Wandsworth Reuse, Recycling and Waste Supplementary Planning Document (SPD)

Consultation Report

23 July 2025

About the consultation:

The Reuse, Recycling and Waste SPD provides borough-wide guidance on the provision, design and location of refuse and recycling storage in residential, commercial and mixed-use developments. It supports the waste and recycling policies set out in the <u>Wandsworth Local Plan</u> (July 2023). The draft version consulted on would replace the existing <u>Refuse and Recyclables in developments SPD</u> (2014) to reflect changes to legislation and policy context.

A four week public consultation ran from Tuesday 11 March to Tuesday 8 April 2025.

A response form was provided.

Who was consulted:

Letters and emails were sent to both statutory and non-statutory consultees on the Council's Local Plan database which consists of individuals and organisations who are either prescribed bodies for the purpose of consultation or had requested to be notified of consultations on local development documents. These letters and emails gave notification of the consultation and the consultation period; how to access the document; how to make a representation; and contact details to find out further information.

Paper copies were made available, together with paper response forms, in the borough's main libraires (Balham, Battersea, Putney, Roehampton, Tooting and Wandsworth) and the Town Hall Reception. Information was given to library staff and the Town Hall Reception regarding the consultation and who to contact for further information.

Details of the consultation was posted on the Council's <u>Planning Policy Consultation</u> webpage and on the Council's Consultation Engagement Hub (<u>Citizen Space</u>)

Summary of Response to the consultation:

Fourteen responses were received from 13 people/organisations. Summaries of the responses, the Council's response and any amendments made to the final document are shown in the Appendix.

Overall:

- Four consultees gave general support for the document or made general comments;
- Six consultees acknowledged the consultation and review of the SPD, but had no comments to make
- Three consultees made specific comments

The key points raised were:

- Whether Simpler Recycling (as required by The Environment Act 2021) will require larger recycling storage areas
- Whether the space standards have been analysed from an urban design perspective; and the need for space for storage and vehicle manoeuvring to be kept to a minimum
- The need for information regarding access provision for collection vehicles to be submitted as part of a planning application/development proposal
- The need to take into account the increasing fire risk from more batteries being used and incorrectly disposed of
- The need for better garden waste collection such as reusable or recyclable bags, as an alternative to large additional bin; and more emphasis on composting
- Concern that the SPD did not adequately address the following:
 - reuse
 - the opportunity to promote more environmentally friendly behaviour; getting recycling right and reducing the amount of general waste
 - the opportunity to combat a 'throw away' attitude
 - the problem of flimsy sacks that results in rubbish strewn across local streets
- Criticism that the SPD was too long and could be simpler
