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Free wi-fi for Wandsworth

A free Wandsworth Council-branded wi-fi service will cover much of the borough by 2014 and help people access online services.

Wandsworth has signed a contract with the company Arqiva to provide the service. Registered users will get 30 minutes' free wi-fi a day.

The council will get half a million pounds from Arqiva at the beginning of the contract for the use of the council's lampposts to install the network, and will get a share of any income generated.

The council site, www.wandsworth.gov.uk, plus www.gov.uk and www.visitlondon.com will be free to use for any length of time without the need to register. Enabling free 24/7 access to the council website will make it easier for residents to access council tax services online. This is more convenient and cuts costs, so helping to keep council tax low and protect frontline services.

Online services include parking permits, paying penalty charge notices, managing council tax and housing accounts, library services and booking MOTs and holiday and afterschool

playschemes. It is also expected that the new universal benefits system will largely have to be managed online by claimants.



Report it by text

Did you know problems with rubbish collections, street cleaning or recycling can be reported by text?

You can text the council's Waste Services department to order recycling sacks, report a missed bin collection, request that your street be cleaned, report fly tipping and more.

The council wants local people to be able to report problems and request services at any time using a method that's most convenient for them, without having to spend time making phone calls or visiting the council offices.

Major action on roads to fix potholes

Every street in the borough will be inspected in the coming months as the council embarks on a major pothole and pavement repair project.

Wandsworth has increased the road repair budget to £6.4m this year. This has led to the creation of six special pothole and pavement action crews, who will be working to repair potholes and pavements, ward by ward, over the months ahead.

"We are prioritising any critical problems for immediate repair, and at the same time, working our way across every street in the borough." said transport spokesman, Councillor Russell King.

Wandsworth is responsible for 1,500 roads stretching over 360km with 746km of pavements, many of which were constructed more than 100 years ago.

The country has seen some of the worst winters over the past four years causing huge damage by weakening the road surface and creating many more potholes.

The six repair crews will be checking and fixing problems in every street across the borough in a rolling programme over the coming months. They will be working in six wards at a time. Three teams will be repairing potholes and three repairing pavements. This doesn't mean other urgent repairs elsewhere will be ignored. A rapid response team will be dealing with those.

"We know where the problems are and all significant potholes and broken pavements will be fixed," added Cllr King. "Minor defects may not merit urgent attention, and these will continue to be monitored."

In addition, many roads will be completely resurfaced and some roads will have their pavements completely re-laid. Leaflets are being sent to homes across the borough to let people know when the repair crews will be working in their neighbourhoods.



What causes potholes?

A harsh winter has caused an unusually high number of potholes to appear in roads throughout the country. In Wandsworth we have heard the message from residents that you want urgent action to sort out the problem.

There are two main causes of potholes:

Severe weather - we have seen some of the worst winters over the past four years. These cause huge damage by weakening the road surface and creating many more potholes.

Age - many of our roads were constructed some 75-125 years ago and were not designed to withstand the constant heavy traffic of today.

Trees - most people want to keep street trees, but as they grow older the roots push up the paving causing dangerous trip hazards.

Use bins to help slash bills

The council has launched an anti-litter campaign after figures show the annual bill for picking up around 7,000 tonnes of it is nearly £4m.

A new fleet of energy-efficient vehicles will clean up litter from the streets and enforcement action has been stepped up against individual litter bugs, with recent crack-downs outside Tooting Broadway and Clapham Junction stations resulting in 31 on-the-spot fines. There have also been several prosecutions of shops and businesses that try to save money by unlawfully dumping their waste on the highway.

And residents are being urged to help out by using the borough's many litter bins. Environment spokesman Cllr Jonathan Cook said: "We will of course go on picking up all the litter that's deposited on our streets because we take great pride in the borough's appearance, but we also want to get across the huge cost of this task."

Historic pond brought back to life

The BBC's Countryfile programme has paid a visit to a restoration and conservation project on a Southfields estate.

The programme-makers were filming at Edgecombe Hall to see the outcome of a council-run project to bring a historic pond on the estate back to life and re-introduce wildlife and wild flowers to the area.

The pond restoration project was made possible thanks to a $\pm 55,000$ grant from the National Heritage Fund – along with a further $\pm 2,000$ from Kew Gardens for wild flower planting and conservation.

The restoration started back in 2009, and included repair work to the ponds and water cascades, plus an oral history



project to gather local people's memories of the manor house that used to stand on the site of the estate. The ponds are of historical importance because they were designed by celebrated Victorian and Edwardian landscape gardeners, James Pulham and Son.

NEW-LOOK Battersea park playground reopens

The playground at Battersea Park has re-opened with phase one of the refurbishment now complete.

Children's services spokesman Cllr Kathy Tracey said: "We hope to complete phase two, which involves the installation of some more play equipment and some landscaping in time for the start of the school summer holidays, although this is largely dependent on the weather.

"When it is all finished I am sure that it will prove very popular with children and their families."

As well as installing new play equipment at the playground, the council is also pursuing ambitious plans to introduce more exciting attractions for young people.

Discussions are continuing which could see the introduction of climbing walls and an aerial walkway or "tree walk" facility at the playground.

And the council is looking to provide additional attractions inside the playground's vacant play building. including dance and drama classes, singing and music tuition, clown and circus trick workshops and other activities.

As part of the wider revamp of play facilities in Wandsworth, the Kimber Road playground will be transformed this summer into a skatepark and BMX bike track.

Cut price homes for locals

A unique homeownership scheme could see working households in Nine Elms, east Battersea offered the chance to buy new family sized homes as low as the cost price.

Under the council's proposals a 3-bed home costing £400,000 on the open market could be offered to working households for just £210,000. This would be achieved through providing the buyers with a repayable interest-free equity loan which could be up to half the property's full value.

The scheme which is currently being marketed to developers would be applied to 35 new homes which would be built across two sites on the Patmore Estate in Nine Elms, Battersea. One is a former garage block on Parvin Street, the other is a former education centre on Thessaly Road.

Low and middle income households living on the Patmore and nearby Savona Estate would be offered first refusal to ensure people living in this part of Battersea have the chance to buy a family home in their local area.

No charge for Coronation parties

Local people are being urged to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the Queen's Coronation by holding a street party – and the council's cutting costs and red tape to help them.

Street parties organised for June 1 and 2 are free of charge, and there's still time to take advantage of a second free weekend on July 13 and 14. The former marks the actual anniversary of the Queen's Coronation in 1953 while the second date coincides with the official celebrations.

Councillors have agreed to waive the normal £50 fee for arranging a road closure, while all the other information that's required can be submitted online via a simple internet questionnaire.

Council leader Ravi Govindia said: "If last year's Diamond Jubilee celebrations are anything to go by, Wandsworth residents will demonstrate their community spirit by arranging many street parties. We're expecting everything from small gatherings of a few neighbours to much bigger events."

Councillors have rejected proposals that would have seen the Clapham Junction branch of McDonalds stay open until 3am at weekends because of the potential for noise and disturbance to neighbours.

Pregnancy fall

New figures show a big reduction in the number of teenage pregnancies in recent years. Between 1998 and 2011 the rate fell from 71 cases per thousand to 29 – more than 58 per cent.

The decrease has been attributed to good partnership working between schools, health services and other organisation, intensive outreach work and support services such as sexual health clinics.

Power Station Park opens

This summer local people will be able to set foot on the Battersea Power Station site for the first time in 30 years.

A Pop-Up Park within the Power Station grounds will be open to the public during this year's Chelsea Fringe Festival which runs until June 9. Check the park's opening times at www.chelseafringe.com.

Access to the temporary park will be via a new pedestrian walkway underneath Grosvenor Railway Bridge. This means local people will be able to walk along the river from Battersea Park into the power station site.

Additional disability access will be via Gate 2 Kirtling Street SW8 5DN. There is no parking on site.

After the festival the Pop-Up Park will remain open to the public at weekends until September, events and construction schedules allowing.

The regeneration of the power station site will create a whole new town centre including a high street, riverside park and Tube station. The scheme is one of many development projects in the Nine Elms area which are creating thousands of new jobs and affordable homes.

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Full speed ahead for transport upgrades

Progress is being made across a series of major transport projects as the town hall's push to upgrade the local network gathers momentum.

A snapshot of recent progress includes:



Cycling, Walking and Driving

- A £6.4 million street investment programme begins in June with the aim of wiping out potholes and improving pavements across the borough. More on page 4.
- Wandsworth council is now in talks with Transport for London (TfL) over plans to redesign the Wandsworth One Way System. The aim is to make it much safer for cyclists and to reduce traffic levels on Wandsworth High Street.
 - Investing in all our town centres. Work includes widening pavements and improving road layouts to reduce traffic jams.



Wandsworth's first Barclays Cycle Hire docking stations (or Boris Bikes) are now being installed in parts of Battersea, Wandsworth Town and Putney. The scheme goes live in December. We see this as the first step leading to wider coverage across Wandsworth.



Riverside

Working with TfL we have secured Thames Clipper as the new riverbus operator for the Putney to Blackfriars route. This faster, more frequent service has cut journey times between Putney and Blackfriars to just 37 minutes. The boats also stops at the Wandsworth Riverside Quarter pier.





Bus

New environmentally friendly buses will help to reduce pollution on busy roads like Putney High Street.




Rail

- Wandsworth Council is making the case for a complete overhaul of Clapham Junction. Overcrowding is a severe problem at this incredibly busy transport hub.
- After years of campaigning we expect to see longer, higher capacity trains gradually introduced later this year on services into Waterloo and Victoria.
- Wandsworth Council is building the case for a new direct rail service from Clapham Junction to Heathrow Airport. Journey times could be cut to 30 minutes.
- Wandsworth Council wants stopping services between central London and Gatwick Airport to call at Balham Station. This would create a new connection between the airport and the Northern Line.
- Improvements at Earlsfield, Balham, Wandsworth Town, Clapham Junction and Putney stations are now complete. These projects were part funded by the council.



River

• Wandsworth Council is supporting plans for a new riverbus pier at Plantation Wharf (west Battersea) and another at Battersea Power Station.







Tube

After years of campaigning by the council we are now closing in on Battersea's first Tube station. An application has now been submitted for the Northern Line extension which could be completed by 2020. Our next priority is to extend the line to Clapham Junction station.

- Wandsworth Council is pressing the rail authorities to create a new entrance to Putney Station from Oxford Road and has completed a feasibility study to develop the case.



A 'contra flow' cycle lane has been introduced on Childebert Road (a one way street) on a trial basis. The lane means pupils can ride to Ravenscourt Primary School without having to go via busy A-roads.

Celebrity chef Tana Ramsey has officially opened a brand-new café and shop at Paddock School.

Senior pupils at the Putney school for children with autistic spectrum disorders and complex needs will get work experience in the shop and café, while receiving teaching from specialist school staff. It will be open to the public during the day.

Tana, wife of TV chef Gordon and successful chef in her own right, raised the flag at the official opening – this will be flying whenever the café is open, with a separate entrance in Priory Lane. Actor Sam West from TV's Mr Selfridge, hosted a fundraising activities.

All the skills associated with working in a shop or café will be taught, including serving, till work and stocktaking. This helps pupils move on from school to find work placements in retail and catering and places on associated college courses.

Younger children at the secondary school will visit the café on a rota basis and learn to behave appropriately, order from specially designed menus, wait for service and pay using their pocket money. The hope is that this will make it easier for their parents to take thier children to local cafés and resturants.

Headteacher Peggy Walpole said:

"We want our shop and café to be at the heart of our school and local community and to be a place people want to come to eat, drink, meet and buy our creative and imaginative merchandise."

Dragon gives business help

Wandsworth is linking up with a TV Dragon to help the borough's young entrepreneurs.

The borough is the first local authority to work with the Start-Up Loans Company, a £117m Government-backed scheme to provide financial backing and mentoring support to people aged 18-30 with a strong business idea.

The Start-Up Loans Company is headed by James Caan from TV's Dragons' Den. "As one of the largest and most enterprising boroughs in London, Wandsworth will be the archetype for other boroughs in England," he told Brightside.

Already more than 3,500 low-cost, unsecured loans averaging £4,500 have been handed out across England to entrepreneurs across all industry sectors, including technology, beauty and professional services.

The aim is to set up 25,000 businesses in England by 2015, with a local target of 20 new businesses in Wandsworth alone this year.

New flightpath threat revealed

The entire borough could be subjected to aircraft noise if Heathrow is allowed to develop into a four runway hub, a town hall study has revealed.

Wandsworth has produced a set of indicative flightpath maps which show the parts of London which could be overflown if new runways were built to the north and south of the current alignment.

A new fourth runway to the south would lead to flights coming in to land over parts of Roehampton, West Putney, West Hill, East Putney, Southfields, Earlsfield, Wandsworth Common, Northcote, Nightingale, Tooting, Balham, Bedford, Graveney and Furzedown wards.

Clapham Common, Tooting Common, Wandsworth Common, King George's Park, Putney Heath and Richmond Park would all be affected.

The west of the borough would be worst hit, as planes would get progressively lower over peoples' homes and gardens as they approach the airport.

People living under the existing flightpaths in Putney and Battersea are kept awake from 4.30am as the first arrivals come



in to land. Councillors fear that the rest of Wandsworth would face the same level of daily disruption if a fourth runway was built in this location.


Council leader Ravi Govindia said:

"Almost every part of Wandsworth would be affected by aircraft noise if Heathrow expands to a four runway hub in its current site. People living in the north of our borough already suffer terribly from noise pollution which keeps them awake from 4.30 in the morning. If the airport bosses get their way the rest of Wandsworth will face the same level of daily disruption.

"We beat the previous Government's plans for a third runway in the High Court and we will do everything in our powers to halt Heathrow's latest push for expansion."

Wandsworth has consistently warned that Heathrow will not stop expanding if granted a third landing strip.

Medal from PM for Arctic convoy hero

A former councillor who served his country with great courage in World War Two has been presented with a newly-created Arctic convoy medal by the Prime Minister.

Gordon Passmore was among 40 veterans presented with an Arctic Star in a ceremony at Downing Street in recognition of his brave wartime service.

The Arctic convoys, branded the "worst journey in the world" by Winston Churchill, took vitally needed war supplies to the Soviet Union from 1941 to 1945. More than 3,000 Royal Navy sailors and merchant seamen died during the perilous voyage to the northern Russian ports of Murmansk and Archangel. Mr Passmore was a gunner in the Fleet Air Arm that provided air cover against the constant threat from German U-boats, aircraft and surface raiders.

His service as an elected Wandsworth councillor began in 1960 when he was voted onto the town hall in a by-election. He then remained in public office for the next 46 years before retiring as a Northcote councillor at the 2006 local elections.

Happy birthday BAC

Creating a fantastic tube ride

Youngsters at some of Wandsworth's special schools have been helping an innovative theatre company develop plays for children with disabilities.

The Oily Cart theatre company based in Earlsfield has been creating work for young people with profound and multiple learning disabilities all over the UK since 1981.

The charity works with Wandsworth schools to develop multi-sensory, interactive productions. Recently the company has been working with Greenmead School in Putney to create a show called Tube.

Tube is about all the things that can be made from, and all the things that come out of, tubes, including perfumes and music, and all the things you can see through them. The set and costumes are made out of tubes, and the cast members adapt their performance to the specific requirements of each individual in the audience.

Artistic Director Tim Webb explains:

"We work hard to tailor our shows to the needs of the audience, and in some cases they may not be able to hear or see, so they have to be multi-sensory.

"We work regularly with Wandsworth's special schools to develop our shows, which then go on tour to schools and theatres around the UK. As well as Greenmead we've worked with Paddock School to create a specific version of Tube for young people on the autistic spectrum."

Gail Weir, Greenmead's headteacher, welcomed Oily Cart's ability to truly engage students and bring more variety to the classroom.

"By carefully observing the body language and facial expressions of the children they're able to tailor-make their shows for a variety of children. During the shows they elicit a variety of responses often not seen in class."

Kicking out unwanted visitors

Infested with mice or bothered by bed bugs?

It's not the most glamorous job in the world, but Jeff Pywell is the people of Wandsworth's last line of defence, against unwanted houseguests.

Jeff is the council's pest control manager, and Brightside travelled around the Borough to see him in action. First it's into a familiar green council van. Wasps, bedbugs, rats and cockroaches are all dealt with by the team, but their bread and butter work is mice.

"Statistically most properties have either had them, got them or is going to get them," Jeff warns. "Keeping your property clean will reduce this risk. They only need three grams of food a day per mouse, so a few crumbs will keep them going."

Jeff has been working in pest control for over 20 years, firstly working for a private company, but now likes the feeling of trust he gets from the public while working for Wandsworth.

"They find they get good service from the council and we don't rip them off – we're not making money, just covering our costs."

The first stop of the afternoon is at the Alton Estate. There's a report of a pigeon infestation, but the resident who reported the problem is out. Jeff checks the exterior, and we're off.

The owner of the Wandsworth Common house has rats and this is the pest control team's second visit. The rats don't seem to be taking the bait left previously, so Jeff arranges to look at the building's plans to try and find out how they're getting in through the drainage system."A lot of older properties have extensions built over the old outside toilet, which can cause problems, if not properly sealed by the builder. Decking will also hide a multitude of sins."

Next is a visit to a property close by with a cockroach problem. Jeff checks the monitoring traps laid previously. These are clear, and the resident reports that they have not seen any for a couple of weeks. Baits laid previously are then checked especially behind the fridge and freezers, an ideal location for cockroaches.

A couple of visits to premises to check mice and replenish baits show how cooperation from the resident on cleaning is essential. Then it's in the van and back to the office.

How to find and control...

Bedbugs: Try and keep the bedroom clean – it makes it easier to spot them. Look out for egg cases and small blackish spots.

Cockroaches: Cockroaches have long whip-like antennae and normally two pairs of wings. Keep kitchens clean and not too hot.

Mice and rats: mice are small with greybrown fur. Rats are much bigger. Avoid accumulations of rubbish, control compost heaps, don't leave excess food out for birds, ensure dustbin lids are on tightly and seal-up gaps around pipes.

Your guide to MEASLES



What is measles?

Measles is a **highly infectious** illness caused by the measles virus. It's most common in unimmunised **1-4 year olds**, but anyone who has not been immunised could catch measles at any age.

What is measles like?

Symptoms include **irritability**, a **runny nose**, **conjunctivitis** (**red eyes**), a hacking cough and an increasing fever that comes and goes. This is followed by a rash that usually starts on the forehead and spreads downwards over the face, neck and body.

How is measles spread?

Measles is **very contagious** and is easily spread through coughing and sneezing, close personal contact or direct contact with infected nasal or throat secretions. You can catch measles just by being in a room where a person with measles has been.

How serious is measles?

Measles is much more serious than many people think and can cause convulsions, ear infections, bronchitis, pneumonia and encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). Complications occur in about 1 in 15 children with measles.

How common is measles infection?

Cases have risen in recent years as immunisation rates have fallen. In 2012 there were nearly 2,000 confirmed cases in England, the highest annual total since 1994.

There is currently a measles outbreak in South Wales. Smaller measles outbreaks are also occurring in England in the North East and the North West.

What to do if you think you or your child has measles

Contact your GP surgery to make an appointment. Tell them if your child has a rash so they can isolate him/her from other patients.

What is the treatment for measles?

There is no specific treatment. Anyone with measles should drink lots of clear fluid to replace body water lost through the fever. Paracetamol can be used to reduce the fever.

Aspirin should NOT be given to children as it could cause Reye's Syndrome (a severe neurological disorder) in some children. Children should be closely monitored for complications and the doctor consulted on what symptoms to look for.

How soon should your child be back at school after measles?

Measles is most infectious from 4 days before the appearance of the rash until 4 days afterwards.

The Department of Health recommends that a child should be kept off school for 4 days after the onset of the rash.



When should the MMR be given?

Children should receive two doses of the measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine. In Wandsworth the first dose is given soon after the first birthday and the second at around 18 months.

To prevent further outbreaks of measles nationally, a catch-up MMR vaccination programme has been launched. Un-vaccinated and partially vaccinated 10-16 year olds are being identified in Wandsworth and will receive invitations to receive the vaccine from their GPs.

Is the MMR vaccine safe?

The MMR vaccine is very safe, and it is effective in preventing measles as well as mumps and rubella. Vaccines, like any medicine, can have side effects. Most children who get the MMR vaccine have no side effects. Those that do occur are typically very mild, such as a fever or rash.

Where can I get the MMR?

If you are unsure whether you or your child have had the MMR jab contact your GP. You can also get the MMR jab for **children aged under 19 years** at one of Wandsworth's out-of-hours community immunisation clinics:

- St John's Therapy Centre every Wednesday between 3pm and 6.40pm
- Balham Health Centre every Saturday between 11am and 12noon

Projects include the the Love to Learn refugee education project, youth work and activities for older people. KLS also hosts 33 charities and community groups, including the Young Carers' project (pictured)

Brand-new park for Wandsworth

The Wandle Valley Regional Park will be established over the next ten years, and will stretch from Croydon and Sutton, through Merton and Wandsworth to the Thames.

It will connect a network of historically-rich green spaces to create a green haven along the river.

The aim is to give people a refuge from urban life, get them closer to nature and enable them to get some fresh air and exercise. It will also help stimulate the economy of the Wandle Valley, bringing new jobs and growth.

The project is being developed by a partnership of local authorities,

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including Wandsworth, and other groups who have formed the Wandle Valley Regional Park Trust, whose board includes Wandsworth councillors Sarah McDermott and Matthew Maxwell-Scott.

The partners are currently attracting new investment. A successful bid to Transport for London by charity Sustrans has secured £500,000 towards improvements to the Wandle Trail – the 12 mile walking and cycling route that follows the river from Croydon and Carshalton to the Thames.

This year the riverside path between Trewint Street in Earlsfield and Plough Lane will be upgraded and a feasibility study will look at options to create a safe new path that avoids the traffic in Earlsfield.

This month the partners will also hear if they have been successful in securing the £2.5m Living Wandle Landscape Partnership scheme through a grant from Heritage Lottery which will bring new funding for improvements to the river and local green spaces and help make the valley more accessible and welcoming to visitors. Living Wandle will also fund volunteering, educational and community projects.

And Wandsworth and other south London councils are continuing to lobby for the abolition of the levy paid by authorities across London towards the upkeep of the Lee Valley regional park. Despite being some 30 miles away, this year Wandsworth council tax payers have been forced to pay more than £386,000 – money the council believes would be better spent on the new Wandle Valley Park.

The council's also signed a new £750,000 annual tree maintenance contract. There are now more than 60,000 trees growing in local parks and another 15,000 in residential streets. More than 820 were planted last year.

Rose's Wandsworth memories



Long-term Wandsworth resident Rose Coleman, 92, has sent Brightside her memories of life in the borough long ago.

"I was born in Battersea along Lavender Hill. There were seven altogether in our family – five children and Mum and Dad.

Each Friday Dad would come home with his wages. My sister and I waited for our Friday penny and then we would go to Clapham Junction. There used to be an opening in the wall or fence and inside there was a fairground. With our penny we would make for the horses – it was lovely going round and round. A lot of people wouldn't remember this now, but I do.

"I started work in a factory along Kimber Road in Southfields. When the war came I left there and went to Hunts* in Garratt Lane. I did war work – radio parts for planes tanks and ships – so I was kept busy.

"When the war ended I became an usherette in the Plaza Cinema, Southfields. That's where I met my husband and I had two daughters . One, Linda, gave up work to look after me – how she puts up with me I don't know!"




