Next phase of school streets

Primary schools are being invited to get in touch with the council if they are interested in having a school street.

School streets mean the roads containing school entrances turn into traffic-free zones when pupils arrive in the morning and leave in the evenings. Wandsworth currently has 19 of them. Find out more at wandsworth.gov.uk/schoolstreets

Recently people living near school streets have been asked whether they support them, and councillors

will discuss the results in September and decide if they should be made permanent.

In the meantime, parents are being asked to make sure they park safely when they drop off their

child – even if they are in a hurry. Don't park on junctions, dropped pavements or cycle paths.



Getting back on track

The council has been working on its ambitious £2.6m five-point recovery plan for schools.

The aim is to get children back on track with their learning, help them regain the experiences they missed during the lockdown and make the most of the digital advances made during the pandemic.

Tutoring and Mentoring

The council's been working with schools on their recovery plans, supporting the delivery of high quality teaching and learning, as well as running several new mentoring and tutoring schemes. Almost all Wandsworth state secondary schools have signed up for the Government's summer school programme. This will help pupils transition into Year 7, build strong relationships and access opportunities including face-toface support in English and maths and activities like team games, music, drama and sport.

Healthy Minds

Wandsworth is working closely with partners like the CAMHS (Children and Adolescent Mental Health) services to make sure young people can access mental health support. Frontline workers like teachers and youth workers are being trained to identify mental health needs and offer support to young people and families. Meanwhile a team of social workers is now working in targeted schools.

Sport and Arts

Summer schools and holiday programmes are being targeted at children who may otherwise not have access to activities. See page 13 for more on our Summer Unlocked scheme. Libraries will also run targeted schemes and the council's arts team is working to help get children creative, including 'A Greener Picture' – see more about that on pages 11-12.

Access to Digital Technology

The council is working with schools and communities to provide digital support and reduce digital poverty. Devices and IT training are being provided through the Power to Connect scheme.

Employability

A new team has been set up to track what jobs and training school leavers move into, plus the council runs a wide range of work experience, training and apprenticeship schemes.



One of the projects will put social workers in schools. **Maja Zafirovska** is Assistant Principal and Designated Member of Staff for Safeguarding at Burntwood School, which is taking part in the scheme:

We are delighted that Burntwood School has been selected to take part in this council-funded pilot project. We will have a social worker based in our school for two days a week until March 2022 in the first instance. The social worker will liaise closely with staff, parents, students and other professionals, with a view to offering tailored support to students.

"Sarah Gill, our School Based Social Worker, has been fantastic to work with. She has shown a proactive approach and professionalism when supporting our students. She has forged positive, trusting relationships with our students in the short time she has been here. We are looking forward to working together in the coming months to provide the most effective provision for our school.

Royal visit

In the last edition of Headstart we told you about Griffin School's new Life Changing Library - the school was one of six in the UK to be chosen by the Poet Laureate Cressida Cowell to get a new library space stocked with a thousand books.

The Duchess of Cornwall officially opened the new library last month and read The Tiger Who Came to Tea. Cressida Cowell led a draw-along session and pupils performed a specially-written song.



Working together

State and independent schools in Wandsworth are teaming up.

The partnership will make resources and opportunities open to all the borough's young people, and enable schools to learn from each other. The scheme formally launched last month and 48 state schools and 14 independent schools are taking part.

The scheme will pick up pace in the autumn, with around a thousand children taking part in joint projects. "We've been in discussions with schools since the start of this year and I'm pleased to say we already have a strong, creative partnership," said education spokesman Cllr Will Sweet. "The past 18 months have been testing for everyone, and I think we all agree it makes sense for us to pool our expertise and resources for the benefit of all our young people."

The project will focus on academic achievement, enrichment and raising aspirations. Children will get access to science, arts and sports facilities and to mentoring. There will also be a strong focus on professional development for teachers.

Richard Byrne-Smith, headteacher of Hotham School in Putney said:

It has been a pleasure to work with our colleagues in the independent sector to explore what we can do to bring our communities closer together as this demanding year comes to a close.

As educators, we all share similar values, and it has been deeply rewarding to build these new relationships for the benefit of our voung people.

Lisa Irwin, head of community partnership at Emanuel School, said:



Through consultation with our partner schools, we identified several interventions to help close the gap for pupils whose education has been hardest hit by school closures. Feedback on the impact in the classroom is extremely positive.



Renata Joseph, headteacher of Saint Cecilia's School, said:

Saint Cecilia's is excited to work alongside primary, secondary and special schools, from all sectors in the local community. One of our 4 Greats is to nurture great partnerships, that we hope will be an opportunity for young people to learn from and with each other.



As part of the partnership, a cluster of Battersea schools is taking part in Ascent, running on nine Saturday mornings at Emanuel School. This gives lessons in core subjects to Year 5 children who are failing to meet national standards in literacy and maths. There are also interactive sessions in science, sport and the arts taught by Emanuel staff and supported by Emanuel student volunteers.

Suzie Longstaff, Headmistress at Putney High School and the Independent school lead for the Roehampton Cluster, said:



This is a fantastic opportunity for our young people in Wandsworth to work together and take increased ownership of their community role. The project very much reflects Putney High School's "It Starts with Me" ethos and expands this to "It Starts with Us". We're seeing more and more how our students are actively wanting to find ways that they can make a tangible difference and our involvement in this project provides an opportunity to do just that.



Clean Air Day

Air quality officers from the council go to Wandsworth schools to teach young people about climate change and what everyone can do to clean up the air. They also work with schools in Nine Elms to reduce pollution as part of the Business Low Emission Neighbourhood. Here they are on Clean Air Day visiting Griffin School.

Pupils from 15 Wandsworth primary schools have been working with Wandsworth Council's Arts Team and artists



from the Royal College of Art to represent the climate emergency through photography.

They explored the theme of climate change through sculpture and cyanotype workshops and photographed their creative responses.

A selection of the images from A Greener Picture have been made into banners to be put outside Wandsworth Town Hall so that as many people as possible can see them and each participating school and all Wandsworth libraries will receive a printed book of the images. All images are also online in a digital exhibition as part of Wandsworth Arts Fringe 2021.

"As well as being an exciting way to show the work of young artists during WAF, A Greener Picture is part of our work to make the voices of young people part of our climate change pledge," said environment spokesman Cllr Kim Caddy.

When to get your child's jabs

Wandsworth's vaccination schedule, accurate as of June 2021

Age of your child	Diseases protected against
Two months old (two injections and one oral dose)	1st dose - Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis, polio, Haemophilus influenzae type b and hepatitis B (DTaP/IPV/Hib/HepB) 1st dose - Meningococcal B (MenB) 1st dose - Rotavirus
Three months old (two injections and one oral dose)	1 st dose - Pneumococcal (PCV) 2nd dose - DTaP/IPV/Hib/HepB 2nd dose - Rotavirus
Four months old (two injections)	3rd dose - DTaP/IPV/Hib/Нерв 2nd dose - Menв
Between 12 and 13 months old - within a month of their first birthday (four injections)	Booster Hib/Meningococcal C (Hib/MenC) Booster - PCV 1st dose - Measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) Booster - MenB
At 18 months (one injection)	*2nd dose - MMR
Three years four months old or soon after (one injection)	Booster - Diphtheria, tetanus, pertussis and polio (DTaP/IPV)
Two and three year olds (nasal spray, routinely given at general practice)	Influenza (each year from September)
Children in reception class and in school years 1-7 (given at school)	Influenza (each year from September)
* Please note that Wandsworth operates to an accelerated MMR vaccination schedule, 2nd dose of MMR is given at 18 months to encourage and improve local immunisation uptake.
