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Local businesses think pink

Hundreds of local shops, cafes and other small high street businesses have claimed a discount on their business rates bills following the launch of the council's 'pink envelope' campaign.

Wandsworth's small high street traders are now saving nearly $\pm 1m$ through the 'retail rates relief scheme' and the figure is still rising.

Naomi Ellis from ladies fashion boutique Anthology on Old York Road said: "I'm now saving hundreds of pounds and it took no time at all to complete the form."

And Lisa Barratt from Ackee Tree Caribbean fusion restaurant on Old York Road said:

"We're a new business so for us this is great news. We're saving a lot of money and it's a real lifeline in the early stages."

Eligible businesses can get up to a £1,000 discount on their business rates bill this year and another £1,000 off in 2015/16. Businesses that could qualify for the scheme include shops, restaurants, cafes, takeaways, pubs and bars, post offices, charity shops, hairdressers and beauty salons, dry cleaners, other high street stores, food outlets and services. Businesses

Heathrow expansion would be 'devastating blow'

Wandsworth Council leader Ravi Govindia is cautioning ministers against further expansion of Heathrow Airport warning it would 'deal a devastating environmental blow to millions of Londoners'.

The warning comes in the wake of the recommendation published by the Government's independent Airports Commission that proposals for a new airport in the Thames estuary should be rejected. If ministers follow this advice it would leave Heathrow as one of the likely options for additional airport capacity in the south east.

Councillor Govindia said: "Allowing a third and even possibly a fourth runway to be built at Heathrow would mean hundreds of thousands of additional flights to and from the airport every year. The extra noise this would create is simply unacceptable. Millions more people would find themselves living under a new Heathrow flightpath and suffering the problems this creates.

"If Heathrow had never been built no one would now be advocating it as a suitable site for a huge new airport. In our view it exceeded its limits a long time ago. It would be absolute folly to allow it to expand any further." "Gatwick has the space and the infrastructure to rise to the challenge and its expansion would create a healthy degree of competition between the two airports. It would also spark major new investment in rail services through south London into the heart of the city. Most importantly it has nothing like the environmental baggage associated with a bigger, busier and much more polluting Heathrow. "

The Government has confirmed that a plan to more than double Heathrow night flights will not be considered until after next year's general election. The Airports Commission had recommended that the nightly quota was increased from 16 to 35 flights this year.

Steer clear of the loan sharks

Hundreds of local people have set up savings accounts or applied for loans with the Wandsworth Plus Credit Union since it launched in the new year.

The council is keen to make sure the people that live or work in Wandsworth can access affordable credit and do not fall victim to loan sharks or payday lenders. It has teamed up with Wandsworth Plus Credit Union to allow local people who would otherwise struggle to get credit to obtain affordable loans. It also offers an alternative way to save a regular amount for a rainy day.

Credit Unions are not-for-profit run organisations owned by their members, with any profits being shared fairly amongst the members or reinvested to provide better services.

They manage personal savings accounts of up to £15,000 and these are protected in exactly the same way as bank and building society deposits. Members are eligible for loans of between £50 and £7,500. Loans under £7,500 are often cheaper from a credit union than from anywhere else and there are no hidden charges.

Cycle-friendly roundabout for Queens Circus

An innovative new roundabout in Battersea will separate cyclists from other traffic.



The cycle friendly scheme is thought to be the first of its kind in London and has been developed in partnership between Wandsworth Council, Transport for London (TfL) and Battersea Power Station Development Company (BPSDC).

The project is one part of an ambitious plan to overhaul large sections of the street network in Nine Elms on the South Bank to prepare the former industrial area for a major increase in the residential and working population. The long-term aim is to make Nine Elms one of the most cycle and pedestrian friendly districts in central London.

The roundabout works are being funded by nearby development sites and managed by Blu-3 who work for the developers. The project will be undertaken in phases and is expected to finish in summer 2015.

Extra space has been created for the cycle lanes by reducing the size of the roundabout's central island. This means the space for other traffic is maintained and overall traffic can be better managed.

The roads will remain open for the vast majority of the project but there will be a need for temporary traffic lane and pavement closures as well as changes to bus stop locations.

New schools for Wandsworth

Four new schools will help provide much needed additional places for local children.

The council has appointed construction company Durkan to redevelop the derelict Putney Hospital site into a new local primary school. The new school – which will be called **Putney Oasis Academy** - is expected to open its doors to local children in September 2016.

Work is expected to begin soon on building a brand new free school in Roehampton. **The Mosaic Jewish Primary School**, which admitted its first 30 pupils last September will move from its existing temporary home in Wimbledon Parkside to a new purposebuilt modern school building in Roehampton Lane. Half of its intake will be Jewish but 50 per cent of places will be reserved for children of other faiths and beliefs and those from families who are not religious.

Rutherford House in Balham has had its official opening following the completion of building work at its new home on the former Youth Court site.

Meanwhile, building work is progressing on a new 420-pupil academy in Garratt Lane, Earlsfield. It will be run by the education charity **Floreat** and will open in September 2015. It will be open to pupils of all backgrounds and abilities.



Executive Principal, Paul Campbell (pictured left), has already been appointed. He said: "I can think of nothing more exciting than the opportunity to build a school from the ground up, in a vibrant community where children and their families have high aspirations for the future."

Upgrade for five leisure centres

Five of the borough's leisure centres will be upgraded thanks to a £3.5m improvement programme.

The council will be funding the improvements and refurbishments as part of a new seven year management contract.

Balham leisure centre will get an improved reception area, a bigger dance studio, new poolside sauna and steam rooms, full refurbishment of the wet changing village plus improvements to the weights room and changing rooms.

Battersea's **Latchmere centre** will get an extended fitness suite, upgraded reception area, refurbished dry changing rooms and an upgraded wet changing village.

At **Putney** the village change area will be modernised and a new sauna will be installed in the health suite.

Tooting Leisure Centre will see its village changing area fully refurbished, with improved lockers and changing cubicles, improvements to the health suite including the sauna and steam rooms, full refurbishment of the dry changing rooms and upgrades to the fitness suite and "spin studio".

And the Wandle will see remodelled and upgraded changing rooms.

Under the seven year contract, which was won after a full and open tendering process by Places for People Leisure Management Limited, formerly known as DC Leisure, the council will receive an income of £22m. Leisure spokesman Cllr Jonathan Cook said: "This is a great deal for the people who use our leisure centres and for the wider community.

"These five leisure centres, plus the Tooting Bec Lido will benefit from investment worth at least $\pounds 4.2m$ in new and improved facilities in the years ahead.

"In return for this capital investment, the council will receive guaranteed income of $\pm 22m$ over seven years, which will help fund local services and help keep council tax bills low."

New Lido fitness pavilion



Funding is now in place for a new \pounds 710,000 pavilion at Tooting Bec Lido that will provide space for workout and exercise classes plus new toilets and a first aid room.

The investment in the popular open air pool will draw on funds provided by the council, the South London Swimming Club (SLSC), and Sport England and could see the attractive new pavilion open next year. Visit www.wandsworth.gov.uk/lido.

Bridge repairs completed ahead of schedule

The £1.5m repairs to Putney Bridge have been completed, and the bridge was due to reopen on September 26.

The repairs began on July 14 and were originally timetabled to last a total of 12 weeks. This faster turnaround is down to speedy and efficient working by the council's chosen contractors FM Conway Ltd and also by the excellent planning and management of the contract by the council's in-house team of engineers who have overseen the project.

Transport spokesman Cllr Jonathan Cook said: "I would like to thank the travelling public for the great patience they have shown and feel sure that they, along with local businesses, will share our delight that this important Thames river crossing will be back to normal before the end of this month.

"Completing this huge amount of work in this short space of time is a superb achievement by everyone concerned, especially our team of engineers who planned and prepared everything brilliantly, managed the contractors very efficiently and stayed on top of the whole process to ensure there were no let ups or



delays in finishing the job.

"Getting a job of this scale completed early, properly and also very importantly on budget is a real triumph."



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Building an even stronger Wandsworth

Get on the jobs ladder

Free construction skills training has helped guide local people into jobs and apprenticeships on building sites in Nine Elms and across the borough.

The training pilot was commissioned by Wandsworth and Lambeth Councils and the courses were delivered by South Thames College and specialist construction training provider Mainport.

Across Wandsworth there is high and increasing demand for these building trades – particularly in Nine Elms.

The council and its Work Match team has secured agreements with many local developers which mean new jobs, apprenticeships and traineeships are reserved specifically for unemployed Wandsworth residents.

The latest news on the regeneration of Nine Elms includes:

- Demolition has started on the old Market Towers building to make way for a mixed-use scheme including more than 400 hundred homes, a hotel and a new public square with shops, restaurants and cafés
- Work to rebuild the power station chimneys is now underway
- Plans for a new community building have been approved next to Battersea Park Station
- A design completion has been announced for a new bridge across the Thames
- The Royal College of Art has moved into its new project space at Riverlight. This is to promote the cultural strategy for this development. Riverlight's first residents have now moved in.
- Christies Fine Arts Warehouse will be replaced with a mixed use development including 510 homes and new cultural space. This includes a Local Employment Agreement.

Twenty-four year old local resident Taide Ward was one

of the first people to complete the course. She said:

"I lost my job in admin but Work Match helped me get a new job doing admin for a big building firm.

I needed my CSCS card to be able to get on site. Now I've got my card that means I can keep my job and I've picked up extra skills too."

The free construction training pilot is part of the Wandsworth Jobs Package - a series of initiatives designed to help local people into work and to benefit from the borough's expanding jobs market.

Initiatives include recruitment roadshops, jobs fairs, apprenticeships, mentoring, a commitment to reserve hundreds of local jobs for local people and a scheme offering unemployed people homes if they secure lasting employment.

New tube link comes closer

The news that Transport for London has chosen a company to design and build the Northern Line extension has been welcomed by the council as an important next step in bringing the tube to Battersea.

Ferrovial Agroman Laing O'Rourke has been awarded the half a billion pound, sixyear contract which covers the main construction works. The full cost of the scheme, expected to be up to £1bn, is being funded entirely through developer contributions from Battersea Power Station and other developers and, from 2016, the creation of a new Enterprise Zone in Nine Elms. The powers to build the line are expected to be announced by the Government shortly and construction is due to start next year.

Wandsworth Council has campaigned for the Tube extension for many years, working closely on the scheme with Transport for London (TfL) and the GLA to develop the business case and financing package.

Two new Tube stations will be built – one at Battersea Power Station and another just off Wandsworth Road. They would connect to the rest of the Northern Line at Kennington Station and could be open by 2020.

The Northern line extension will help regenerate the Nine Elms area of Battersea by supporting up to 25,000 new jobs and more than 18,000 new homes. The people of Battersea will get access to the tube network for the first time, and journey times to the West End and the City will be cut to just under 15 minutes.





Other council transport priorities include:

- Securing more longer trains on local rail routes
- Improving Wandsworth's cycle route network
- Campaigning for Transport for London to extend the Cycle Hire scheme to other parts of the borough. Wandsworth's cycle hire docking stations are now being used 2,500 times a day
- Securing connections to the Crossrail2 underground line at Clapham Junction and Tooting Broadway
- Improving local railway stations including Battersea Park, Putney and Clapham Junction
- Replacing the Wandsworth Gyratory with a new two-way road system

Share your views and concerns on flooding

Local people are invited to give their views on the council's strategy to prevent flooding.

Following widespread flooding across the UK in 2007, the government gave councils new powers to identify, co-ordinate and manage flood risk.

The Local Flood Risk Management Strategy will set out how this will be done.

Earlier this year we asked residents and businesses for their views and concerns about flooding to help draw up the strategy. Now we are consulting on the first draft of the strategy to get further feedback before publishing a final version.

The first round of consultation has helped shape the strategy – for example it is clear local people want gullies cleared and would like better communication about flood risk.

Now we would like people's views on the proposed objectives and suggested actions to achieve these.

The objectives include

- Ensuring future developments take flood risk into account.
- Identifying sources of funding for flood risk management to pursue opportunities for undertaking further detailed investigation into local sources of flooding.

- Using our knowledge of flood risk to make sure we respond effectively to emergencies.
- Raising awareness of flood risk with residents and businesses and advising them how they can better protect themselves and their properties.
- Better partnership working with other agencies.

The consultation has been timed to fit in with a national consultation by the Environment Agency on a suite of Flood Risk Management Plans. The objectives and actions agreed by Wandsworth and other councils will feed into that.

The council's environment spokesman, Cllr Jonathan Cook, said:

"We are grateful to everyone who shared their views and concerns, and we have done our best to ensure the draft strategy reflects these. Wandsworth, like many other areas, is at risk of flooding – surface water, rivers and otherwise – and this strategy will help us effectively manage, and hopefully prevent, this.

"Now we would like feedback from local residents and businesses on the specific actions we propose so we can ensure the final strategy is joined up and robust and mirrors the needs of the local community." The consultation deadline is December 17, 2014.

Get help to quit

Next month is Stoptober, a national campaign that encourages people to quit smoking for 28 days.

There are smokers who manage to quit on their own, but there is very good evidence that with professional help you are four times more likely to successfully quit smoking. According to Public Health England, staying continuously quit for 28 days makes you five times more likely to stop for good.

Nearly a quarter of a million people in England and Wales turned their back on their cigarettes last year, reaping the financial, social and health benefits from taking part in Stoptober.

Help when you are feeling low

September 10 was the World Health Organisation's World Suicide Prevention Day. Globally more than 800,000 people commit suicide every year - more than from war.

The council's public health team is working to assess the extent of the problem locally and find ways to support vulnerable people. It has teamed up with local GPs, the Samaritans, local healthcare providers, the police, the ambulance service and the local coroner to form a Suicide Prevention Group and develop a prevention strategy.

Get flu safe

We all feel down from time to time; disappointment, failure and grief are part of life, but the group urges anyone experiencing continued low moods to get help by visiting their GP. It also recommends doing the following to help you maintain your well-being:

- Connect: feeling valued and close to people can help, so try and do something today to make a connection.
- Be Active: regular exercise is linked to low rates of depression and anxiety.
- Take Notice: learn to enjoy the moment.
- Keep Learning: learn something new it will make you feel better about yourself and encourage you to meet new people.
- Give: get involved in your local community

People with an increased risk of complications from flu are being urged to protect themselves and their families with a free flu jab. The council is working with the NHS and local pharmacies to make sure people most at risk from flu get the jab and Age UK will be promoting flu jab awareness to its service users.

- The flu jab is perfectly safe and can't give you flu
- The flu jab protects against H1N1 virus – the strain of flu that caused the "swine flu" pandemic in 2009
- The flu virus changes, so you need a flu jab every year
- If you're pregnant, the flu jab doesn't harm your unborn baby. In fact it can protect your baby from flu for the first few months of life
- Anyone aged 65 or over, carers, pregnant women, people with weakened immunity and those who have a long term health problem such as diabetes, severe asthma, chest, heart, liver or kidney complaint, are eligible for a free jab.

- Flu isn't just a cold, it can be a really serious illness

Owning your first home

The council's Home Ownership Team supports local people who want to get a foot on the housing ladder. Here's some of the ways you can get help.

Affordable Housing Day – Thursday 23 October 2014

The Home Ownership Team will be hosting the annual Affordable Housing Open Day on Thursday, October 23 in Wandsworth Civic Suite.

The Open Day is completely free and will help you find your way around the different Home Ownership schemes such as Shared Ownership, Right to Buy and House Purchase Grant.

Housing providers will be available to offer information and advice, plus legal and financial advice will be provided by property experts.

House Purchase Grant

This scheme gives council tenants a grant to help them buy a home of their own anywhere in the UK or European Union. It can also be used to adapt an existing UK property such as loft conversions or as a deposit towards a Shared Ownership property.

Grant levels have recently increased so if you have a 1-bed council property you could now be eligible for up to £35,000. That figures rises up to £60,000 for a 2-bed council property or bigger.

Your Right to Buy

From July 21, the maximum discount available on Right to Buy was increased further from $\pm 100,000$ to $\pm 102,700$.

The funds raised through RTB sales will continue to be used to finance new affordable housing options for other local people. A service that helps older people live independently at home has been taken to the next level thanks to a unique partnership with a leading UK charity.

The council's KITE service (Keep Independent Through Enablement) has been working with Leonard Cheshire Disability to develop the borough's enablement service, which helps people learn or relearn new skills to help them stay in their own home.

As part of a pilot project, some people who receive enablement in their homes from KITE were taken two or three times a week to the Randall Close Day Centre, run



by Leonard Cheshire. There they received therapy and physical health and wellbeing checks and could access gym equipment, art rooms, interact with other day centre users and get involved in other activities.

A presentation on the success of the pilot project was given to leading councillors and the minister for health, Jane Ellison. The scheme will now be expanded.

Battersea Through Time



Referred to as Patricesy in the Domesday Book, Battersea was historically best known for market gardening, providing fruit, vegetables and flowers for the City of London.

However, the area moved from rural to urban with the coming of the railways, industry and large-scale housing from the 1840s, triggering a population growth from 4,000 to 120,000 by the beginning of the twentieth century.







The Dogs' Home has helped more than three million animals since it was founded in 1871.



Then known as the Northcote Hotel, the Northcote Pub was built in 1869 and remains as popular as ever.





Northcote Road takes its name from Sir Stafford Northcote, Chancellor of the Exchequer and leading Tory politician at the time of the road's development.

Remembering the Great War



Four years' of events will commemorate the people of Wandsworth who gave their lives in World War One and remember the borough's largely unknown or forgotten involvement in the Great War.

The programme was launched in July with the official unveiling of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission interpretation board in Wandsworth Cemetery, Magdalen Road.

On the anniversary of the start of the war, on August 4, the town hall switched off all lights at 10pm and placed a single light at a window, as a mark of respect for those who lost their lives.

Why recycle?

Recycling is an easy way for us all to make a real difference to the environment. By choosing to recycle you are giving all of the items below a chance to be remade into something new, instead of being wasted.

Yes please!

We only want these clean and dry items in your recycling bag. Rinse any item that has contained food or drink and flatten cardboard, cartons and plastic bottles. Please do not recycle lids as they reduce the quality of the end product.



What happens to my recycling?

Your recyclable material goes to a Materials Recovery Facility (MRF) in Wandsworth where it is sorted into different material types. The materials are then baled and most are sent to locations in the UK for reprocessing into recycled goods. Some materials are exported because of a shortage of processing need in the UK. These exports are strictly controlled by law and audited by the Environment Agency.

- **Paper and cardboard** sent to various mills in Kent and the North West of England and recycled into office paper, newspaper, books and magazines often the paper, once recycled, is exported to foreign markets where the demand is great. Cardboard is usually made into new boxes/packaging but can also be used for other purposes, such as animal bedding.
- Glass bottles and jars mostly sent to a Kent-based glass reprocessing company where the mixed glass is separated out into colour and turned back into new glass products.
- Plastic items currently reprocessed in the UK and made into new bottles, bags, car parts and garden furniture.
- Cans and aerosols sent to a reprocessing plant in the North West of England and recycled into a variety of products including new cans, bicycle frames, pipes and train tracks.
- Food and drink cartons currently included with paper and cardboard. Can be recycled into a number of products, from plasterboard liner to high strength paper bags and envelopes.
