Direct rail services to Heathrow have come a step closer

The council's proposal for a new direct rail link to Heathrow has won support from two London boroughs.

Hounslow and Hammersmith & Fulham are now backing the scheme - called 'Airtrack Lite' - which was unveiled in October last year. The plan would create a new service between Waterloo and Terminal 5 with stops at Vauxhall, Clapham Junction and Putney.

It would mean local residents could travel direct to the airport and would ease overcrowding on the Piccadilly Line which is heavily burdened by Heathrow passengers.

The proposals have been discussed at top level meetings with the Department for Transport (DfT) and have now been included in the tender documents for the Great Western Rail Franchise. The next franchisee will be expected to help develop the scheme further as a means of improving links to Heathrow.

The council's plan is based on BAA's original 'Air Track' proposal which was scrapped last year. The revised version avoids routing extra trains through level crossings in Mortlake and Egham which was a major problem with the original scheme.

While most of us can't wait for the Games to start, we also know that there will be some disruption to our roads and public transport will be under severe pressure. We hope this edition of Brightside helps you plan ahead to minimise that disruption.

There are lots of other things to look forward to - there will shortly be a consultation on the roll out of the Barclays Cycle Hire Scheme in our borough, we have a new direct train route from Clapham Junction to the Docklands starting and Wandsworth Council has been instrumental in coming up with plans for a direct rail route to Heathrow. We have plans for a new primary school in Putney and the council is investing in more school places across our borough, creating more choice for parents.

We are lucky to live in a great part of London and you can be sure that your council will continue to stand up for Wandsworth and its residents.

Tenants 'delighted' at new **Right to Buy**

More than 1,000 tenants have asked about buying their homes from the council since Prime Minister David Cameron and Council Leader Ravi Govindia launched the new Right to Buy on April 3.

The revamped scheme offers council tenants a discount of up to \pm 75,000 on the purchase price of their home. Previously the maximum discount had been capped at \pm 16,000.

Over the past 12 months Wandsworth Council has been working closely with the Government to redesign Right to Buy and to reset the discount at a higher level.

In early April, Mr Cameron met with Cllr Govindia and local council tenants in Southfields to officially launch the improved scheme. Since then more than 1,000 enquiries have flooded in and the number of full applications has more than doubled.

The money raised through selling council homes will be used to build new affordable housing for local residents. For every home sold a new one will be built.

Cllr Govindia said: "The great thing about Right to Buy is that it offers ordinary families the chance to enjoy all the benefits of home ownership. That's why we have been pressing the Government to bring the scheme back to life and it's terrific to see so many households taking advantage of the higher discount.

"The tenants I've spoken to have been absolutely delighted with the changes and many are now in the process of applying for a mortgage. In the weeks ahead we will be touring the borough to make sure all of our tenants are aware that this life changing scheme has been revived.

"The money the council gets to keep through selling council houses through the Right to Buy Scheme will be used to build new affordable housing. Every home sold will be replaced."

Tea with the PM

Wandsworth tenants joined Prime Minister David Cameron and leader of Wandsworth Council Ravi Govindia for tea and biscuits in a church hall in Southfields in April.

Housing Minister Grant Schapps and Wandsworth's Executive Member for Housing Paul Ellis also joined the discussion which centred on the changes to the Right to Buy scheme and how they will



help council tenants to access the property market. The Government has worked closely with Wandsworth Council to rework the scheme and chose the borough as the venue for its official launch.

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What is the Right to Buy?

The RtB scheme gives council tenants a discount on the market value of their home. The maximum discount is now £75,000.

Who qualifies?

Almost all council tenants who have lived in social housing for more than five years.

How much is the discount?

The level of discount will depend on the length of time tenants have lived in the property and whether it is a flat or a house.

For houses: tenants who have lived in the property for at least five years will be entitled to a discount of 35 per cent of its value. For every additional year they will receive an extra one per cent discount. The maximum discount for houses is capped at 60 per cent of the property value and cannot exceed £75,000.

For flats: tenants who have lived in the property for at least five years will be entitled to a discount of 50 per cent of its value. For every extra year they will



receive an extra two per cent discount. The maximum discount for flats is capped at 70 per cent of the property value and cannot exceed £75,000.

The council's home ownership team can explain how Right to Buy works and help tenants decide whether it is the right choice for them. Trained advisors will help applicants through every stage of the buying process.

Council ready for home building challenge

Wandsworth is one of the most active home building councils in the country having delivered more than 200 new properties through its Hidden Homes programme.

These bright, modern and attractive homes have been created out of unused spaces on council estates, like garages, clubrooms and laundries.

Executive member for housing Cllr Paul Ellis says the town hall will use this experience to deliver high quality new homes to replace those sold through Right to Buy.

He said: "We are proud to be a home building council. Over the last ten years we have created more affordable homes than any other council in London and that experience will be invaluable as our replacement programme gets going."



Homes for heroes

Two former soldiers have become the first to move into new council homes under Wandsworth's policy of giving armed forces personnel a higher priority on its housing waiting lists.

Soldiers, sailors and air force personnel also get extra support in finding and buying an affordable home under the borough's various "right to buy" type schemes. Wandsworth is one of only a handful of local authorities across the UK to have already set aside a quota of homes for service families, giving them greater priority for social housing - ahead of proposed Government rule changes that will give local authorities greater flexibilities in their allocation policies. Former serviceman Phillip spent five years in the Royal Marines. He said: "When you leave the forces you're

not given much advice about housing. The information was limited to just a list of numbers to call.

"It's only through these kinds of reforms for people like me that I've got a home. It's great to know that people who serve their country have a chance when it comes to housing."



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FLAME COMES TO WANDSWORTH

The Olympic flame will pass through Wandsworth on **Monday July 23**

The Olympic Torch Relay arrives in the borough from Wimbledon's All England Club at around 5.30pm. It then travels down Wimbledon Park Road, Granville Road, Merton Road, Kimber Road, Garratt Lane, Upper Tooting Road and Tooting Bec Road. Wandsworth has also been chosen to host an evening event on Tooting Bec Common.

The torch is expected to arrive at the common between 6.30pm and 7pm. The free evening event, which starts at 5pm, will be in full swing and a Celebration Cauldron will be lit on stage to mark its arrival. As well as the chance to see the iconic flame, the celebration will include music and entertainment.

Battersea residents will get a chance to see the torch at around 2pm on July 26. It will pass along **Cedars Road and Queenstown Road** en route from Lambeth to **Chelsea Bridge**.

Jordan Dalrymple

An 18-year-old student whose life was changed by sport said he is "lucky, privileged and grateful" to have been chosen as a torchbearer. Jordan Dalrymple has already been named a Lloyds TSB Local Hero due to his involvement in the England Volleyball U19 and U17 squads but now has the added honour of carrying the Olympic Torch through the borough.

Four years ago, Jordan - a sixth form student at Tooting's Ernest Bevin College - did not take a great interest in sport but now claims it defines him. He said: "I've seen first-hand how sport can completely change the direction of your life and how it can bring people together - to be at the core of an event which will be central to all of that will be incredible.

"For lack of a better phrase, I almost feel like torchbearing is the ultimate 'cherry-on-top' for a journey that's come full circle"

Hayley Rea

A 23-year-old woman who has turned scores of Wandsworth residents into twinkle toed dance masters will soon be shimmying along the streets as a torchbearer.

Hayley Rea, the principle of Aim High Dance Academy, has spent the past five years teaching dance to young people living in Balham, Battersea, Earlsfield, Southfields and Tooting. Her academy, which she established aged just 18, has contracts with schools, nurseries and after school clubs, and also runs a mentoring scheme for young adults who wish to pursue a career in dance. She said: "All my students are amazed that I have been given this opportunity and I'm hoping they will all come down to cheer me along."

Rachael Marsh

Rachael Marsh, who co-founded a charity after her newborn son was saved by hospital staff said she was "still getting over the shock of being chosen as a torchbearer".

The Balham resident helped set up Ickle Pickles, which raises funds to buy vital equipment for sick and premature babies, after her son Charlie was born three months premature at St George's Hospital four years ago. Despite spending three months in the neonatal unit (NNU), he is now a healthy and happy little boy. Ickle Pickles has raised more than £300,000 to date and has donated equipment to NNUs across the country.

It is currently aiming to build a team of volunteers within the local area to help organise events, contact local businesses for sponsorship and raise much needed funds.

Holly Holmes

One of the youngest torchbearers, 13-year-old Holly Holmes from Wandsworth, has spent a lot of her young life in hospital. When she was five Holly was diagnosed with a heart murmur and Hemiplegia – a complex form of cerebral palsy that affects one side of the body. She later developed epilepsy and suffered from lack of sleep. However,

since having a life-changing operation at Great Ormond Street Hospital in 2007, Holly has experienced no more seizures.

Mum Chevs said: "Holly is very excited about having this once in a lifetime opportunity to be part of such an historic occasion and can't believe she is actually going to carry the Olympic flame."

Jeffrey Gordon

A 78-year-old Putney resident who is one of only 16 people to have taken part in all 32 London Marathons will be pounding the streets again ahead of the Olympics – as a torchbearer.

Jeffrey Gordon said he was thrilled to have been chosen as a torchbearer. He has run in more than 100 other marathons and taken part in the London to Brighton race seven times.

Jeffrey, who is described as an eccentric character by wife Shirley, still works full-time as a legal aid solicitor in Battersea. He is best known for establishing the "Mackenzie Friend" system which enables anyone involved in legal proceedings to have a court representative to advise and assist them although they may not necessarily be legally qualified.

The avid reader and book collector said: "It is an honourI had never dreamed of, to be carrying the Olympic torch through the city I love."

June 3 The Queen's Diamond Jubilee Pageant and Festival

The seven-mile long flotilla will set off along the river from Battersea at 2pm, with boats mustering between Hammersmith and Putney, so residents along the whole length of the Wandsworth riverside should get a good view. Battersea and Albert Bridges will both be closed to traffic. Many roads across London, including around 200 in Wandsworth, will be closed because of street parties.




July 28-August 5 Olympic Route Network in operation

Investors compete for power station site





Several investors have submitted bids to buy the Battersea Power Station site according to the estate agent handling the sale of the Nine Elms landmark.

The exact number and identity of the bidders has been kept confidential but Chelsea Football Club has revealed that it is among the potential buyers.

As Brightside went to a press a shortlist of the

best offers was being prepared. Negotiations are expected to continue throughout the summer.

The power station is a privately owned building located at the western end of the Nine Elms regeneration area. Interest in the development site has been high since it was put up for sale in February this year.

The council expects the new buyer to secure the future of the iconic building and to provide new homes and business space across the site. The owner would also need to contribute towards the costs of two new tube stations in Nine Elms which are key to creating 25,000 new jobs for London.

Market and Embassy schemes move ahead

More Nine Elms schemes have made significant progress in recent weeks:

- Covent Garden Market Authority has selected VINCI St Modwen as its private development partner for the regeneration of its vast Nine Elms sites.
- The US State Department has selected its contractors to build the new American Embassy. The project is scheduled for completion in 2017.
- Another two Nine Elms sites are now heading for redevelopment a self storage depot and Christies warehouse have been put up for sale.

More homes built

A major increase in home building activity took place in Wandsworth during 2011, new figures have revealed.

Despite a bleak 12 months for the national home building industry, the borough recorded a significant increase in planning consents, construction starts and new home completions compared to the previous calendar year, led by regeneration at Nine Elms and Wandsworth Town.

A total of 865 new homes were completed across the

borough in 2011 - a 58 per cent year on year rise. The number of construction starts increased by 74 per cent to reach 2,433 - suggesting the increase in completions will be sustained at least over the short term.

And there are also promising signs for the longer term future of the local home building market as planning permission was granted for a total of 5,729 new dwellings in 2011. This is more than double the 2010 figure of 2,372.



Low tax saves families thousands

Wandsworth residents have an extra £8,600 in their pockets compared to other Londoners thanks to 20 years of low council tax, figures show.

Research into London's council tax bills since the charge was first introduced in 1993 reveals that residents living in a Band D property in Wandsworth are £8,597 better off than if they lived in other parts of the city.

The council's finance spokesman Cllr Guy Senior said: "Residents of the borough have always appreciated and understood that they receive really excellent value for money services from their town hall. Now we are able to actually quantify this and put a cash figure on this value for money scale.

"This is enough to buy a small car or pay for a really amazing family holiday. By paying close attention to spending we have been able to keep Wandsworth's council tax bills the UK's lowest since 1993 and ensured that the financial burden on local families has been kept to the absolute minimum."

The borough's bill this financial year is £682, compared to a London average of more than $\pm 1,300$. As well as being the UK's lowest, council tax bills in Wandsworth have been frozen for the past five years.



Rail

• A new direct rail service linking Clapham Junction with Dalston Junction in Hackney will be up and running in December this year. The route will run via Surrey Quays - cutting journey times to the Docklands to around 20 minutes.

• Improvement works to Balham and Wandsworth Town Stations are now complete. A major upgrade to Earlsfield Station is well underway which will increase capacity and improve passenger facilities.

• The council is building support for a new direct rail service between Waterloo and Heathrow. The 'Airtrack Lite' service would stop at Clapham Junction and Putney.

• Even more car club vehicles are now available on local streets as the council continues to expand access to the schemes. To join the club and find your nearest car visit www.wandsworth.gov.uk/carclubs.

• The first electric powered car club vehicle is now available in Wandsworth. The low emission model has been introduced by Zipcar on St John's Avenue in Putney. Visit www.zipcar.co.uk for more information.

, Cycling

Planning applications are being prepared for around 60 new Barclays Cycle Hire docking stations. The popular scheme is on course to expand into parts of Putney, Wandsworth Town and Battersea next year.

Roads

A major upgrade to the St Johns Hill / Lavender Hill junction is now approaching completion which will help improve traffic flow through Clapham Junction town centre.



Walking

Diagonal pedestrian crossings are being introduced at each end of St John's Road in Clapham Junction to make crossing these busy junctions easier, faster and safer. Pavements are being widened throughout the town centre and street clutter taken away.

Bus

TfL will reduce the number of older, higher polluting buses travelling through Putney from 180 to 49 by the end of next year. The council and the Putney Society are pressing for further improvements to the bus fleet which is responsible for two thirds of the air pollution on Putney High Street.

A new pedestrian and cycle tunnel now runs straight through Wandsworth Bridge linking the new Battersea Reach development and the Ship public house -connecting two sections of the Thames Path.

Refuse changes saving you money

The borough's new waste contractor has collected nearly two million refuse and recycling sacks since the new service was launched in April.

Serco crews have been hard at work picking up the estimated 80,000 tones of refuse and recycling produced by Wandsworth households each year.

The switchover has led to many important improvements for residents.

• Collections are now being made over five days instead of six. This means that residents in Putney and Roehampton are no longer being disturbed on Saturday mornings.

• The brand new fleet of vehicles has been equipped with two separate compartments so that black binbags and orange recycling sacks can be collected at the same time, meaning fewer trucks on the road, less traffic congestion, less pollution and better air quality.

- Guarantees weekly bin collections
- The reintroduction of free garden waste collections
- A better deal for local taxpayers, with savings of just under £1m for each and every year of the eight year contract.

Environment spokesman Jonathan Cook said: 'Although there were a few teething problems at the very start of the new contract, these were quickly ironed out and residents can now look forward to a high quality and excellent value for money service between now and 2020.'

Better schools, more choice

Wandsworth has set out its commitment to parents to improving the quality and choice of education in the borough.

In order to meet a growing demand for places, the council is spending £10m on expanding 11 local schools. But this won't be enough on its own, so new schools will be built as well. The Bolingbroke Academy is due to open this year, a new primary free school is planned for Tooting and, subject to planning permission, another primary is proposed for Putney.

The council is supporting more free schools and academies that meet local needs, are of the highest quality and will serve the whole community. This includes supporting the creation of new schools, and transforming existing schools.

Chestnut Grove, Graveney and Belleville have already become academies. Battersea Park School has recently decided to pursue academy status and several primary schools are considering this option.

Elliott School in Putney is in line to become an academy, run by educational charity ARK, which is also running the new Bolingbroke Academy in Battersea. Proposals have also been put forward to extensively renovate Elliott's grade II listed buildings.

We also know that five other bids to open free schools in Wandsworth were submitted to the Secretary of State for Education in February this year. We expect the Secretary of State to announce the successful bids in July.

Keeping older people safe

The innovative Junior Citizen scheme is now being offered to the borough's older people, as part of a unique link-up between the council and other organisations.

The second Senior Safety day was held in Battersea and was run jointly by the council's Community Safety Team, Police, Fire and Ambulance services.

Those attending learnt what to do in five interactive scenarios, covering electrical safety in the kitchen, fire safety, first aid, stranger at the door and personal safety when out and about. Each scenario required the attendees to take an active part, and share their experiences with each other on keeping safe.

The London Fire Brigade visited everyone in their homes to make sure they had a working smoke alarm, and that their electrical appliances were in good condition.

Planning for the next event in Tooting is in progress, so if you know of someone who would benefit from attending, contact the Community Safety Team on (020) 8871 6567. Here are some useful tips from the Electrical Safety Council on keeping safe in your home;

- Is there just one plug per socket? Overloaded sockets can cause fires. Get a bar adapter instead of a block one.
- Are all electrical appliances placed far away from where they might get wet? Electricity and water don't mix.
- Are all the kitchen appliance leads clear of cooker tops? Heat from the cooker could melt the plastic, exposing the wires. This may cause a fire or risk a shock.
- Have you switched off your TVs and irons? It's safer and better for the environment.
- Don't use any electrical equipment or switches with wet hands!
- Check that flexible leads and things like toasters and kettles are in good condition.

Sharnough, 17, has grown up in care and excelled at Graveney School, where she was year 11 head girl. She is taking three A-levels and wants to study family law, where she can use her experience of going through the care system.

Other achievements include receiving a National Citizen Certificate from David Cameron, climbing Mount Snowdon for charity, successfully applying to become an Olympic volunteer and being chosen to take part in the 'Pathways To law' programme, involving work experience at Hogan Lovells International Law.

Speaking up

The borough's young people have been getting together to make sure their voices are heard.

The Borough Early Intervention Team, part of the council's Youth Support Team, and Inspector Gil Martin took 19 young people to meet with Met Police Commissioner Bernard Hogan-Howe.

They were keen to tell him that last August's riots should not be seen as a reflection of them or a majority of young people in the borough, and discussed how the disorder was policed, plus Stop and Search and the Olympics.

The borough's Youth Council, made up of young people, have also received council funding for a new Youth Think Tank. This will enable the Police and young people to come together around one table, discuss the issues and fix them together. The Borough Commander and Head of Community Safety regularly attend, as well as over 30 young people on a regular basis.

Feeding your baby

There are many myths that surround breastfeeding which can undermine both a mother's confidence and the support she receives. Here local NHS breastfeeding experts look at three of the most common breastfeeding myths.

Myth: Because breastfeeding is natural it will be easy

False

Although breastfeeding is natural it can take time to learn. A bit like when a baby begins to start solids (weaning), where it takes time to introduce your baby to food, breastfeeding is the same in that it does not always come easily. If you would like some support, there are lots of services available to you listed on the page opposite.

Myth: Formula milk is the same as breast milk False

Your breastmilk is made to suit your own baby each day while formula milks are made to suit every baby. Breastmilk also



contains essential antibodies, living cells, enzymes, and hormones that help protect babies from illness. Formula milk does not contain these.

Myth: A large number of women can't produce enough milk

False

Most women produce enough milk for their babies, and many produce more than enough. Babies that lose weight or are slow to gain weight when breastfeeding do so because they don't get the milk that is available; it isn't due to the mother not having enough milk. Breast-fed babies do lose a little bit of weight at first and tend to be smaller than formula fed babies. This is nothing to worry about and the growth charts in the red books now reflect this.

Local resident and QC Stephen Ruttle explains how he set up the Wandsworth Mediation Service – a charity that helps members of the Wandsworth community resolve their differences.

"I have lived in Wandsworth for 35 years and am a true believer that local people are those best placed

to transform their local community. This is one of the reasons I set up Wandsworth Mediation Service, a local charity, run by local volunteers, which supports the community to come together and resolve their differences.

Conflict is one thing that few of us like to admit to being involved in, yet its effect is caustic. From neighbours at war to parents at loggerheads with one another, we see the negative consequences of unresolved conflict for our local community.

Mediation is a safe place where people can come together, with an impartial third party, to hold a difficult conversation. From separated parents discussing childcare to neighbours negotiating noise curfews, the principle remains the same. Mediation provides an alternative to stressful court cases, expensive solicitor fees and endless hassle.

The beauty of mediation is that it does not tell people what to do but rather helps them to find their own solution to the issues affecting them. I think this is why it works so well."

Case study: Anna

Anna was struggling in a conflict with her neighbour, Ben, who lived in the flat below with his wife and children. They were locked into conflict, both accusing the other of unnecessary noise. When they tried to resolve it on the doorstep they found themselves embroiled in an argument.

Through mediation Anna and Ben could explain their perspective, understand how the other person has acted and communicate clearly. Both left the session having apologised to each other. They agreed to chat regularly and to avoid making formal complaints. In contrast to the stress of the past few months both left feeling positive about the future.

BAC four years on

By David Jubb and David Micklem, Joint Artistic Directors

"In 2008, Battersea Arts Centre signed a 125 year lease on the former Battersea Town Hall. So four years later, how's it going?

The good news is that we have invested £2m and made a series of improvements to the building. These include opening up thirty spaces for public use, partially restoring the celebrated Grand Hall and Council Chamber and creating accommodation for artists who can take up temporary residence. We have also worked with users and potential users of the building, along with our architectural partners Haworth Tompkins, to create an £11m masterplan to restore and develop the building for future generations. We have already raised £4.5m towards this.

We face challenges and embrace these enthusiastically. We need to work harder at communicating BAC's programme of events to people who live in Wandsworth and across London. We attract over 200,000 visitors every year, but we want to make the programme of activities easier to understand and access. We also want to celebrate more of the heritage of the building with our audiences. For example, in October this year we will present a show for families called The Good Neighbour based on the heroic deeds of one Battersea resident at the turn of the last century.

Through BAC's pioneering "scratch" process we offer emerging and established theatre-makers a space to test out new and innovative performance work on audiences and to use audiences' feedback to further develop the work. Through this model we have fostered and developed shows that break the mould: from Jerry Springer: The Opera which was created at the BAC in 2001; to Punchdrunk's and BAC's The Masque of the Red Death, an immersive show, which took over the entire Town Hall in 2007.

We are confident that as the former Town Hall celebrates its 120th birthday next year, we can build a broad coalition of support so that the building receives the care and attention it deserves."




