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Top marks for borough students

Wandsworth students have done the borough proud once again.

This year 63 per cent of pupils achieved five or more GCSEs including English and maths - a rise of three per cent compared to 2012.

Chestnut Grove, in Balham, and Southfields achieved their best set of results to date, while results for five A*-C passes at GCSE, including English and Maths, went up eight points at St John Bosco and 14 points at Battersea Park. There was also an increase in the number of students gaining the English Baccalaureate, which covers a core of academic subjects, at Graveney, Burntwood, Ernest Bevin and Battersea Park.

At A-level there was an increase of 3.2 per cent in the number achieving Grades A* to C, compared to a rise nationally of 0.6 per cent. Saint Cecilia's, Wandsworth achieved an A* to C pass rate of 87 per cent, up 13 points from the previous year.

Councillor Kathy Tracey, Wandsworth's schools spokesman, praised the efforts of students across the borough, and said the results were yet more evidence of the quality of local schools.

"All of our students deserve to be congratulated for their performances this year. Praise must also go to the fantastic teaching staff. Having seen such excellent performances in last week's excellent A-level results as well, the challenge going forward is to continue raising standards in all of the borough's schools."

Meeting the challenge

Hundreds of Roehampton residents who commit to leading healthier lives will be offered free gym or swimming memberships.

The scheme from Wandsworth Council's public health team will see eligible local people receiving either a gym membership at Roehampton Sport and Fitness Centre or a swimming membership at Putney Leisure Centre.

It is part of a new one year healthy living scheme called the Roehampton Challenge, through which residents can access a variety of health support services, community schemes or activity sessions.

The Challenge was launched at this year's Roehampton Festival, (pictured) which saw hundreds of local people enjoy live music, food and entertainment, tips from health trainers, advice on local education and training opportunities and information on the council's Alton area improvement project.

Don't lose your vote

Voter registration forms will be delivered to every Wandsworth household in the first week of October.

In order to vote in next May's local council and European Parliamentary elections you will need to complete and return your form immediately. It is a legal requirement that every household completes the form, even if the residents do not qualify or wish to vote. Providing your details promptly will avoid the need for council staff to call at your address to verify who lives there. This will save council tax payers' money.

If your details have not changed you can use the Freephone, online or text service. You will need to have your form in front of you. If your details have changed or you prefer to complete and return the form, do so straight away.

Wanted for flytipping

Flytippers could find their faces on wanted posters

Wandsworth Council is asking local people to help keep the borough's streets clean by reporting anyone they recognise.

CCTV footage in Selkirk Road, Tooting appeared to show a man leaving bags of rubbish in the street. He has become the first to feature on a wanted poster put up in the area. The council intends to use posters like this when it has footage or pictures of a suspected flytipper, but is unable to identify them.

Councillor Jonathan Cook, the borough's environment spokesman, said: "I hope our residents welcome these steps to stop flytippers from creating mess that no one wants to see. We are doing all we can to take care of our streets - but to do the best job possible we need the community's help.

"We will look to use CCTV to combat persistent incidents of flytipping in a particular location or catch those responsible for significant incidents where a large amount of rubbish has been flagrantly dumped in public."

Over the past four months the council has issued 270 fixed penalty notices to people caught flytipping, given 66 verbal warnings and, in serious cases, prosecuted eight people.

Around 6,000 potholes filled

The biggest street improvement project to take place in Wandsworth for years has now seen the borough's dedicated repair crews fill in more than 6,000 potholes.

Action crews are visiting three borough wards each month - eventually visiting the whole borough. Another three crews are repairing pavements.

In October pothole crews will be in Earlsfield, Nightingale and West Hill, while pavements will be fixed in St Mary's Park, Wandsworth Common and West Putney.

Wandsworth Council's transport spokesman, Councillor Russell King, said: "Up and down the country, the scale of the damage to road surfaces caused by recent harsh winters is obvious. This is why, having also listened to concerns from residents, we made it a priority to take urgent action to sort out the problem."

New life for Ram Brewery

Plans to redevelop the Ram Brewery in Wandsworth Town, creating 661 new homes and more than 500 permanent jobs, have been given the green light.



The brewery stopped wholesale production several years ago. The approved plans include a 36-storey residential tower, and more than 10,683 square metres of commercial space including new shops, cafes, bars and restaurants.

The site's historic buildings will be restored and brought into public use as a new micro-brewery and brewing museum. The banks of the River Wandle will be opened up and a network of public squares and footpaths created through the site and around the heritage buildings.

The developers will pay around £16.5m in community infrastructure levy (CIL) which could go towards a redesign of the Wandsworth one-way-system. The council is working with TfL to develop a new road system which would rechannel through traffic and reconnect both side of the town. Ten per cent of the new homes would be affordable units with priority going to existing Wandsworth residents.

Free NHS health checks for the over 40s

The council is offering Wandsworth people free NHS Health Checks in community centres and even a bingo hall in a bid to reduce heart and kidney disease, stroke and diabetes.

There is already a well established NHS Health Check Programme delivered by GPs that has provided more than 35,000 NHS Health Checks to Wandsworth residents. Now the council has commissioned a community-based NHS Health Checks service offering the service at mobile clinics across the borough.

Never put sharp items such as broken glass in your rubbish unless safely wrapped to avoid injuring your refuse collector. A new hospital inspection regime has been welcomed by Wandsworth Council and St George's Hospital in Tooting. All hospitals will get a mixture of announced and unannounced inspections. Cllr Jim Maddan, the council's spokesman for adult care and health, said "The new approach is more comprehensive and puts patients at the heart of the inspection process."

Shams spotted

More and more sham weddings are being detected, warn Wandsworth's registrars. Last year town hall staff notified border and immigration authorities after uncovering 94 sham marriages. This compares to 16 cases in 2010/11.

Wandsworth's chief superintendant registrar Judith Gent said; "Staff at the register office are becoming increasingly skilled at spotting couples who appear to be getting married for dubious rather than romantic reasons. People who are trying to organise a bogus wedding at our register office should definitely think again."

Gas safety

Landlords should arrange a gas safety check every 12 months for their rented properties, as well as giving their tenants a record of the check to prove appliances are in good condition. Thousands of people across the UK fall victim to carbon monoxide poisoning each year due to badly fitted and poorly serviced gas appliances, which can also cause gas leaks, fires and explosions. New-look playground is a hit

The children's playground at Battersea Park is fully reopened to the public following its £250,000 facelift, and will be available to use throughout the winter months.

Its new attractions have proved popular with parents, and there are further plans being discussed to introduce climbing walls and a "tree walk" facility. This would utilise high wires and harnesses to enable young people to enjoy a series of high rise challenges under the supervision of properly trained adults.

As part of the wider revamp of play facilities in Wandsworth, the Kimber Road playground is being transformed into a £170,000 skatepark and BMX bike track. The council manages more than 200 playgrounds and play areas in parks, commons and housing estates across Wandsworth.

Protection for pub

The much-loved Wheatsheaf pub in Tooting has been officially recognised as an Asset of Community Value (ACV) by Wandsworth Council following a campaign by local people.

ACV status gives members of the community time to bid to buy the Upper Tooting Road site should it ever come up for sale. Campaigners feared a supermarket chain might want to buy it and convert it into a store.

Also added to the council's list of assets of community value is The Lodge in Tooting Bec Road. Wandsworth Council formally put it on the list after receiving an application from local group Custodians of Tooting Bec Lodge.

The Localism Act 2011 gives communities with a local



connection a right to identify properties which, if they came up for sale, they would want to try and purchase.

The legislation does not give a right to buy the property in question - but it does give potential bidders the time to put a proposal together.

Parents pledge to go smokefree



Mums and dads in Roehampton have taken the lead in a bid to protect children from second-hand smoke.

For the past year the council's public health team has been working with children's centres across Wandsworth to encourage parents and carers to take a Smokefree Homes Pledge – which means children in their home will not be subjected to anybody's tobacco smoke.

Eastwood Nursery School Centre for Children and Families in Roehampton had the most pledges by far – with 78 homes now smokefree.

Three of the mums, Deborah Foot, Nicola Brisley and Wendy Peddar, have taken the scheme to the next step and are now Parent Champions – trained to help and support other parents and carers to take the smokefree homes pledge.

There is a new on-site stop smoking drop-in clinic at the centre staffed by the council's stop smoking team and one of the newly-qualified Parent Champions. Other outreach clinics are planned for other locations in Roehampton.

The council's health spokesman Cllr. Jim Maddan (pictured above) said:

"We are all extremely impressed by the hard work and dedication of these parents. We know that passive smoking is harmful to children. It's great if mums and dads give up cigarettes, but pledging to go smokefree is even better, because it means nobody will be smoking around your children in their own home."

Nicola Brisley and Deborah Foot have enthusiastically embraced the scheme. Deborah says:

I gave up two years ago and decided that having a smokefree home was better for the children's health so I took the pledge. Now I'm going to take level two of the pledge, which means I'll be able to run a clinic and help others. 99





Getting Wandsworth people into work

New jobs service Wandsworth WorkMatch has been set up by the council to help match local people with employment opportunities.

Developers in Wandsworth have so far agreed to provide more than 440 job and training opportunities for unemployed local residents in the years ahead.

The opportunities will be spread across Battersea Power Station, Riverlight, Embassy Garden, Sainsbury's Garratt Lane and Putney Plaza development sites.

The supply of new opportunities is expected to grow as more development projects use Wandsworth WorkMatch as their local recruitment service. These include the Ram Brewery in Wandsworth Town and several more schemes in Nine Elms on the South Bank. WorkMatch will screen and vet local candidates carefully before they apply and can also direct local candidates to the prejob training and support they need to get them ready for the workplace.

Ravi Govindia, leader of Wandsworth Council and co-chair of the Nine Elms Vauxhall Partnership, said:

"We are using major new developments in Nine Elms and across Wandsworth to give unemployed residents a route into a lasting career. The council is securing a local employment commitment from each developer as part of their planning consent but that is only the first step. The more difficult part is to ensure local unemployed people are matched to these opportunities and that they are fully prepared when the chance comes along."

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Putney's cleaner air boost

Pollution in Putney has fallen to the lowest levels since recording began in 2009, initial figures suggest.

Provisional data suggests that average nitrogen dioxide (NO2) levels on Putney High Street between September 2012 and August 2013 was 11.8 per cent lower than the preceding 12 months.

The pollution data – which is in raw form and yet to be ratified – shows that every month this year the mean concentration of NO2 recorded was lower than the same month in 2012, 2011, 2010 and 2009.

Over the last 12 months the older, more polluting diesel buses which run via Putney High Street have been gradually replaced with new, cleaner models or fitted with pollution reducing catalytic-convertors after Wandsworth Council used number plate recognition cameras and real time air quality data to pin-point buses as the main source of pollution on the high street.

ARK Putney Academy plans agreed

Councillors on the planning committee have approved proposals for the £30m refurbishment and modernisation of the Ark Putney Academy.

The proposals will see a complete refurbishment of the secondary school's Grade II listed main building, and the construction of a brand new replacement sports hall. The school will also get a new multi-use games area for football, tennis and netball. The playground will be refurbished and there will be new tree planting and horticultural improvements.

Apart from the gym block, which was too low to accommodate many modern sports, the main school building is badly in need of major refurbishment. The £30m needed to bring it up to modern teaching standards will partly be funded by the construction of housing on a former part of the school site, which is subject to a separate planning application.

Millions invested in housing estates

Plans have been unveiled for the latest wave of improvements for local housing estates.

Around £6.7m has been earmarked by the council to upgrade people's homes and neighbourhoods across the borough, including the Doddington estate in Battersea, Putney's Ashburton, the Aboyne estate in Earlsfield and the Glen Albyn and Ackroydon estates in Southfields.

Leaseholders are being consulted on the proposed works, which range from new windows, new roofs and upgraded entrycall security systems to new heating and hot water systems and internal and external redecorations.

The council spends about £50m a year on repairs and improvements to its housing estates. This sustained level of investment, combined with the housing department's efficiency as a landlord, has resulted in an 82 per cent satisfaction score among the borough's council tenants - one of the highest approval ratings in the country. Wandsworth was also able to meet the Government's target of reaching the decent homes standard for all its 33,000 properties a full five years before the deadline.

Mount Anvil, developers of the Filaments housing scheme in Wandsworth Town Centre, say a quarter of their buyers are taking advantage of the Government's Help to Buy scheme, which provides buyers with an equity loan. Your Right to Buy

A total of 38 working households in Wandsworth have exercised the Right to Buy their council home since the maximum discount was increased to \pm 100,000 last March.

Wandsworth Council led a successful campaign to increase the discount, which had been cut to a maximum of £16,000 by the previous government. The funds raised through Right to Buy sales will be used to finance new affordable housing options for other local people.

Interview with Andrew

Brightside meets Andrew Castle, former tennis pro, TV sports commentator and proud Wandsworth resident. **Lydia Nixon** went along to his Balham home to ask about his proudest career moments and why he loves Wandsworth.

Andrew you've had an extremely varied career. What moment most stands out?

When, in 71 Degrees North, Sophie Angleton held my head whilst Annabel Croft licked maggots off my face and spat them into a glass – that's when I knew I'd made it! I don't take to all reality TV though. Dancing in front of millions of people on Strictly every week was hell on earth!

Despite being a double time Olympian and number one tennis player – that's what you're most proud of?

No, but that memory has stuck with me. I am most proud of making a living out of doing what I love. It is not an easy way to live– there is such competition for your job and little security - but I put myself in the arena, had a go, and survived.

You've interviewed everyone from Tony Blair to Tom Cruise. Who have you most enjoyed talking to?

I was fortunate enough to meet Vera Lynn in her 90s. She has had such an interesting life. She told me about how she trekked for three days to sing to the troops and how Winston Churchill stopped his car when he saw her on the street and invited her for a drink. Before she left she sang 'We'll meet again' to me, it was such an honour. Second to Vera of course was interviewing/flirting with Helen Mirren – that woman has a glint in her eye.

How long have you lived in Wandsworth?

I have been here 12 years. Before that we lived in Lambeth. Anyone who moves from any borough into Wandsworth knows they've made the right choice.

Why do you love Wandsworth?

The roads and streets are cleaner, the low council tax, less bureaucracy and you get a sensible answer from council staff. I am especially impressed with the rubbish collectors. They work hard and they're tough boys – I worry one of them will run off with my daughter! It's also a great place to live if you are into your sports – it has so many great parks to run about in.

Do you think Wandsworth does enough to encourage sport?

I think it does reasonably well. There are lots of courses for young people to get involved in. But I think that it should be down to the individual to take responsibility. As humans we need physical exercise, it makes you feel better. There is too much sitting about in our society today. This is partly why I have taken up being an ambassador for Virgin Active..

What's your favourite place to visit in Wandsworth?

It is hard to pick just one. Balham is a lively place these days and there are lots of great restaurants and pubs opening up. It's home to Chez Bruce – which, in my opinion, is one of the best places to eat in the world – but I also enjoy a pint at The Bedford. But above and beyond anywhere, it has to be Clapham Common – which holds so many happy memories of bringing up my kids.

What have you got coming up next?

I currently do a slot on LBC radio. You can tune in to 97.3 if you want to hear me talk for an hour! I've also got the O2 tennis world tour finals with the BBC coming up in November.



New powers needed to deter dangerous dogs

Courts need the power to impose life sentences in dangerous dog attack cases that result in a person's death, the council argues.

Wandsworth outlined its stance in response to a Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs' (Defra) consultation. The maximum sentence is currently two years in prison, an unlimited fine, or both.

Wandsworth's community safety spokesman, Councillor Jonathan Cook, said: "The council has taken practical steps to promote responsible dog ownership, such as offering free dog microchipping to council tenants and leaseholders and providing the service at a reduced rate to other residents - but we feel strongly that more serious deterrents are needed to help combat this issue."

It has been a condition of council tenancies and leases since 2009 that all dogs must be microchipped and registered with the council. As well as microchipping, Wandsworth has been piloting a free dog neutering scheme in partnership with the local RSPCA branch.

Wandsworth has spearheaded the call for changes in legislation for the control of dangerous dogs. The council has been working alongside organisations like Battersea Dogs and Cats Home, Dogs Trust, The Kennel Club and the RSPCA for many years to encourage responsible dog ownership.

Green light for new school in Battersea

A new Catholic secondary school and sixth form college at Surrey Lane, Battersea has been approved by planners.

The site will become the new permanent home for the Saint John Bosco College which was formed in 2011 through the merger of two existing Catholic schools - John Paul II and Salesian College. The school is currently located on the former John Paul II site at Princes Way, Southfields and will move to its Battersea home once the new building is ready.

The college, rated 'good' by Ofsted, currently has 529 pupils. The new campus will be able to support up to 1,300. The development will create a four-storey school building with outdoor play areas as well as a new three-storey community building, two residential blocks and two town houses.





Community work for bogus beggar

A street beggar who duped well-wishers in Putney into thinking he was homeless - while living in a £300,000 flat in Fulham - has been told to carry out 40 hours of unpaid community work after breaching his anti-social behaviour order.

Simon Wright was convicted of breaching the order at West London Magistrates Court after he was spotted begging for cash in the West End. The original order banning Mr Wright from Putney and prohibiting him begging anywhere in London was secured in June as a result of close co-operation between the Thamesfield ward safer neighbourhoods team, Wandsworth Council's community safety department and the Crown Prosecution Service. The order remains in place until May 2015.

Find historical gems

The Ticl app has added some new features to help people get the best of out living in Putney.

It is now possible to find all the listed buildings in SW15 and all the notable graves in Putney Vale Cemetery, including Tutankhamun explorer Howard Carter's. Wandsworth Park – Discover the Trees enables users to identify tree species in the park and Ticl has also worked with Wandsworth Historical Society to find, photograph and tag all the milestones in SW15 – with one of them being rediscovered in the process.

what we are doing ...

Value for money

Keeping council tax bills as low as possible.

What we are doing...

- In March we froze council tax for the sixth year running, with an average Band D council tax at £685.77. This is the lowest average council tax in England and Wales.
- We have already identified £70 million a year of savings since 2010
- To meet the country's financial challenges, we still need to make a further £40 million a year savings by 2015. We have started a major review of all council services to look at how they should be delivered in the future.

Investing in our neighbourhoods

We are bringing millions of pounds worth of investment to the Alton area in Roehampton and the Winstanley and York Road estates in Battersea.

What we are doing...

- Specialist masterplanning teams are working with local people to develop new ideas for how the areas can be improved
- The main aims are to improve housing, enhance the local environment, create jobs and help estate residents to get on in life
- Final proposals for both areas are expected to emerge early next year.

Improving our schools

A new two form entry school will be opening at the Tooting Primary School in Franciscan Road, sponsored by Graveney School.
- The Putney Ark Academy continues to go from strength to strength. It has been awarded a 'good' rating by Ofsted and is undergoing major renovation works.
- We've extended several borough primary schools to meet growing demand, and have consulted local people on further expansions.
- Exam results have bucked the national trend, with improvements at GCSE and A-level (see page 3).
- We're investing more than £1m in providing better nursery facilities for disadvantaged children in the borough.
- Ofsted has judged Wandsworth schools among the best in the country, with 92 per cent rated good or outstanding





Improving health and social care

We're working to help keep people healthy and independent.

What are we doing...

- The use of personal budgets is giving people more control over how their social care services are provided.
- Schemes such as the Reablement Service are helping to keep people independent, out of hospital and living in their own home.
- The council is now responsible for public health, enabling a much more joined-up approach. The public health team will work with colleagues in adult social services, housing, schools and others to find co-ordinated ways to improve the health of Wandsworth people.

Creating new job opportunities

Regeneration in Nine Elms and Wandsworth Town are bringing valuable new job and training opportunities to the brighter borough and the council is helping local people to take full advantage.

What we are doing...

- Construction jobs, traineeships and full apprenticeships are now being created in Nine Elms and other areas as major developments like Battersea Power Station get going.
- The council's new Wandsworth Work Match team is linking unemployed local people to these opportunities before they are released to the rest of London. See page 9 for more information.
- A range of new office, retail and leisure premises is now being built. As more commercial space is completed the number of permanent local jobs is set to increase by tens of thousands.



Improving transport

We want to make it as easy as possible for our residents to get around, from improving the roads and pavement outside your home right through to bringing new tube stations to the borough

What we are doing...

- Investing £6.4 million on road and pavement improvements. Every street in the borough is being inspected.
- Tube to Battersea as part of the regeneration of Nine Elms and working to bring the Tube to Clapham Junction.
- Working with the Mayor to bring Boris Bikes to Battersea, Wandsworth Town and Putney. The first docking stations should be operational by the end of 2013.
- Helping fund improvements to Earlsfield, Balham, Wandsworth Town, Clapham Junction and Putney Stations.
- Building the case for a direct rail link from Clapham Junction to Heathrow.
- Pressing for new bus routes including Tooting to Fulham, Balham to Wandsworth and Barnes Station to Roehampton.
- Prioritising the removal of the Wandsworth one-way system and returning roads to two-way working



Standing up for Wandsworth

We will continue to campaign, on your behalf, to protect our borough and our residents.

What we are doing...

- Working with local people we fought off plans for a giant tunnelling compound at Barn Elms as part of the Thames Tideway Tunnel project.
- We are campaigning against Heathrow's plans to create new flightpaths over Wandsworth and to reduce the impact of night flights.
- We have highlighted the air pollution issues on Putney High Street and secured cleaner, greener buses from TfL to bring down the levels of harmful N02 emissions. Our strategy is working but we have a long way to go.

Formula Grant received from the Government was £142.0 million. Based on their calculation of a like for like basis this represents a reduction of £11.3 million (7.3 per cent) on the 2011/12 grant settlement. This compares with average reduction of 7.2 per cent nationally and 6.9 per cent for the London area.

The council's share of the council tax has increased by 4.8 per cent since 2003 in terms of the average band D amount of £377.00. The Greater London Authority share has increased by 36.7 per cent over the same period. The combined average band D amount for 2012/13 was £683.72, a decrease of £3.16 since 2011/12. The average council tax per dwelling of £662.84 remained the lowest in Great Britain and amounted to only 55 per cent of the average £1,200.88 for England.

GENERAL CAPITAL SPENDING - Capital spending represents money spent by the council on purchasing, upgrading and improving assets such as buildings and roads (capital spending on council housing is treated separately). The council receives the benefit from capital spending over a longer period of time. The table below shows the significant general capital schemes for 2012/13.

Capital receipts from the sale of council houses and council housing land came to £21.8 million, compared to £11.7 million the previous year. However under pooling arrangements £2.0 million of these receipts had to be paid to the government and £2.8 million set aside towards replacement affordable housing. The spending and income from council housing must be kept separate from other council spending. The Housing Revenue Account and the Major Repairs Reserve underpin the longer term business plan for housing.
