can be a reality.

The Battersea Rise church has developed an extensive range of services and outreach programmes to help all Junction residents – not just the 700 church members. It has developed links with the council, the local MP and other voluntary organisations to create a network of support for local people and also runs the Wandsworth Mediation Service, featured in the June edition of Brightside.

Case study

Jane (not her real name) first came to CAP October 2010. She had a large amount of debt and could see no way out. CAP took on the negotiating of her debts with her creditors and worked out an affordable budget for her to live off. CAP also paid for a food shop for Jane and she went on one of the CAP **Discovery Breaks**, which are holidays provided by CAP for clients and their families. At the beginning of 2012 Jane became debt free.

Training the UK's OPERA STARS

Hidden away behind Wandsworth High Street is one of the borough's cultural gems.

The National Opera Studio (NOS) made its home in Wandsworth town centre nine years ago. It provides intensive training for a small number of highly talented singers who go on to perform in companies in the UK and overseas, including the Royal Opera House and English National Opera. Coaching includes languages, acting, music, movement and song repertoire, and focuses on understanding the music, as well as learning the technical skills to sing it.

"Many people are unaware that we are here, but we're keen to break down barriers and become part of the local community," said Executive Director David Fletcher.

"The core business of what we do is training some very, very talented singers – and that has to be behind closed doors. But by getting them to perform in front of local people they can get performing experience and the NOS can get out more into the local community."

The NOS is in Chapel Yard – an old industrial area of Wandsworth town centre that has been extensively regenerated in recent years and is now home to modern new offices.

As part of its bid to become part of the local community, the NOS plans to come up with a more consistent programme of working with <image>

Gym upgrade

Putney leisure centre had a £400,000 upgrade, with improved changing rooms and new gym and fitness equipment.
